

We welcome you to worship here at the Lutheran Church of the Covenant! We continue to do our best in providing the safest environment possible for you to worship our Risen Lord with your whole heart, even during these COVID-19 times. Here are the precautions we are taking on behalf of our whole community of faith, so that we best care for one another and those we are around during the week.

- We ask you wear a mask the entire time you are in the building, unless you have a medical condition preventing you from doing so.
- Bulletins and individual Communion elements are available for you to pick up as you enter from the back of the sanctuary. The Communion elements are available in wine and grape juice form as well as wheat and gluten-free wafers. We will partake of the body and blood of Christ together from our respective seats.
- There will not be a separate time for an offering to be collected for supporting our congregational and wider-church ministry, and so an offering basket is placed beside the bulletins and Communion elements, for those who wish to give this day.
- We are asking you to refrain from singing, as we do our best to minimize the spread of droplets and aerosols around our masks. You may do so in your heart, where we believe God hears just as well as if spoken or sung aloud. We, also, ask that you continue participate throughout the worship by speaking the **bold** print, but doing so in a whisper voice.
- There will not be a time for sharing of the peace, but we encourage you to do so with one another before or after the worship (while maintaining the physical distancing recommendations of six feet).
- There will not be a processional or recessional of the cross, nor will there be a receiving line with the pastor after the worship. If you wish to speak for Pastor Brad, for any reason, please do not hesitate to contact him through email, text or calling him directly.

We thank you for your patience and understanding as we will always err on the side of caution while knowing that we can still transmit the virus even with the full vaccination.

Third Sunday of Easter

The gospel for the third Sunday of Easter is always one in which the risen Christ shares food with the disciples, meals that are the Easter template for the meal we share each Sunday. In today's gospel, Jesus both shares the disciples' food and shows them the meaning of his suffering, death, and resurrection through the scriptures, the two main elements of our Sunday worship.

First Lesson Acts 3:12-19

After healing a man unable to walk, Peter preaches to the people, describing how God's promises to Israel have been fulfilled in Jesus. Through the proclamation of Christ's death and resurrection, God is offering them forgiveness and restoration in Jesus' name.

¹²[Peter] addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk?¹³The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. ¹⁴But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, ¹⁵and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ¹⁶And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

¹⁷"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. ¹⁹Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

¹See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ²Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

⁴Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. ⁵You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. ⁶No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. ⁷Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

*Gospel Luke 24:36b-48

In this account of an appearance after his resurrection, Jesus opens the minds of the disciples to understand him as Messiah. Jesus convinces them that he has been raised and sends them on a mission to proclaim the message of repentance and forgiveness.

^{36b}Jesus himself stood among [the disciples] and said to them, "Peace be with you." ³⁷They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. ³⁸He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? ³⁹Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." ⁴⁰And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. ⁴¹While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" ⁴²They gave him a piece of broiled fish, ⁴³and he took it and ate in their presence.

⁴⁴Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things."

This is the holy Gospel of our Lord.

Heal divisions in Northern Ireland and other places of civil unrest, including in our own nation. O God our Sovereign, bring peace to the world you still love, and have mercy on us. **Hear us when we call.**

Healing God, we lift up all who are sick and suffering, for those who have no access to the coronavirus vaccines, for the children afflicted with the virus variants, for everyone who fears receiving medical advice and assistance, for those who live with chronic pain, for those whose pain is known only to you. O God our Caregiver, nurture the sick, and have mercy on us. **Hear us when we call.**

We remember before you all the witnesses of the resurrection, the saints of old, those who have died by violence or by the coronavirus, and especially our relatives and friends. O God our Resurrection, give us life now and forever, and have mercy on us. **Hear us when we call.**

Receive these prayers into your heart of mercy for the sake of the holy and righteous one, Jesus Christ, our wondrous Redeemer. **Amen.**

Lectionary Blog: Why Are You Surprised?



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The biblical narrative doesn't go directly from the crucifixion to Paul's letters about how to understand Jesus and how to live in community, thank goodness. We read in the Bible that Jesus was resurrected and appeared to many of his disciples, and not just the 12. He was able to comment on and interpret his death and resurrection for those who had followed him. Then the disciples who had actually known Jesus were able to interpret his life, death and resurrection for those who would believe through them. The common refrain throughout Jesus' and his disciples' post-resurrection teaching is incredulity that what came to pass could have come as a surprise.

In the pericope immediately before this week's reading in Luke, Jesus joined two disciples who were walking away from Jerusalem. While they were on their way, they discussed what they thought were the last days of Jesus' ministry. But they were confused by the report from some women in their group who said that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Jesus' response was to chide them and then patiently explain again what he had no doubt told his followers many times before:

"How foolish you are, and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself (Luke 24:25-27; NIV).

These two then invited Jesus to share the evening meal of the festival of unleavened bread with them. They saw Jesus in the breaking of the bread and the sharing of the cup—as we are blessed to see him in communion as well. Afterward they hurried to tell their comrades that they had seen the risen Jesus.

The disciples were discussing this appearance of their risen Messiah when Jesus stood among them and wished peace upon them. They were shocked, but Jesus' response again was one of surprise at their lack of equanimity. "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts arise in your minds?" (Luke 24:37; NIV).

After allowing them to touch him and then eating a fish to prove that he was really resurrected and not just a spirit, Jesus then pointed back to the Scriptures. He went through "Moses, the prophets and the psalms" in order to open their minds to what they should have expected. He told them to wait in the city for the gift from the Father. But crucially, Jesus didn't want the Spirit to come in power before his disciples knew and understood the Scriptures. He delayed his ascension to heaven to be reintegrated into the royal throne room of God because it was *so* important that his disciples receive a few final Bible studies.

Days later, Jesus' disciples Peter and John finally arrived at the point where they could successfully emulate their master, teacher and friend with whom they had spent so long learning the ways of life. When the two entered the temple courts, a beggar asked for a gift. The power of God flowed through Peter and the lame beggar was healed (Acts 3:1-8). Many people had regularly seen this beggar, who was now running around inside the temple courts, and they pressed Peter for answers as to how this had come to pass. Peter responded just as Jesus had only a few weeks earlier to similar questions of who and why these things were happening: "Why are you surprised?"

Peter then rehearsed the circumstances leading to Jesus' death and resurrection. He pointed to the power that had caused the man to be healed and freed them all from their sins. To support his argument, Peter quoted Moses, Samuel, the prophets and the conversations between God and Abraham. Peter was imitating Jesus by performing signs and quoting Scripture to point to the Messiah's salvific ministry.

The bottom line is that after the resurrection people are continually surprised by the life and power of Jesus. But we should not be. Jesus and the disciples repeatedly pointed to Scripture and how studying and knowing it helps us see, understand and anticipate what God will do in the world.

In the spirit of this instruction, I am re-engaging in close study of the major prophets that Jesus referenced so often, especially focusing on Isaiah. I'd invite you, if you're not already, to consider rereading some of the Hebrew Bible that the Lord and his disciples repeatedly pointed to as necessary for understanding what God was up to in Jesus' ministry.

We continue to hear plenty of positive feedback about our outdoor worship opportunities last year, when we first returned to in-person worship following the initial local outbreak of COVID-19. As the vaccines continue to be rolled out across the country and herd immunity develops, and with so much of our Covenant family appreciating how we worshiped last summer, our Covenant council is considering returning to worshiping outdoors starting Sunday, June 6 (still at 9AM) and continuing outdoors through the months of June, July, and August.

We are fully aware of the broad spectrum of current worship practices with congregations near and far away: some are not wearing masks, not distancing, and full-on singing. Some have yet to meet in-person. We wish to continue to provide the safest environment for those who have yet to be vaccinated, including for potential visitors who may come with youth, who are more affected by the new variants of the virus.

If we move outdoors, we would still celebrate Communion every Sunday, as well as sing together! If weather does not cooperate that respective Sunday, we would move into the sanctuary with the same protocols as we have been using so far this year. For those who would prefer to worship inside the sanctuary on a more regular basis, we are tentatively planning to hold our Saturday worships (1st & 3rd Saturdays of each month at 5pm) in the sanctuary (with our same current protocols). We encourage you to take time to let us know what you think by Wednesday, April 28 (in time for our May newsletter) about this plan for worships at Covenant during the summer months. Feel free to contact anyone on our Covenant council, as well as Pastor Brad and Jen in the church office.
