CLASS HISTORY

BEWILDERED and overwhelmed by the size and system of a new school the January '40 class started its four-year career; but it didn't take the members long to make their mark, in fact they made it as soon as they entered the building. They made in on every chair and table top they could find.

When that spectacular Rhodes Circus rolled around in April '36 Robert Bluhm, Ralph Brown, George Dubin, Arline Henninger, Virginia Holman, Edward Kapsar, Raymond Kittle, Jack Friedl, Frank Kryznowek, Steve Maslanka, Robert Marquard, John Peterka, Quinton Schafer, Fred Schleicher, Glenn Snow, Cecelia Szychowski, Elinore Will, Sigmund Zaykowsky, and George Zeninetz were found among the large cast that made the circus a success.

The men of brawn who helped Rhodes to maintain an enviable record on the gridiron were Harold Kessler, Fred Schleicher, John Gatsos, Quinton Schafer, and William Pinch, while the cheerleader who led the cheers for the home team, and who seemed to be made of springs, was Robert Brown.

In basketball, the lightning ball handling and accurate shooting of Robert Bluhm, William Pinch, Harold Benz, and Matthew Jenkins helped win the Greater Cleveland Conference Championship for the reserve bucketeers in 1936.

While the other major sports held the spotlight for a while the Rhodes cindermen settled down to business and turned out some of the fleetest runners Rhodes has seen in many a day. The most outstanding in our class was Ralph Brown, having belonged to some of the relay teams that brought home trophies both from the Mansfield Relays and from the Public Hall Meets. Other members of the class who went out for track but didn't have such spectacular success were Ray Kittle, Norman Meyer, and John Peterka, all of whom were then hard working sophomores.

The local matmen were jubilant when they saw one of their number, Fred Schleicher, twice crowned city and state champion in the heavy weight division. Although not a state champ, and a long way from being in the heavy weight division, George Dubin, another senior who wrestles in the 115-pound class, has made quite a name for himself in the local association of grunters.

In the play "White Collars," and the operettas, "The Pirates of Penzance," and "The Chimes of Normandy," leading roles were taken by John Gatsos, Earl Russell, and Lucille Neumore, while minor roles were taken by Norman Meyer and Eugene Mehner.

It was while in the 11th grade that the first effort at organization was made by holding a Christmas party in the cafeteria. It was so much fun for everybody that attended that they all wished that Christmas came more than once a year. The high spot of the dance occurred when Eugene Mehner entered dressed as Santa Claus bearing his large bag of goodies which were distributed to the guests.

The 12B picnic was another epoch-making episode in the history of the class when they united to hold their first picnic, complete with plenty of roasted wieners and liquid refreshment in the form of soft drinks. The turnout for the picnic was very large and the committee was both pleased and relieved at the enthusiasm showed by the undergraduates. After strenuous games of baseball and other forms of general roughhouse the weary picnickers wound their way slowly home, sorry that their time for fun was so short.

The 12A picnic was conceded by everyone to be the best of the two as the organization was more complete. After eating their fill of hamburg sandwiches and drinking pop the supposedly dignified seniors almost tore the shirts off one another in games of modified soccer and football. The wooded hills of Metropolitan Park resounded to the none-too-melodious sound of many voices and the shuffle of many feet as dancing was laboriously undertaken on the concrete floor of the shelter house to the jazzy accordion music provided by Raymond McKeon, Roman Suthosky, and Joe Good.

During the last year and one half, the National Honor Society inducted into membership 17 of the present seniors. The seniors who had their entrance requirements tested by activities both in scholastic and leadership participation, and also by working on the committees which made the senior activities so successful, were: Robert Boden, Arlene Braatz, Bernice Ferencz, Evelyn Haller, Rodney Hoffman, Robert Kallman, Harold Kessler, Fred Luthy, Margaret Macsay, Vera Murray, Lucille Neumore, Jean Park, Jean Pogalies, Earl Russell, Lois Schwerin, and Glenn Snow, with John Gatsos as president during the 1939 semester.

After much discussion at class meetings, which were presided over by the class president—John Gatsos; Vice-President, Glenn Snow; Secretary, Evelyn Haller; and Treasurer, Fred Schleicher, the program for the last semester in school was planned. The informal, an honest-to-goodness barn dance, and conceded by the faculty to be the best informal ever held at Rhodes, was complete with corn stalks, squashes, milk cans, and stalls, plus a three-piece orchestra sitting behind a split-rail fence. After bravely trying to master the Virginia Reel amid much laughing and slipping of feet on the corn meal covered floor, the second social event of the senior semester came to a successful end.

Culminating a drive that began in the spring of 1939, the Class of '40 made history by announcing that it would be the first to have an annual. Although other classes had vaguely discussed a yearbook the spirit displayed has only now been strong enough to actually carry it through.

The Rainbow Ball was held on Saturday, January 13, in the gym, where we waltzed to the soft strains of the Rebels in the ethereal atmosphere of the rainbow, angel's-hair, and softly tinted clouds.

On Thursday, January 18, the class sat down to the first class banquet in the history of the school. The dinner culminated a series of individualistic ideas and was the climax of the success of the senior class. No boring speeches, no stiffness—instead a harmony that will never be surpassed.

Commencement, coming five days later, brought sadness to many; however, this sorrow was mingled with satisfaction and contentment. We—the January '40 class—had succeeded.




