Siblings in Christ of Covenant,

In a few weeks, the Games of the XXXII Olympiad will finally commence in Japan. Of course, the Olympics, along with many events all over the world, had to change course last year amidst a global pandemic. Nevertheless, come July 23, tens of thousands of athletes from hundreds of countries will come together to show some of the most impressive physical strength, agility, coordination, and more.

Now, just before the Olympics started back in 2004 in Athens, Greece, I was in a part of the world that I, quite honestly, had no desire to check out at all. And yet, shortly after I joined the college handbell choir my freshman year, it was announced that we and a vocal choir on campus would be going to Japan. 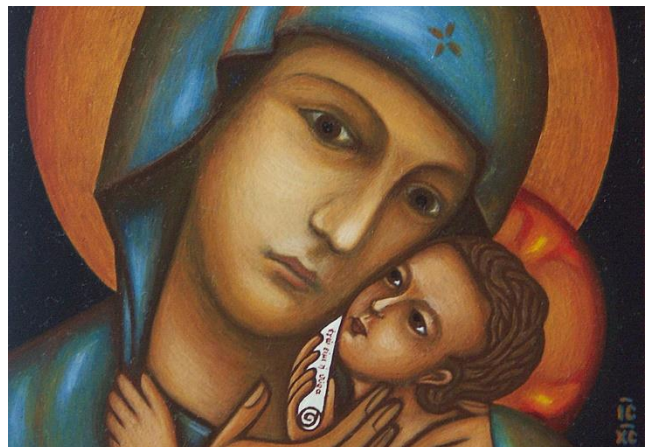
