God, Please Don't Pull Up My Weeds Early

My brothers and sisters-in-Christ at St Francis Xavier, Happy Sunday! Today we have some powerful parables from Jesus that challenge us to look inward. We have the parables about the wheat and the weeds, the mustard seed, and the leavened bread.

Last week, we had the parable about sowing seeds on different kinds of soil. In the wheat and the weeds parable, Jesus tells us that the farmer, who is God, sowed good seed in his field. At night, an enemy sneaked in and scattered weeds through his whole crop.

As the crop grew, so did the weeds, all mixed up with the wheat.

What a mess.

The farmer's helpers asked him, "**Do you** want us to go and pull them up?" "No," he replied, "let them grow together until harvest."

Brothers and sisters, doesn't this represent our world? Our world today consists of wheat and weeds. Our world today consists of good and evil.

The good news today is about God's tolerance of evil.

While the farmers were ready to pull the weeds, God says, no, and gives the weeds a chance.

Where do you think you fall today? Are you a wheat or are you a weed?

I'd say...All of us are wheat and all of us are weeds.

We can see in ourselves both good and evil. In other words, wheat and weeds can be present in our hearts, in our thoughts, and in our actions.

- We are wheat when we are choosing to be loving and caring people.
- We are wheat when God's seed grows in us and transforms us.
- We are wheat, when, in our free will, we love God and follow him.

God gives us his seed in his word. For example, Jesus tells us in scripture to:

- Love one another as ourselves
- Take care of the least among us
- Go and make disciples of all nations
- Let our yes be yes and let our no be no
- Go first and be reconciled with our brother
- Confess our sins to one another and pray for one another, that we may be healed

When we do this, we are wheat. So, Deacon Darryl, when are we weeds?

- We are weeds when we choose to hurt rather than to love
- We are weeds when we don't make Jesus a priority in our lives
- We are weeds when we follow the world view when it's contrary to God's word.

Here's an example of what I mean: Jesus tells us to serve others, to put others first. But the world is telling us to put ourselves first. <u>We are number one</u>. That it's all about me, myself, and I. That we should want wealth and material things in life over helping others.

Jesus also tells us to forgive 7 x 70 times. The world tells us differently. The world tells us to get revenge. An eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth. The world tells us that we have to pay back. You've heard it said, "Don't get mad, get even." Or, what about people who live together intimately and are not married, in other words they are shacking up. The world

words, they are shacking up. The world tells them it's okay, God's word says differently.

What about people who know that we shouldn't kill, but they support abortion. The world says it's okay. Our legal system says it's okay.

These are but a few examples of weeds. *God, please don't pull up my weeds early* Again, aren't we glad God is patient with us when we are weeds?

Aren't we glad that He doesn't pull us up right after some of the bad choices we have made?

He gives us a chance until the harvest...

The gospel says, "Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, "First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn.""

God, please don't pull up my weeds early There was a man who was born in the 1100's. He was born into wealth. His father was in the clothing and textile business and owned lots of farmland. When he was a teenager, he was spoiled and spent money freely, drank, and had wild parties. (He sounds like the prodigal son) He dropped out of school at the age of 14 and was a rebellious teenager. At this point, would you consider him a wheat or weed?

His father wanted him to follow in his footsteps in the textile business, but instead he wanted to be a knight.

When he was 21, he joined the army and got captured in combat. It was while he was in prison that he heard the voice of God.

It was God, the sower, who planted the good seed in him.

God told him to rebuild the Christian Church and to live in poverty. When he got out of prison, he did just what God told him to do. He started working in the Church and he lived in poverty.

Brothers and sisters, do you know who I'm talking about yet? Well, I'll tell you in a minute.

So this young man, now in his early 20s, kept committed to rebuilding the Christian Church. He was now keeping God a priority in his life. He had devoted his life to Christ. He took some of his father's cloth and sold it, along with his horse, to help rebuild the Church.

That man was Francis of Assisi or today we know him as Saint Francis of Assisi. He became wheat.

He put God's purpose first above all else. He even put it above following his father's wishes that Francis help him with his textile business.


He did not let his father or wealth eclipse his service of his God. He truly became a disciple. At harvest time, he was put into the barn of heaven.

Today we are challenged by the words of Jesus' parables. We should reflect deeply on them and determine where we are. If we determine that we are not majority wheat, then how can we get there? We must pray and open our hearts to God's Word. We must ask God to reveal those weeds in our heart which are keeping us from Him. We can't get there on our own, we must have God's grace and mercy to help us. We must have his love and forgiveness.

And if we <u>are</u> majority wheat today, let us pray that God continues to keep us as wheat. God wants us all to take root from the good seed and grow into those beautiful people that God calls us to be. So I leave you with this question...how can we become wheat this week and ready ourselves for God's harvest?




