Succumbs Shortly After Breakfast

Mrs. Christina Johnson, 68, passed away suddenly at 9:45 a. m. Monday, February 14, in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank Kanaley, 911 Union St., Hannibal, Mo. Apparently in her usual health Mrs. Johnson ate her breakfast and retired to another room when death came.

Born in Kentucky, June 23, 1875. She was the daughter of the late Randell and Lavina Hammond and was the widow of Benjamin F. Johnson, who passed away about 34 years ago. Mrs. Johnson had been in ill health for the past five years.
