Stage # 1

A Doc Holliday New Year



Most **Old West gunfights** were casual, almost comical affairs. Case in point: In a saloon in Dallas Texas on January 1, 1875 Doc Holliday and barkeep Charles Austin get in some kind of dispute, over what is not clear then or now. Both grab guns and open up. Several shots are fired and all miss at close range. Doc said "I Guess We Both Missed" When the gun smoke clears, the two put down their weapons and settle things with spirituous liquor.


Staging: Pistols holstered, rifle and shotgun staged the on Bar (**left table**)

Gun Order: Shotgun last **Choice Rifle or Pistols first.**

Starting Position: Standing at the bar with hands holding shot glass and whisky bottle.

Line: ***"I Guess We Both Missed"***

ATB: With Rifle alternate the square targets for 6 rounds then double tap the circles. With pistols repeat rifle instructions. With shot gun knock down 2 shot gun targets to the left of Dock Holliday and then knock down 2 shot gun targets to the right of Dock Holliday (**right table is not in stage**)



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Stage #2



Mexican Federales were caught opening fire on Texas Rangers who were in pursuit of wanted train robbers near the southern border at Fronton Texas on January 28th 1899. Just as a group of wanted Cowboys, with \$20,000 dollars stolen during a train robbery, tried to enter Mexico the Federales started firing at the Rangers. It seems they wanted the money. The Cowboys turned tail and were captured by the Rangers. The leader said **"Better Caught By The Rangers Than The Federales"**.

"Staging: Rifle loaded 10 rounds in the left table.





Pistols loaded 5 rounds and holstered.

Shotgun open and empty staged on the left or right table.

Gun order: Rifle not last.

Starting Position: Standing behind the table of choice holding the money bag in both hands shooter says **"Better Caught By The Rangers Than The Federales"**.

ATB: Drop the money bag and with shot gun knock down all 4 shot gun targets to the right of the Federales make shot gun safe. With rifle triple tap a square then alternate on the circles for 4 rounds then triple tap the other square. With pistols repeat the rifle instructions.



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Stage # 3

James and Trains

In 1873, Jesse James and his crew loosened a section of a train near Adrian, Iowa. During the heist, the thieves used a rope to dislodge the track on a blind curve. This sent the train to derail and topple over into a nearby ditch. Jesse and his brother Frank, covered in white masks, boarded the train cars in search of a safe from the U.S. Express Company that was believed to hold a stockpile of gold. However, James and his crew were disappointed to find the safe only held \$2,000. Jesse said **"Dang This Ain't What We Came For"**

Staging: Two pistols loaded with 5 rounds each holstered .

Rifle loaded with 10 rounds on left table


Shotgun, open and empty on the right table.

Center table is not used on this stage

Gun order: Rifle, (Then Choice Pistol or shotgun)

Starting Position: Start standing at the left table holding the mask in one hand and the other hand on your rifle. Shooter Says, **"Dang This Ain't What We Came For"**

ATB: With rifle put 3 rounds on an outside target then 3 rounds on the other outside target then 4 rounds on the center target. With pistols repeat the rifle instructions and with shotgun knock down the 4 shotgun targets in any order.



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Stage # 4

Butch Cassidy and the San Miguel Valley Bank Robbery



One of Cassidy's most notable robberies was when he robbed the San Miguel Valley Bank in Telluride, Colorado on June 24, 1889. During this heist, Cassidy and his accomplice Matt Warner walked into the San Miguel Valley Bank armed and ready.


Warner pulled a gun on the bank teller, threatening to shoot him, while Cassidy loaded a bag full of money. The pair got a way with \$20,750, which today would be worth over half a million dollars. This robbery launched Cassidy into his fame as an outlaw. Shortly after this robbery, the Wild Bunch was formed and Cassidy continued on with his thieving ways.

Staging: **Two pistols loaded with 5 rounds each holstered .**
Rifle loaded with 10 rounds on left table.
Shotgun, open and empty on the center table.

Gun order: Rifle, shot gun, pistols

Starting Position: Start standing at the left table with rifle in hand. Shooter says "**The Wild Bunch**"

ATB: With rifle do a 1,3,1 sweep from either end then repeat from the same end. Move to the center table and knock down the 4 shot gun targets in any order. Make shot gun safe and from the right table with pistols repeat the rifle instructions.



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Stage #5

Sam Bass and the Union Pacific Train Robbery



On September 18, 1877, the single largest robbery on the Union Pacific Railroad occurred. Sam Bass led his gang of six outlaws on this legendary heist near Big Springs, Nebraska. As the train was making its way from California, it made a pit stop in Nebraska at night at a remote water station. Bass and his crew took advantage of the situation, boarding the train to rob its safe. In the first safe, used for storing passenger's valuables, they found \$450. Believing they had come out with little cash, the outlaws decided to leave. However, on the way out, they noticed three wooden crates next to the main safe. These crates ended up containing gold bars that were each worth \$20. Bass and his crew ended up escaping with \$60,000.

Staging: Rifle loaded 10 rounds held at port arms on the start plate


Pistols loaded 5 rounds and holstered.

Shotgun open and empty staged on the table.

Gun Order: Rifle, Pistols, Shot gun

Starting Position: Standing on the start plate with rifle at port arms shooter says "**It's Gold In Them Crates**"

ATB: With rifle and pistols put 2 shots on the tombstones and rectangles and 4 rounds on the circle in any order. With shot gun shoot 4 shotgun targets



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Stage #6



On June 2, 1899 a group of armed men made a daring train robbery in the area of Wilcox, Wyoming. The robbers flagged down the unbeknownst train crew and boarded the locomotive. Once on the train, the robbers forced the train crew to cross a nearby bridge. After the last train car crossed the bridge, the bandits blew up the bridge by using dynamite. They demanded the express and mail workers to open up the doors. When the clerks refused, the robbers took the matter into their own hands and blew up the doors and the safe. The armed men were able to make off with around \$30,000 before taking off into the mountains. The notorious Wild Bunch committed this crime.

“Staging: Rifle loaded 10 rounds on the table.

Pistols loaded 5 rounds and holstered.

Shotgun open and empty staged on the table.

Gun Order: Rifle not last

Starting Position: Standing at the table holding the dynamite shooter says **“That Was A Lot Of Dynamite”**

ATB: Drop the dynamite with rifle put 10 rounds on the tombstones in any order. With pistols put 10 rounds on the rectangles and circle in any order. With shotgun knock down the 4 shotgun targets in any order.
