



**The 49-Year Method + The 50-Year Method = The (SJF) 3rd Methodology for Calculating the Jubilee Cycles.**

# The 49-YM 50th Jubilee

Mistaking the 49th Jubilee Celebratory year 2450 is the mistake that caused the domino effect of errors. 2401 is not recognized as being the identifying year, and is inadvertently added to the formula. If 2401 is recognized as the first year, 2409 is the 9th year. In other words, 2409 should be the mistake, not 2410.

$$49 \times 50 = 2450 \div 50 = 49$$

# The 50-YM 50th Jubilee

Finding the Jubilee Celebratory year is done correctly. However, the very next year 2501 is located in the next Jubilee cycle. In this case, the 51st Jubilee cycle. Not the 50th.

$$50 \times 50 = 2500 - 49 = 2451$$

$$2450 + 7 + 2 = 2459$$
