Pastor's Spin

Siblings in Christ of Covenant,

Greetings! Amidst our Lenten pilgrimage during this month of March, a certain day will come up on the church calendar: the Annunciation of Our Lord (March 25, hence, nine months before Christmas), when we recognize the moment when Mary's life (and, actually, the whole world) was changed, drastically changed, at that. As the story so goes:



²⁶In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, ²⁷to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." ²⁹But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. ³⁰The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. ³²He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. ³³He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." ³⁴Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" ³⁵The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. ³⁶And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. ³⁷For nothing will be impossible with God." ³⁸Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her (Luke 1:26-38 NRSV).

Why bring this up during Lent (didn't we cover this a couple months ago during Advent anyway)? Well, there's that one verse that sticks out to me during this season that's meant to focus on confession, repentance, renewal, not to mention the cross: "For nothing will be impossible with God." Granted, that verse can be taken to the extreme (as we human beings like to do with a variety of things) to rival the logic presented in the temptation story that we will hear on the First Sunday in Lent: turning a stone into a loaf of bread and surviving a fall from a tall building (Luke 4:1-13). I don't think that's what the angel Gabriel had in mind, including us winning lottery tickets or obtaining our dream car or the like.

But there is something to be said about applying "nothing will be impossible with God" during this season that may come off a tad bit somber in comparison to the rest. Yes, we fall short of the glory of God in a variety of ways. We have our fair share of falterings as we follow our Lord who was willing to take a cross up a hill out of death-defying love. And yet, "nothing will be impossible with God" in terms of forgiveness and mercy. And yet, it doesn't even stop there. Yes, God will not only forgive, but God will empower us to go into action with the new life and hope and grace we mind-bogglingly received. "Nothing will be impossible with God" in just how much God is willing to take on all our shortcomings and falterings and "it's complicated" histories. And "nothing will be impossible with God" in believing that we still have something to offer for the benefit of those who struggle with believing that verse, wondering if they truly can be loved, too.

The Annunciation story also provides an opening that we cannot take for granted. Mary has the guts to ask, "How can this be?" It serves as another reminder for the church and children of God everywhere: you're allowed to ask questions. You're allowed to have your doubts. You're allowed to struggle with "nothing will be impossible with God," and whatever else. The angel Gabriel does not rebuke Mary for having the most basic human curiosity. God does not either with us. It's all part of the journey, and regardless of how many curves and wandering off's we take, there will still be Emmanuel (God with us) as much now in Lent as in Advent and throughout our life. Thanks be to God, indeed!

An Interfaith Call to Peace for Ukraine (February 24, 2022)

Though we have been anxious about the recent growing tensions between Ukraine and Russia and between Russia and the NATO countries in recent weeks, we remain deeply concerned, as we have been since 2014, for the impact of this ongoing conflict on innocent civilians throughout Ukraine. All parties to the conflict must take every measure possible to protect civilians. All parties and the international community must renew efforts to de-escalate this threat to international peace and security.

All our religious traditions call us to pray and work for peace. We join our voices and hands together. We must open our eyes to those who are suffering, and we cannot remain indifferent to the injustice this conflict has brought on the people of Ukraine and may bring on people of neighboring countries.

We call on all those involved—whether governments, movements or individuals—to repent of aggression and violence, and turn instead to the way of peace through dialogue. We also call upon the faithful people of our congregations and communities to pray for wisdom, peace and justice to prevail in Ukraine.

Oh Divine, most mighty, most merciful, our sacred stories tell us that you help and save your people. You are the fortress: may there be no more war. You are the harvest: may there be no more hunger. You are the light: may no one die alone or in despair. Oh Divine, most majestic, most motherly, grant us your life. Amen.
