#### Lorenzo Driving Competition 2024

The Lorenzo Driving Competition on July 19-21 this year offered a very mixed series of experiences. There were three days of classes for ring, obstacle, dressage and cross-country driving. In addition, there were several exhibits, horse-related presentations, and vendors on the grounds. Competitors came from several states, including Delaware, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Canada, and of course New York State. As an interesting side note, the second pleasure judge, Dede Bushneck, from Southern Pines, NC, grew up in Cazenovia and the Lorenzo Driving Competition launched her driving career. Lots of local people came to watch, but for those of you who weren't able to be there, this quick overview should help you savor some of the atmosphere of the day.

The winners and placings of each class are available at lorenzodriving.org, and from the menu, "Competitors", "Results". If you know some of these competitors, you can see their class standings and even their horse's name. The variety of classes should demonstrate how entertaining it was to see the different types of things you can do with a harnessed horse.

During the Saturday lunch break, Dr. David Remley (now of Honeoye Falls, NY) gave a demonstration of the coach horn. He had a number of original and new coach horns, and played several of the traditional coach calls, explaining what the call was telling other coaches or ground crew, such as a new team is needed for an incoming coach, or the coach intended to pass traffic on the left or the right. Like the bugle, the horn is limited to six notes, so great skill is required to play a variety of calls. Answering questions from the crowd, David explained how his livery clothing was accurate and serviceable in material and style, including his shirt, trousers and even boots. This was not a costume, but an accurate representation of a coachman.



Following this, some members of the Limestone Hunt Club gave a talk on the purpose, tradition, and use of hounds of their hunt. Ms. Barbara Lindberg, Joint Master, Limestone Creek Hunt, talked about the English traditions that recognized hunts such as Limestone follow, how they coach new members, and how the hounds are selected and cared for. Questions from the crowd brought many interesting and amusing stories from the speakers, and showed how the hunt, sometimes seen as snobbish, can actually be quite accessible to the general public.



On this same Saturday, The Oakman Carriage and Sleigh Collection was open to the public for the day, thanks to the patronage of the New York State Horse Council. This barn, rarely open to the public, houses a variety of carriages and sleighs that once

were owned by individuals in and around Cazenovia. They were collected by Anna Oakman in the 1920's and '30's to preserve what people were discarding in favor of automobiles. While the vehicles are largely unrestored (unlike the beautiful collection in the main Carriage House), many are very early examples of pioneer transportation and may someday be restored, conserved, or better displayed.

During the Sunday lunchtime demonstration, "Gael Orr, certified instructor with the American Sidesaddle Association, and her co-members of the Equestrian Heritage Society, demonstrated the art and elegance of riding sidesaddle and how it's used by modern-day riders from parades to cross-country". While I personally did not arrive in time to listen to this, there were still a couple of horses and ponies with sidesaddles that were being admired by spectators. That's one more thing that I don't see very often.







I also walked over to the stabling area to see the horses at rest, talk with owners, watch horses being harnessed and "put to" vehicles, and to note license plates from several states. Years ago, when my wife Sharon and I were showing, I noticed that once a show was over, I had been too busy to see very much of it. What I would like to emphasize here is that next year when Lorenzo rolls around, or even when there is a driving show in your part of the state, you really should plan on seeing what carriage driving is all about. Carol Buckhout, LDC board president, informs us that the dates for the 2025 Lorenzo Driving Competition are July 18-20, 2025.
