






Members of the Class of January, 1946:

Somewhere in the World February '46

The hardwood gym floor became used to the "lightfooted" Eleanor Kratky and Carol Prahl as they regularly socked the volley-ball.

Marge Say took her bow to a bit of glory as '44 track queen.

Our eyes still see the flash of those bright blue and yellow sweaters that were sported every Thursday. Alan Braun, Chuck Haak, Don Eaton, and Hank Stickney had fraternized. Result: Rhoda Hi Y.
