# **Cut-away cylinder**

Jim Mills, of J M Scuba Services, send me a picture of his latest acquisition.

Jim got a failed aluminium cylinder cut so that he can create some damage on the inside walls for students to measure.

This will be used, on his training courses, for students to check the depths of internal faults using the pick and pin method. The cut-out will be put back in place and so a drop-light will need to be sued at the same time, making it as realistic as possible.



Remember, this was a skill that some students claimed they had never been taught on their Technician Inspection Course. Please make sure you have some suitable alternative so our students get that essential training skill.
