



# Question:

What is the history behind the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross?

# Answer:

Emperor Constantine's mother, Helena, is credited with having discovered the true cross around 330. She traveled to the Holy Land and uncovered the places associated with Jesus' life. Legend has it that Helena uncovered three crosses but was not able to detect the true cross until each of them was laid on a leper. Only one of them cured the leper, proving it to be the true cross. A great church was built at the site, and soon various portions of the cross were sent to other churches as relics to be venerated.

The day after the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, **September 14**, 335, the actual cross was displayed for veneration. Egeria, a woman traveler to Jerusalem around the year 386, kept a diary that has survived. She tells of the unique veneration of the wood of the cross that took place on Good Friday, something maintained ritually to this very day.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross focuses on the gift of love that Jesus manifested by his total gift of self, offered for all. The cross, the ultimate form of capital punishment in its day, has become for us the ultimate symbol of love and triumph over evil and death. ©LPi



# Marked by Suffering Who do you say that I am?

What is your favorite story about Jesus Christ? How would you describe him to others from your own experience? How would you behave if someone were to tell you that your understanding of Jesus as: Savior, understanding friend, a merciful and forgiving person, a great teacher, a powerful healer, a good shepherd, the Sacred Heart, an advocate for the poor, an eternal king, the Son of God, and a great storyteller does not paint a complete picture of Jesus?

Rationally speaking, none of us like pain and suffering. Thus, if someone were to tell you that the correct description of Jesus is that he is a suffering servant who requires anyone who wants to be his follower to be like him, a suffering servant, would you accept it? I do not believe that any of us wants to be defined by suffering. We will most certainly reject the notion that we can only get to know God through suffering.

The Prophet Isaiah reminds us today of what we hear on every Palm Sunday and Wednesday of the Holy Week. The Prophet describes to us a servant whom God has chosen from before his birth to, through suffering, be a light to Israel, and the nations' and his people. The Prophet in vivid details describes the suffering that this unidentified servant would endure for the sake of his ministry. For him to speak words that would rouse his colleagues, he would endure their rejection. In establishing justice for the nations, he would let himself be beaten and mocked. To be a light to the nations and bring freedom to prisoners, he must accept being spat upon. To bring healing and wholeness to the blind, the lame and the deaf, he must set his face like flint and give himself over to the wrath of those he has come to save

This suffering servant is identified at Caesarea Philippi in the person and through the mission of Jesus Christ. With divine assistance Peter identified Jesus as that person. Jesus then provides the template for understanding what a suffering servant means. But the problem of a suffering Messiah made Peter and many people lose faith in God and in Jesus Christ. Without divine assistance Peter could not have identified Jesus as Christ, the suffering Messiah. Even when Jesus instructed Peter and those who were with him that the Messiah must suffer if he is to fulfil the role identified by Isaiah, Peter could not accept it. He rejected it, and for that Jesus reprimanded him.

Jesus insisted that His followers must be identified in the same way. Through suffering, his disciples would become who they really are. Suffering that Jesus prescribed for His disciple is not suffering for suffering's sake. This suffering brings unity with Jesus and effects redemption.

In his book "*Civilization and Its Discontents*" (1989), Sigmund Freud suggests that three types of suffering threaten us: a) physical suffering which comes from our own body and ends overtime. It does not do more than bring pain and anxiety; b) Suffering from the external world, which is the overwhelming and merciless forces of destruction; and c) finally, suffering from our relationships with other people. The latter suffering is the most painful. It is this suffering that the Prophet Isaiah talked about, and Jesus realized it. Jesus immersed himself completely in human condition and experienced every aspect of this suffering in order to translate his experience into an eloquent expression of love. Our suffering, when identified this way, makes us Christ's own.

So, suffering for the sake of Christ means being marked by what the Prophet Isaiah said about the suffering servant. This means losing our life by getting rid of our selfishness, pride, negative attitudes, and the unholy side of ourselves that blocks our closeness to God through Christ. To answer the question: "*who do you say I am?*" is not a matter of giving the right answer. Rather it is getting to know Jesus Christ better and not trying to make him into who we want him to be as Peter attempted to do. It is living and abiding in God's word that is expressed though the living experience of Jesus Christ.



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
