The Rigors Of Being A Disciple of Christ

Has someone ever asked you to talk to another person about his/her conduct or behavior? Watch the News and you will acknowledge that our society needs some help. With our social problems getting out of hand, we look up to leaders in our various institutions, both social and religious. But they too seem to have lost their moral authority, and so very few, if any, listen to them. Those who make any attempt to speak against our socio spiritual evils are either ignored or rejected. For some, such rejection takes on an aggressive or violent nature.

The job of telling people that they need to repent is a tough one. People seldom respond in the affirmative. The messenger is either criticized or rejected. Some are even killed. The Bible is filled with such people, for example, John the Baptist, having preached repentance successfully ended up being beheaded. The Apostles, as well as many of the early Christians, were killed for preaching repentance and casting out demons and healing the sick.

For us who risk being disciples of Christ, St. Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, offers us the much-needed encouragement to bear up the rigors of the ministry of Jesus Christ. He interlaces the function of Christ as heavenly mediator into the praise of God as benefactor. He does so by using a series of ways to spell out the promise of salvation. Through the blood of Christ, we are not only loved and destined for adoption but also united with Christ through the preaching of the Gospel. This love affords us the encouragement and strength needed for the day-by day burdens and struggles of the ministry. United with Jesus's struggles, our trials become the means through which God is praised. So. sealed with the Holy Spirit and empowered by the abiding presence of Christ we are blessed with endless possibilities for the ministry.

Prophets are called to speak the truth where there is falsehood, and where justice has gone unchecked. Preaching repentance to those who are indifferent and disobedient and then trying to stir up in them the flame of caring and compassion brings pain and suffering. But God has always called and continues to call people like you and me to do the job. Some of our struggles and challenges are manifested in the life of the Prophet Amos (today's first Reading). As a Prophet he was called to preach the word of God to the people of Bethel and with this call he entered a minefield of obstacles.

Today we hear the story of the Prophet Amos who was ordered go to places he would rather not go and to serve people he would never choose to socialize with. But he was sent by God to try to direct God's people to live according to the covenant laws and be rejected.

Amos with his acceptance encountered the rigors of being a messenger of God. He was not appreciated. Mistaking him to be one of the professional prophets of his day, Amaziah, the high priest, told him to go back home to Judah and there make his living by prophesying. To this Amos protested that he was not a career prophet, and that he never had any intentions of becoming a prophet. He was living a nice peaceful life as a rancher and a farmer, but God called him to go to Bethel and warn the people to change from their sinful lives that was leading them to destruction. Amos would never have chosen to risk his personal safety by denouncing the idolatry and injustice that threatened Israel's covenant relationship with God. It was God who said to him: "go" and he set aside his livelihood, security, preferences and submitted to a mission and a future he had not planned.

Once he accepted his call and mission, Amos preached with the best of the prophets and accused them of placing less value on the poor than on sandals and comparing wealthy women to pampered cows. (No wonder the high priest Amaziah, who had the ears of the King wanted him out of the area).

Seven hundred years after the ministry of Amos, Jesus called his disciples to the same mission and sent them forth to places unknown to them. He sent them with minimum essentials: they were not to have a packed lunch or even a snack, no money or traveler's check, no suitcases or lodging reservations, or predetermined itinerary. They were only given the power over evil spirits and were told to rely totally on those to whom they have been sent.

Knowing that acceptance and rejection comes with the mission, Jesus offered those he sent a method to deal with both. That God's forgiveness and healing will be experienced by those who will accept and welcome Jesus' disciples; but those who reject the messengers and their message, will not experience any of these graces. For them even the street dirt on the messenger's feet would be shaken off as a testimony against them. The disciples are to entrust themselves to God and to grace and not secure a home of operation and a comfort zone from which to pursue a self-styled agenda.

As disciples of Jesus, we too are asked to "travel simple" with nothing to rely on except the companionship of another disciple and the providence of God in whose name we preach repentance as well as healing the sick with our words and actions. We are asked to be willing to leave our "sycamores, sheep and seashores" and allow our hearts to be vulnerable and be touched by God who offers us endless possibilities.
