

Rejoice in the Lord!

Third Sunday of Advent, Year A Is 35:1-6a, 10/ Ps 146:6-7, 8-9, 9-10/ Jas 5:7-10/ Mt 11:2-11

Today is the third Sunday of Advent, also called *Gaudete* or Rejoicing Sunday. This is the

midpoint of the season, and all Christians are encouraged to keep up their Advent spiritual preparations and never lag in zeal, for very soon the Lord will come.

The entrance antiphon emphasizes the joyful note by stating, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near" (Phil 4:4-5). It is my prayer, therefore, that the Lord will fill us with his joy, in spite of the many challenges we may be going through.

In the First Reading from the prophet Isaiah, the prophet talks about the deliverance of the people of ancient Israel. It will be a period of great rejoicing, fruitfulness and restoration. The prophet says, "The desert and the parched land will exult; the steppe will rejoice and bloom. They will bloom with abundant flowers and rejoice with joyful song" (35:1-2).

Desert and parched land signify hardship, trial and suffering. The deliverance of ancient Israel would be so complete that it would encompass the whole of creation. In other words, the whole of creation would be redeemed. What a glorious day it would be!

Considering the fact that these prophetic utterances were made during the period of exile of the people, it would be possible that there were those who doubted its realization. Such people could be described as feeble, weak and fearful. We cannot blame them, because the life of servitude was one of hardship and terror.

To such people, the Lord through the prophet says, "Strengthen the hands that are feeble, make firm the knees that are weak, say to those whose hearts are frightened: Be strong, fear not!" (35:3-4) These words of encouragement are relevant to us too. We hear of many bad news every day. We have our own tragedies to deal with. We may be frightened. That notwithstanding, the Lord says, "Be strong, fear not."

The future redemption and restoration of ancient Israel would be so radical that, things unheard of, or never imagined possible, would be accomplished. The prophet says about that day, "...the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lame leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing" (35:5-6). What a glorious day it would be!

Indeed, that future of redemption will be a joyous one. The prophet says those redeemed will enter Zion singing, crowned with everlasting joy. What is more: "...they will meet with joy and gladness; sorrow and mourning will flee" (35:10). Believing in these prophetic words, we can say again, "What a glorious day it would be!"

As we look forward to the future redemption of the whole of humanity, one virtue we would all have to cultivate is patience. This is because we may be tempted to think that the Lord is delaying in coming and begin to lose focus as people of God.

In the Second Reading from the Letter of St James, we are told, "Be patient, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord" (5:7). The farmer is presented as an example of patience to us. When he plants, he is patient and waits for the precious fruit of the earth. In like manner, St James says, "You too must be patient" (5:8).

Another great figure who had to wait patiently for the Lord's coming without losing hope is John the Baptist. He had his own challenges in life. At the end of the day, he was imprisoned by Herod for telling him it was not right for him to marry his brother Philip's wife (cf Matthew 14:3-4).

While in prison, this place of desolation, comparable to a desert situation, John, in the Gospel Reading of today, sent his disciples to Jesus with the question, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" (Matt 11:3). John has always proclaimed the coming of the Messiah, and at this moment of his life, he needed some words of certainty as he looks forward to his coming.

The beautiful thing about this story is that Jesus did not give a direct answer of either yes or no. He rather gave out some cues. He said to John's disciples, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regains their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them" (Matt 11:4-5).

Certainly, John knew the signs that will usher in the Messianic age. The prophets foretold it, as evidenced in the First Reading from the prophet Isaiah. There is no doubt that when this message is carried to John the Baptist in prison, his heart will rejoice because he has lived to see the glory of God fulfilled in the life and ministry of Jesus. This joy of the Lord will sustain him to face the harsh conditions of prison life.

It is our prayer that as we also look forward to the coming of the Lord, at Christmas and ultimately at the end of time, he will continue to fill our hearts with his joy. That will be our consolation and sustenance as we go through our own desert-like situations. I join the prophet to say, "Do not grieve, for the joy of the Lord is your strength" (Neh 8:10). May God give you joy and peace.

Sisters of St. Michael the Archangel

The Sisters of St. Michael the Archangel are active female Religious Congregation, founded in 1986 in Nigeria. The Sisters provide direct care to the poor and the sick; they provide place of haven for abandoned and elderly in need. Their healing comes through spiritual and physical care with a loving sense of home and family. They provide shelter and accommodations including food and other materials, and financial assistance for abandoned and motherless babies/children. The Sisters go about caring for the sick and infirm as Jesus did in towns and villages through mobile clinics, they also offer free and cheap health care services for the less privileged who cannot afford to go to hospitals. They provide education for the less privileged children in elementary and high schools. They also assist young women in vocational school. In addition, the Sisters work to bring the gospel of Christ to all especially in remote areas by involving in pastoral work in different parishes in more than 12 dioceses in Nigeria. This includes teaching Catechism to Catechumens and helping to prepare catechists; they also serve as director of Religious education in parishes and at the Diocesan level. They are also involved in organizing basic Christian communities among parishioners to strengthen their faith.
