Pastor's Spin



Siblings in Christ of Covenant,

In the next few months, many college basketball fans will be following a head coach who calls Durham, North Carolina, home. As he enters his final season at the helm, Mike Krzyzewski (also known as Coach K) has led Duke University to over one thousand victories (a record for a coach at a single school), five national championships, not to mention playing a role in six gold medals with the USA basketball team, among many other accolades. Such mind-boggling achievement leads many to consider

him the greatest collegiate basketball coach of all time (to the chagrin of Buckeye and other non-Blue Devil fans). And yet, another amazing success story is emerging just over 70 miles west in Winston-Salem, but it will never gain the same national attention.

Outside of Wake Forest's campus is Augsburg Lutheran Church, and one of its ministries is a homeless shelter. Emily Norris had been helping with this pivotal outreach to the community for a few years while hearing pleas from guests for a safe space to worship, where they would not be judged (because, as much as we may think most church buildings are judgement-free zones...it isn't often the case). The stories from the residents inspired Norris to go to seminary and become a pastor. She returned to North Carolina, and helped shape the "Dwelling, an ELCA faith community designed for, but not exclusive to, people in Winston-Salem who are or have been homeless."

Except, it was 2020. The global pandemic was still raging, affecting Norris' plans to begin inperson worship for the just-as-precious-children-of-God, who happened to not have permanent housing. So, she had to call an audible, and instead came up with providing free mobile showers for the people in need, including clean clothes. "It was really a profound way to start,' Norris said. 'Showers provide a sense of dignity and are therapeutic. I don't know a better way to remind people of their baptism." Soon enough, the in-person worship commenced. A living room became a sanctuary with couches and chairs. It may not be what many desire on a weekend when they worship God, but it is their sanctuary, their safe-haven, their holy place to connect with the same God who loves them just as much as anyone else.

This is one of many stories from the ELCA's recently published Stories of Faith in Action, an absolutely wonderful resource to help us all see how we as a wider church continue to make an impact on our local communities, on new centers for worship across the country, as well as making transformational effects on people all over the world. We do not often know how our offerings can play such a role in the life-altering work of the body of Christ. We know about how some monies need to go a pastor's salary or paying for a parish administrator or ensuring the church building has lights and heat, but a pivotal portion is about humbling, but powerful ministry, inside and outside our own walls, sometimes well, well beyond those walls.

Great work is done by individual congregations in Maple Heights and Winston-Salem, North Carolina, but even greater work is done when we pass on some of our gifts to share with other precious gifts to pull off incredible ministry in the form of homeless shelters, food pantries, not to mention ELCA World Hunger, Lutheran Disaster Response, and Lutheran World Relief. The Stories of Faith in Action (the PDF version is provided as an attachment if you are receiving this as an email, or if you would like a paper copy, please contact our church office) helps you see just how much of an impact we have and continue to pull off in our amazing part of the body of Christ.

So, in this month of Thanksgiving, we want to take this opportunity to say, "Thank you!" from the bottom of our collective hearts for being part of our Covenant family, and our wider family of the ELCA, and most important family, our siblings in Christ. We want to extend our appreciation for your continued support of our congregation during these topsy-turvy (to put it rather mildly) last two years, and we look forward to still be working together with whatever you have to offer in the years to come. As has been our spoken-blessing these last several weeks in concluding our in-person worship for that particular day, and sending us out as disciples of Christ: "People of God, you are Christ's body, bringing new life to the world. The holy Trinity, + one God, bless you now and forever!" Yes, may you be blessed so that you, and all of us together, may serve as a blessing for others, because, evidently, we're no where near done yet. Thanks be to God, indeed!
