THE SKY IS THE LIMIT WITH COLLEGE

Cesar Sepulveda, a gentle bear of an 18 year old, was almost one more high school dropout, heading to a life of crime or a backbreaking job as a laborer. Instead, the June graduate of Cleveland's Rhodes High School packed his bags in August and moved to John Carroll University, the first step in his plan to become a pediatrician.

He couldn't have done it without his former calculus teacher, Audrey Schneider,

prodding him to keep his grades up and acting as his mentor.

"My mom and dad didn't know how to put me into college or that I would even graduate from high school," said Sepulveda. This is not easy for many Hispanics. Nationally, only 13 percent of Hispanic adults have at least a Bachelor's Degree and it's easy to see why: many never graduate from high school. The Hispanic graduation rate in the Cleveland public schools is just 33%, well under the 54.3% graduation rate for the district. Hispanic youth recognize that a college degree is important for a successful future, according to a 2009 Pew Hispanic Center report.

The problem? Pressures to get a job and to help their families financially induce many Hispanic youth to cut short high school and sacrifice college. Sepulveda is an example of how the pattern can change with the help of a mentor reaching out to those who aren't getting that message at home.

One summer, Sepulveda wanted a job fixing roofs for extra money, and planned to pass up an internship with the Cleveland Clinic. His mentor, Schneider, had other ideas and a warning for him: "You will be 50 years old on a roof in 90 degree weather and you are going to be taking drugs to go to sleep because of the backaches. Is this the future you want?" "I just laid it out plain," she said. Sepulveda took the internship.

Mentors can make the critical difference, says Victor Ruiz, executive director of Esperanza, which offers three mentoring programs for students in 6th through 12th grades. Sepulveda surely needed one. He probably wouldn't have made it to college or even through high school without Schneider, a teacher who became his mentor.

After Sepulveda's parents divorced when he was in 9th grade, his life spun out of

control and he started hanging out with teens who robbed drug dealers, even though just a year before he'd been in advanced classes and gotten good grades. About the time he began to have doubts about the wisdom of that life, Schneider started giving Sepulveda rides home after he stayed late at school to work on projects. "She felt like my mom," says Sepulveda. "She seemed like she cared for everybody."

Schneider pushed him to get his grades up to get into the National Honor Society. Now that Sepulveda is in college, Schneider worries about the pressure on him at home to take care of his younger sister. There's an upside to his decision to attend school near her home. She reminds him that "at least you're close enough that I can kick your rear end when you need it."

We will be watching for good things from Mr. Sepulveda as he continues to pursue his dream of becoming a pediatrician.




