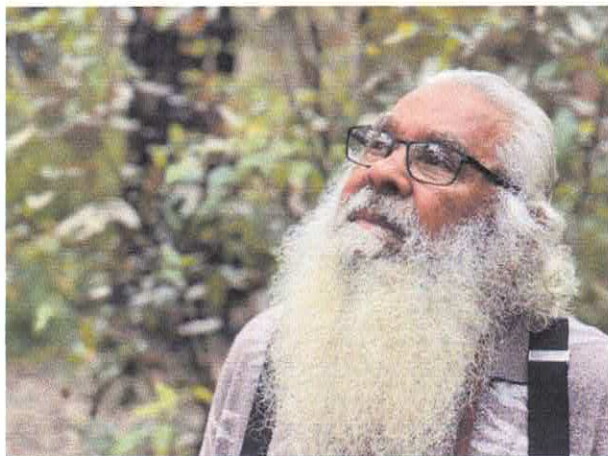

**Proposal to Name the area of Park and Beach as
UNCLE MAX DULUMUNMUN HARRISON RESERVE**

On behalf of the Woronora Valley Residents Association Inc., and myself I am honoured to submit this proposal to formally name what has been casually called Buchanan's Park and Beach area in Woronora as Uncle Max Dulumunmun Harrison Reserve.

Uncle Max (1936–2021) was a respected Aboriginal Elder, cultural teacher, author and community leader who was deeply connected to this land and its people. His lifelong commitment to Indigenous culture, environmental protection, education, and reconciliation has left a lasting legacy in the Woronora Valley and beyond.

This proposal details Uncle Max's many contributions, including his leadership in establishing the annual Sunset Cultural Ceremony held on Australia Day Eve, his advocacy against damaging developments like the Ridge at Menai, his environmental work with bush care groups that helped return native wildlife and his foundation of World Kangaroo Day which promotes sustainable Indigenous values.



Uncle Max's Community Connection and Contributions:

Cultural Leadership & Education

Uncle Max was a valued member of the Woronora Valley Residents Association Inc., regularly attending meetings and sharing Indigenous perspectives. He visited local schools, including Woronora Primary and lectured at Wollongong University, mentoring Indigenous programs and sharing cultural knowledge. Uncle Max conducted many walks and talks along the Woronora riverbank and adjacent bushland, educating adults, children and students in bush medicines and how to appreciate that nature speaks to us 'without voice'.

Cultural Events

Uncle Max founded the annual Sunset Cultural Ceremony held on the eve of Australia Day, a community event that continues to honour Indigenous heritage. This initiative on the bank of the Woronora River has been a wonderful community celebration that positively brings Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities together through ceremony and sharing culture. Uncle Max has also led whale watching and singing-up ceremonies in the Shire, as well as performing cultural marriages in Burnum Burnum Sanctuary and along the river.



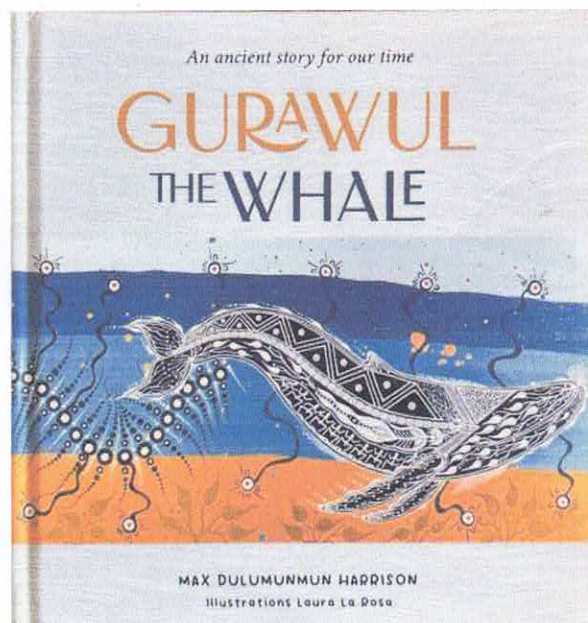
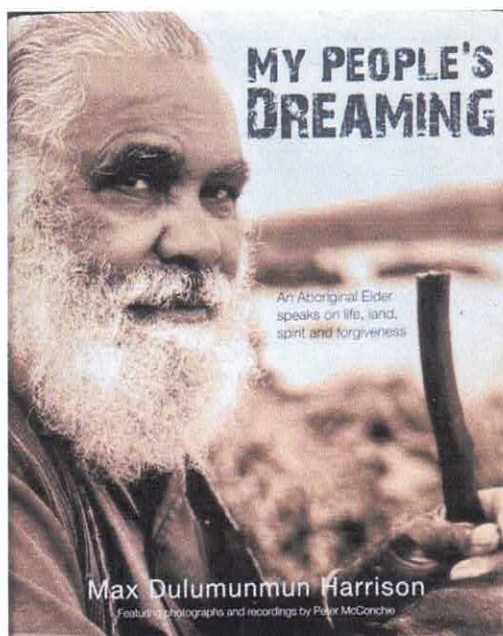

Uncle Max's vision for sharing his culture and his deep cultural knowledge is evidenced through his two books: *My People's Dreaming* and *Gurawul the Whale*, which received a 2023 Whitley Award from the Royal Zoological Society of NSW for the best book on Cultural Knowledge and Zoology. These were gifted to Sutherland Library and to the Mayor.

Environmental Advocacy

Uncle Max was a key figure opposing the Ridge development at Menai, leading community walks and helping protect bushland and endangered species. He worked with bush care groups and university students planting native species behind our local RSL Club, which has attracted *bandicoots* back to the area.

Kangaroo Declaration

Uncle Max inspired the declaration of World Kangaroo Day on 24 October 2021 to celebrate the harmony with which this iconic and unique creature lives with the land and to raise awareness of the cruelty evident in their slaughter for the meat, leather and the pet food industries. This work was done with the Gurindji, the First Nations men Uncle Max took through lore and ceremony and the charitable organisation he established: Back to Country www.backtocountry.org.au
