Transgender individuals in Bangalore, like everyone else, choose their places of residence based on various factors such as affordability, proximity to work or educational opportunities, and social support networks.

Culturally they are monitored by their GURU and are strictly watched for their activities.

Transgender with low income or no support register with an NGO and monitored. Since, Bangalore is cosmopolitan city, it attracts transgender from Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, North and East part of India, majority from West Bengal etc.,

However, certain areas in Bangalore may have a higher concentration of LGBTQ+ communities, including transgender individuals.
