Finding Our Personal Truth

Happy Gaudete Sunday! Today is Gaudete Sunday or Rejoicing Sunday. Pope Francis calls it "Sunday of Joy". Why joy? Because our expected guest has almost arrived.

And brothers and sisters, we can have joy today. We can have joy in knowing that we are unconditionally loved. And who unconditionally loves us? Jesus! He loves us and nothing like...sin, sickness, failure, emotional distress, or even death...can take that love away. This is joy.

And our joy can be present even during sadness, even during the turmoil in our country today. We have war all around us in the world in Israel, in the Ukraine, and conflict between China and Taiwan. It's a lot. But our "Sunday of Joy" today reminds us to think of all the good things that life has given us.

We can, during this season of Advent, joyfully reflect on our annual celebration of Christ being born and we can anticipate Christ's victorious return. We can also introspect on our where we are in this journey on earth. Who am I? (as was asked in today's Gospel from John)

#### Finding our personal truth

Brothers and sisters, children are great with questions. My daughter Brionne asks tons of them. As any parent knows they can ask the most profound questions in the simplest of ways. We all ask questions because, at heart, we have an instinct for seeking and searching after truth. This is a life-long search. We can never get to the point in this life where we can say, 'I now have the total truth.' The gospel declares that God is truth—and God is always beyond us. We can never fully grasp God with our minds or our hearts. Yet we have to be faithful to the search for truth, even if along the way we find ourselves making painful discoveries that involve letting go of long-held and cherished convictions. We keep trying to come closer to the truth, the truth about our world, about each other, about ourselves as individuals, and about God. We keep questioning in the hope that our questioning will bring us closer to the truth.

In our search for our own personal truth, two of the big questions that drives us are, 'Who am I?' and 'Why am I doing what I am doing?' We seek after our identity, in the broadest sense of that term, and we try to clarify for ourselves the ultimate purpose that drives all we do and say. In today's gospel, those two big questions are put to John the Baptist by

the religious authorities, "Who are you?" and "Why then do you baptize...?" In answer to the first question, John began by declaring who he was not. He was clear that he was not the Christ, the Messiah. John did not try to be more than he was. Later on, in the gospel of John, using an image drawn from a wedding celebration, he would say of himself that he was not the bridegroom, only the friend of the bridegroom who rejoices at the bridegroom's voice. In today's gospel John declares himself to be the voice crying in the wilderness; he is not the Word, only the voice; he is not the light, only the witness to the light. When John was asked why he was doing what he was doing, why he was baptizing, he declared that he baptized to make known the 'one who stands among you, unknown to you.' He did what he was doing to open people's eyes to the person standing among them, to the Messiah who was in their midst without their realizing it. There was a great light shining among them that many were unaware of, and John had come to bear witness to that light. John did what he did because of who he was. The answer to the question, "Why then do you baptize...?" flowed from the answer to the more fundamental question, "Who are you?"

"Who are you?" is a question we can answer at many different levels. We can simply give our name or give our parents' names; we can answer it by giving our professional qualifications, or by naming the role or the position we have in life. Yet, the deepest level, the most fundamental level, at which we can answer that question is the spiritual level. Who am I at that deepest, most spiritual, level of my being? Who am I before God? Who is God calling me to be? Here, John the Baptist, the great Advent saint, can be of help to us. He articulates for us who each one of us is in virtue of our baptism, who God is calling us to be. No more than John the Baptist, we are certainly not the Messiah. We are not the light. (Although we can be 'the light' as Christ's disciple, Amen.) We know only too well the areas of darkness in our lives and in our hearts. However, like John the Baptist, we are a witness to the Light. Even though we are all far from perfect, we are, nonetheless, called to be a witness to Christ.

John the Baptist says in today's gospel, "but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me..." The Lord stands among all of us, but he remains unknown to many. Our calling is to make him known, to allow him to shine forth in our world through our lives. John spoke of himself as a voice crying in the wilderness. John used his voice to make known the light. We too are asked to use our voice to make Christ known. It does not mean that we stand on the corner of Reed Road & Cullen and preach. Rather we use the gift of communication that we have, the gifts of speech and writing, to proclaim the person of Christ, his world view, his values and his attitudes. In what we communicate and how we communicate it, we allow the Lord to communicate through us. Who we are as witnesses to the light, as the voice for the Word, shapes how we live and explains why we live the way we do. The answer to the question, "Who are you?" grounds the answer to the question, 'Why are you doing what you are doing?' Advent is a good time to reclaim our fundamental identity, our Christ identity. If Jesus is to be born anywhere today, it will be in each one of us.



# JOYFUL CELEBRATION Deacon ordained for Josephite ministry By Susan McInerney

African and Gospel hymns wove a tapestry of praise Dec. 3 at Church of the Incarnation in Washington, D.C. The congregation clapped and sang. The joyful sounds anticipated the ordination of Josephite Brother Dominic Tochi Njoku to the transitional diaconate. The liturgical celebration marked the final step before Deacon Njoku is expected to be ordained a Josephite priest next year, destined to serve the African American community in the United States. The new deacon said he felt called to minister in the United States rather than his native



Nigeria. "I feel strongly convinced that God wants me to not only be a priest but a missionary priest," Deacon Njoku told The Josephite Harvest, "and the diaconate ordination is a step toward being a missionary priest as a Josephite." The theme of the ordination Mass and the celebration to follow flowed from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, when the Lord asks, "Whom shall I send? Who will go for us?" And the prophet answers, "Here I am; send me!" (Isaiah 6:8). During the ordination liturgy, Deacon Njoku lay prostrate in front of the sanctuary while members of the congregation chanted the Litany of the Saints. Bishop Ricard laid his hands on the new deacon, the "essential act" of the sacrament of Holy Orders. Deacon Njoku was dressed in vestments for the office of the diaconate. Bishop Ricard drew on the Book of Numbers in his homily, noting that while the Lord gave a portion of the Promised Land to 11 of the 12 Tribes of Israel, Levi and his sons received no portion of the land. Why? Because the Lord was their portion. "Which is why we take these steps, so that our mind, our heart, our intention, our imagination, our desire will be for the Lord," he told Deacon Njoku and the congregation. "Our portion is the Lord, the Lord alone." The bishop called on the congregation to pray that the Holy Spirit will come to Deacon Njoku and enable him "to live this life." While his family overseas wasn't able to attend his ordination, they were able to watch via the church's YouTube channel, said Stefanie Miles, a friend of Deacon Njoku who was in charge of making the event available on social media. Deacon Njoku did not always plan to become a priest. Originally, he wasn't open to it, he said. "I went to minor seminary but at some point, I was thinking about going to university to study accounting," he recalled. But in prayer he felt God was calling him back to the seminary. He learned about the Josephites from Sister Lucy of the Daughters of Charity of the Most Precious Blood, who was in his parish, St. Michael in Imo State in eastern Nigeria. "She was like an elder sister to me," he said. And that is the thread that runs through his studies, parish life and education. There is less talk of people being 'friends' and more talk of people being brothers, sisters, mothers and fathers, daughters and sons in the Lord. In his ministry as a deacon, the newly ordained clergyman said he's looking forward to serving the people of God by handing down the deposit of faith through the rich spirituality of the African American community. "There is a rich way of communicating with God that I can relate to as a Catholic and an African," he said. "There is something about us as the people of God regardless of race, culture and background that helps us remain Catholic. There us something in African American culture and spirituality that helps us to build up the body of Christ as Catholics." After the ordination, Josephites, friends and supporters gathered for a celebration. Myra Miles, a parishioner at Church of the Incarnation, said, "He's an ideal seminarian. In him you see humility and perseverance. He is good at listening, and he is approachable."

Deacon Dominic is currently assigned to serve at Corpus Christi Epiphany Church and St. Augustine High School, both in New Orleans.

John said that Jesus would come after him.










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
