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## **Epiphany of Our Lord**

The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

Second Lesson Ephesians 3:1-12

What had been hidden from previous generations is now made known through the gospel ministry of Paul and others. In Christ both Jews and Gentiles participate in the richness of God's promised salvation.

<sup>1</sup>This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—<sup>2</sup>for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, <sup>3</sup>and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, <sup>4</sup>a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. <sup>5</sup>In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: <sup>6</sup>that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

<sup>7</sup>Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. <sup>8</sup>Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, <sup>9</sup>and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; <sup>10</sup>so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. <sup>11</sup>This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, <sup>12</sup>in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.






## FAREWELL AND GODSPEED

### Treasured by God

A newborn baby often elicits "oohs" and "ahs" from its admirers and yet developmentally, may be doing nothing incredibly remarkable—only able to focus on objects only about 18 inches in front of its face and prone to stare at any shiny object. Nevertheless, a newborn is a miracle to behold, filled with wonder for the world around it and desiring nothing more than to be fed, held, rocked, nurtured, and loved.

The gifts of the magi direct us away from the cute, cuddly, cooing baby Jesus by pointing us to who Jesus really has come to be. The magi offer gold, a possession of kings; frankincense, used in ritual to indicate the presence of the deity; and myrrh, an oil used at the time of death as well as for anointing priests. By their gifts, the wise men reveal the identity of this child: the king before whom nations will bow, the anointed high priest of God, and the suffering servant who will die for the ones he has come to serve.

The "oohs" and "ahs" we offer as we celebrate the Epiphany of Our Lord are not simply for a cooing and cuddly baby Jesus but for a God who chooses to reveal God's love and mercy by taking human form. On this day, we celebrate that God's mercy is wider and deeper than we imagined and includes all people and all nations. All people—rich or poor, Gentile or Jew, straight or gay, male or female—are God's treasure, the precious ones for whom God is willing to die. What do we bring to honor our Lord before whom we bow? We bring the treasure of our lives poured out in praise of God and in service to others.

#### Epiphany of Our Lord

The celebration of Epiphany (which means in Greek the manifestation of God) on January 6 was important in the Eastern church from the fourth century and was variously connected with the stories of Jesus' birth, the visit of the magi, and Jesus' baptism. In some places it was a primary occasion for baptisms. In some cultures, Epiphany, "Three Kings Day," is the date of gift-giving. According to the three-year lectionary, Epiphany concludes attention to the infancy narratives with the story of the visit of the magi to the young Jesus, who is now residing in a house. The child Jesus is lauded as a king who is already showing himself forth to the nations.

#### Quote

The magi and Herod are a study in contrasts. While the magi, who are foreigners and do not share the same beliefs as Judeans, exercise reverence before that which is unknown to them, Herod responds to a perceived personal threat with hubris. Philosopher Paul Woodruff champions reverence as a virtue lost in our modern age, but whose exercise may, like the magi, transcend religious and cultural barriers: "We may be divided from one another by our beliefs, but never by our reverence. If you desire peace in the world, do not pray that everyone share your beliefs. Pray instead that all may be reverent" (*Reverence: Renewing a Forgotten Virtue*, Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2014, p. 11).

#### Images in the Readings

The main image is light. The star symbolizes a new light in the cosmos. The dawn pierces the thick darkness that has obscured our vision. During January, the northern hemisphere is experiencing a gradual lightening of the darkest time of the year, an appropriate time for the church to praise Christ as the light. This light shines again in the night of the Easter Vigil.

Made popular in hymns, pageants, and crèche sets are the gifts of the magi: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold denotes Jesus as a king. Frankincense and myrrh are sweet-smelling resins that were used in offerings to a god and at status burials. These are symbolic gifts for the divine king who has come to die. The birth narratives contain in them the death of Christ.

The ancient political idea was that monarchs were supposed to insure safety for their subjects. Christ, not Herod, is the true king who gives life, rather than death, to the people.

#### Comments from the Cloud of Witnesses

The star is seen by the magi; where Herod is, it is not seen; it is seen again where Christ is, and it shows the magi the way. Therefore this star is the way, and the way is Christ: for in the mystery of the incarnation, Christ is a star. For he himself is the bright and morning star. He shows us himself therefore by his own light.

#### Connections with Creation

The Orthodox celebration of Epiphany includes a procession outdoors to local bodies of water to commemorate the baptism of Christ in the Jordan. The blessing often involves a festive plunge into the water as if every body of water has become the promised river of life. (Do an internet image search for "Orthodox Epiphany water" for some stunning photos of the rite from around the world.) Martin Luther may well have drawn on this Orthodox all-water-becomes-holy-water theology when he wrote in his Flood Prayer that through the baptism of Christ, God "has sanctified and set apart the Jordan and *all water* for a saving flood." Traditionally on this day the entire Orthodox assembly would drink from the local stream or lake to celebrate its blessedness. Today, such an act—perhaps undertaken by a deacon or a priest—might be a poignant critique against the poisoning of God's free gift of water.

### The Readings in the Bible

#### Matthew 2:1-12

An important theme in the Gospel of Matthew, written perhaps in the mid-80s ce, is that Jesus is the messiah expected by the Hebrew Scriptures, the truest king of the Jews. In this narrative, Eastern magi, perhaps Zoroastrian priests, recognize the cosmic significance of the birth of Jesus and offer him gifts that are appropriate for royalty, while Herod recognizes that the destiny of Jesus is a threat to his power.

#### Isaiah 60:1-6

This poem from the beginning of the third part of Isaiah lauds the return of the Israelites to Jerusalem after the exile as if it were light arising on earth to rid the world of its darkness. Entire families will come from far, and non-Israelite peoples will recognize the glory of Jerusalem, bringing valuable gifts of gold and frankincense.

#### Ephesians 3:1-12

Ephesians, probably written by a disciple of Paul, is a general sermon about the meaning of Christ and life in the church that includes both Jews and Gentiles. A recurring image in the letter is the power of light over darkness. This reading speaks of God's grace as a "mystery" (the word recurs four times in this reading) that has shown forth in Christ Jesus.

## The Visit of the Magi

On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh. Matthew 2:11 (NIV)
