The Wisdom of Letting Go

A story is told of a man who fell from a cliff. As he was rolling down, he started praying and bargained with God. His hand caught something like a stick, and he grabbed it. As he dangled on the branch and not being able to look down beneath him, he made a final promissory bargain with God. When he had resigned himself to whatever his end would be, he heard a whispering sound telling him to **“let go”**. This sound came to him three times. Knowing that there was no human where he was, he gathered all the strength he had left and yelled **“anyone else up there?”** Unbeknown to him, there was a big slab of rock just beneath his feet. Fear of the unknown had prevented him from trusting and letting go.

I spoke with a woman some time ago about one of her most treasured items. She told me it is her mother’s wedding ring. Her mother willed that to her. Notwithstanding the precious stones in the ring, the sentimental value alone is worth more than anything else. I again asked her if there is anything that can replace her mother’s wedding ring. To this she answered that would be her own wedding ring. Why? Because much as she loved her mother, this one would be her own. She seemed surprised when I said she has to let go that treasured ring in order to replace it with something more valuable since the two cannot occupy the same space.

This story of “letting go” is one of the central themes in the Judeo-Christian religion. When God asked Solomon to ask for anything, including wealth, a King’s scepter, pleasures and possessions (1Kg3:5), Solomon thought that there is no comparison between wealth and wisdom. He chose to let go of everything in order to be blessed by God with the gift of wisdom. He then challenged others to “let go” even of their most treasured possessions in order to save their life (1Kgs 3:16-27). The Wisdom reading today references what happened in 1Kings 3:6-14 where King Solomon offered sacrifice to God at the shrine in Gedeon. That night he had a dream in which God told him to pray for anything he wished for, and it would be given to him. Solomon, then a young King, asked for “an understanding heart to judge the people and to distinguish right from wrong”. God was pleased with him and not only granted his request but promised Solomon riches, glory and long life if he was faithful to the Law. This is the prudence that Wisdom gives to those who pray and plead for her above all else. She invites us to let go of everything including earthly wealth: riches, power, fame, houses and all perishable things, and allow God’s wisdom to direct our path. Speaking of letting go in the Bible, in John 20: 17, the Resurrected Christ told Mary of Magdala to **“stop holding on to me (Jesus).”** Jesus tells Mary to **“let me go”**, and instead bring this good news of my resurrection to the disciples.

Haven’t we all been adamant about holding on to our possessions and things we esteem valuable, even to the point of offering excuses why we need to hold on to them? When it comes to Jesus’ commands, how well do we argue that Jesus

did not literally mean what he said? Sometimes we argue that Jesus’ statement about letting go simply means detachment from worldly materials, and not to literally give them up. Even though we have heard the statement about letting go our possessions over and over again, we do not feel compelled to sell our possessions and give the income to the poor. Maybe deep down in our hearts we believe that we can find a way to do something without really changing Jesus’ words.

Today, with the story of the Rich Man, Jesus challenges us to let go. Desiring to inherit eternal life, the rich man approached Jesus and asked what he should do. Like many, he thought by keeping the Law, he was well prepared for the Kingdom that Jesus has come to preach. He may have expected a congratulatory speech. But Jesus pressed this rich man toward holiness in a way he had not anticipated. Jesus challenged him to let go of his possessions by selling them and giving the proceeds to the poor, and then “come follow me” unencumbered and free. Jesus suggests that any undue attachment to possessions might make it difficult for someone to be grasped by the hand of God. So, he challenges anyone who comes to him to loosen his grip on what he has and follow him unhinged.

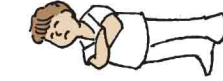
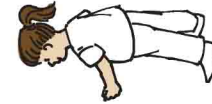
The rich man’s story is like our own. The man ran to Jesus and knelt before him. He showed his eagerness and reverence worthy of a disciple. He was a just and an upright man who had grown up in faithful observance of the Law. Jesus acknowledged his goodness with love and called him to go beyond the customary requisite for holiness by asking him to let go his possessions and move beyond by forgoing the earthly security. He was to entrust himself and his future completely to Him (Jesus). Jesus did not ask the rich man to put his possessions in trust and come follow him. He was asking him to risk all and entrust himself and his future to Jesus.

The wisdom of letting go involves making a life-altering choice that benefits not only yourself but others as well. Jesus reacts to the rich man and his disciples by suggesting that the ability to let go is not easy but a work of grace for those willing to risk it. On the human level, this seems impossible, but with God it is possible. As Jesus tells us, the commitment to discipleship is positively rewarded in terms of family, friends and fellowship.

Like the man hanging on the cliff by the branch, and the woman ready to risk her mother’s wedding ring with expensive stones, all we must do is to let go. Solomon let go of the world allurements of wealth and riches and he got more than he could ever imagine. Mary of Magdala had to let go holding on to Jesus in order to be able to be the first to proclaim the resurrected Christ. As scripture tells us, the rich man could not let go of his possessions for they were many. He went away sad. How about you?

“But many who are first will be last
