- **AudioMass (Best for Browser-Based):** An open-source, web-based audio and waveform editor that works directly in the browser, ideal for quick, simple audio tasks on any OS.

Open Source Video Editing Softwares:

- **Avidemux (Best for Quick Edits):** Simple tool designed for basic cutting, filtering, and encoding tasks.

Common Audio File Formats

- **MP3 (.mp3) (MPEG-1 Audio Layer 3):** Most popular compressed format, balancing small size with decent sound quality.
- **WAV (.wav) (Waveform Audio):** Uncompressed, high-quality format primarily for Windows, resulting in large files.
