HISTORY OF CLASS OF '47

As we remember, it was a not too cold day in January of 1943 that our first day at Rhodes began. After locating the auditorium and getting the usual pep-talk, things started happening.

Already on the road to wisdom were Eleanor Dieffenbacher, Eleanor Andrisin, and William Cleber, proud members of the Work and Win Club.

Remember the operetta "With a Song in My Heart"? A number of our more co-operative members aided in the success of the presentation, namely, Marie Wirth, Rose Marie Ornsby, Lucy Ida Koeler, Faye McGinley, Marie Martin, and Joan Wismar.

Now to give the boys a little glory, Buddy Bogus, Vernon Kiehl, George Jacques, George Vogel, Robert Estock, and William Cleber were the 9th grade Visual Aids. Bob and Buddy remained with the club and became the noon-movie operators.

The Y-Teen Club claimed the attention of most of our girls after the 10B. We are proud to say Marie Martin was president of the club; Ruth Loomis, secretary; and Marie Wirth, treasurer.

Well-known PA announcers were Eleanor Dieffenbacher, George Vogel, Lucy Ida Koeler, Faye McGinley, and Ted Dickens.

Several of our boys who had completed two semesters of shop were admitted to the Foreman's Club. These right-hand men of the shop teachers were Robert Estock, Ed Sklarsky, Joe Klingbeil, Sam Jakabcic, Walter Krawczonek, Richard Seck, George Jacques, and Robert Thom.

Among the numerous German Club members we had as officers Alice Lembke, president; James Malone, vice-president; and Eleanor Dieffenbacher, secretary.

Not to overlook the French Club, we had the little printer's devil, Don Wires, editor of the "Rag of Rhodes," as the president.

Our more athletic members of the class belonged to the Girls' and Boys' Leaders. Eleanor Andrisin was president and Ruth Loomis, vice-president of Girls' Leaders, with Dorothy Jarmusik an interested member. Bill Gecking was president of the Boys' Leaders, with Robert Estock, James Turchanik, and Henry Meyer members.

Looking through our class we found a few boys who played an exceptionally fine game of football for us. They were Jack Stanko, Bill Gecking, Gordon Wynn, and James Turchanik, Jim having made the Varsity in the 10th grade.

Among the more gifted of our class were Faye McGinley, Carol Gnuschke, Lucy Ida Koeler, Marylee Drollinger, Kenneth Paddock, Robert Palus, Joan Wismar, and William Cleber, all members of the choir who entertained us at various programs during our school years.

Many girls at some time or other were members of the Girls' Glee Club or the Choral Club. Among the girls who remained in Glee Club, Sally Priebe was chosen president and Marylee Drollinger, vice-president. The Choral Club claimed Shirley Pochatila as treasurer.

The National Honor Society members of our class were George Vogel, president; Joan Wismar, secretary; Marylee Drollinger, Eleanor Andrisin, Doris Applegate, James Turchanik, Donald Wires, and George Jacques.

James Malone and his colleagues, George Jacques and Gordon Wynn, were responsible for the unknown odors that permeated the third floor corridors during the 4th period. (Incidentally, they were lab. assistants.)

In the 11A our class decided to organize, and elected as class officers Gordon Wynn, president; Gilbert Muentz, vice-president; Rose Marie Ornsby, secretary; Alice Lembke, treasurer. We enjoyed a very successful picnic and a fair afternoon informal.

12B class officers were James Malone, president; Gordon Wynn, vice-

president; Robert Meurer, secretary; Eleanor Andrisin, treasurer. We had a gay class picnic with most of the girls swimming or wading in the creek, having been persuaded by the boys to do so. We gave an afternoon informal for the 12A's. It was successful, even though the band was about an hour late, causing the social committee much worry.

After a rather heated discussion our prom was held on June 8, 1946. The boys of the class were seen everywhere hunting tuxedos and dinner jackets up to the night of the prom. Those of us who attended made a week-end of it and felt very droopy on Monday.

Gordon Wynn was chosen president again in the 12A; Bill Gecking, vice-president, Joan Wismar, secretary; and Joan Warth, treasurer. We do not mean to overlook the social committee and social chairmen, Ruth Loomis and Zane Chlus, who did an excellent job in organizing our class and planning for the social functions in 11A, 12B, and 12A.

Our picnic in the 12A was a worry because of the shortage of hot dogs. We did manage to get lunchmeat sandwiches, however. Dancing by the not too bright candlelight was voted the best idea. Edwin Erickson remembered to bring his accordion which made the dancing possible. (Eddy was also our 1944 War Bond selling champion for the school.)

Our class enrollment was increased in the 12A semester because of the numerous veterans who returned to school in order to prepare for a college education. They were: John Dill, Robert Englehart, Donald Griffiths, Russell Jordan, Walter Krawczonek, Matthew Lobas, Henry Nadin, Kenneth Paddock, Robert Palus, Richard Seck, Don Klein, and Howard Weekley.

And then there was Mr. Henderson who left his dogs to come back to his chemistry classes. Mr. Hoffman came back again and got acquainted with the girls of Rhodes. Everyone was glad to welcome Mr. Moran home. He was promoted to head football coach and did a super job.
