

WISDOM: THE GIFT OF A DISCERNING MIND AND THE ABILITY TO REALIZE WHAT OTHERS DO NOT

In my teen and youthful years, I was told many times: "If you know how to wash your hands, you will eat with the elders". I did not understand the meaning of this statement until later. At that time, it was one of those illogical statements. Afterall who eats with dirty hands. It was later that I realize this adage has but little to do with clean or dirty hands, and that it has to do with listening and discerning what only the elders can teach a humble person.

As I grew older, I was invited to sit at the feet of elders. On many an occasion, when issues were being dealt with, I could see some elders closing their eyes, others were in very pensive postures. There were some who interjected the discussions with questions and statements. It was the one listening with discerning ears who was able to pierce through to find proper solutions.

Today we hear the story of God offering Solomon anything he wanted. Solomon could have asked for power over his enemies or long life, as well as riches, but instead he requested an understanding heart to rule his people justly. This desire to serve God and his people well and with integrity was so pleasing to God that the request was quickly granted, and God threw in wealth and the promise of long life.

Solomon had recently ascended the throne of his father David. Mindful of his youthfulness and lack of experience as a leader and a ruler, he asked God to teach him how to act justly. He, in a way, asked to be allowed to sit at the feet of God and learn how to attend closely to his people and appreciate the complexities of their situations. He would then be able to go beyond logic and discern right from wrong. It is with this humility (knowing how to wash his hands) that God granted him wisdom, which is listening with discernment and the ability to realize what others do not.

The gospel reading helps us to realize what this wisdom of God is. Jesus preached in parables to help his disciples see things others never noticed. He would then explain, when asked, and help them look for deeper meaning of his story. It is not because they were ignorant people, but because they did not know what to look for. According to Matthew 4:17, Jesus began his public ministry shortly after his wilderness experience by proclaiming: "Repent, the Kingdom of heaven is at hand". He then went from town to town, synagogue to synagogue preaching the same message. This basic speech of Jesus was centered on this: "God is present right here and now in our midst and experiences". We cannot do anything to make God present. The only thing expected of us is to: "recognize that presence". To recognize this, we must discern and change our evil actions and resolve never to do them again. We must change our whole value system and turn our life around. It is only then that we can see the face of God and recognize him working in our lives.

Jesus uses such parables to help us change our frame of mind and alter how we process information and shift our focus on reality. It is in this discernment that we can realize the kingdom of God in our midst. Today he tells us that the kingdom of heaven is like a treasure in the field and a pearl of great value. They are extremely valuable, and we can actually own them. The question is how badly do you want to own them? They are for sale. Are you prepared to sell everything you have in order to buy them? If the answer is yes, then there is something greater value here, the kingdom of heaven. If we would sell all that we have to own perishable values, then why do you not sell all you have for the ability to bring to light God working in your life. This is more valuable than the treasure or pearl.

To help us appreciate that God's invitation to this investment is extended to all, despite where we are in our lives, we hear the story of the dragnet. Here Jesus tells us that we are all drawn into the same "net" i.e. the kingdom. The final sorting out is left to God and his angels. Patient tolerance must guide us to discern and practice our faith. God is present in our daily lives, even in the middle of our good and the bad encounters. God is always working in our lives. The Laws, Prophets and Writings all bear witness to what God has done for his people. Let us, therefore, like Solomon pray for an "understanding heart", something that is more infinite than power and wealth.



Responding to the Sin of Racism

U.S. Catholics Who Responded to Racism with Holiness

Julia Greeley, Servant of God

If you were born a slave, what would you do once you were freed? Could you forgive those who treated you cruelly? Do you know the story of Julia Greeley?

Julia Greeley was born a slave in Missouri, sometime between 1833 and 1848. As a child, a slave master, when beating Julia's mother, caught Julia's right eye with his whip causing her to lose it. Once freed, Julia eventually settled in Denver, Colorado. Despite all that she suffered, her forgiveness opened her heart to others. While supporting herself through work, she would spend her earnings helping poor families, many of whom were white. Realizing the shame people felt in being poor, Julia left her donations for them at night. She became a Catholic in 1880, and later joined the Secular Franciscan Order. When she died, hundreds of people came to pay their respects. Her limitless charity, selflessness, and devotion to Christ made Julia a model of mercy, so much so that her cause of canonization was opened in 2016.

If you have experienced racist assaults, either physical or verbal, forgiveness is not easy. Pray to Julia Greeley, model of mercy and charity, for healing, peace and forgiveness. For more information about the cause of canonization of Julia Greeley, go to juliagreeley.org.

Rev. Augustus Tolton, Servant of God


Have you ever felt alone or ignored in the Church? Do you feel called to serve others? Do you know the story of Fr. Augustus Tolton?


Fr. Augustus Tolton was the first recognized black Catholic priest in the U.S. A former slave, he was baptized and raised Catholic. He studied for the priesthood in Rome, since no American seminary would admit him due to his skin color. As a priest, he ministered to the black Catholic community in Quincy, Illinois. Known for eloquent sermons, generosity, and piety, he attracted both black and white Catholics to his parish. Later chased out of Quincy, he was welcomed by the Archdiocese of Chicago. He died in 1897. Despite his experiences, Fr. Tolton remained steadfast: "The Catholic Church deplores a double slavery – that of the mind and that of the body. She endeavors to free us of both. I was a poor slave boy but the priests of the Church did not disdain me." Fr. Tolton's cause of canonization was opened in 2015.

If you ever feel abandoned, pray to Fr. Tolton, who never waivered in his faith in Christ, despite experiencing the pain of being forsaken.
