## Winter Freeze Tips

Protect pipes:

Insulate: Wrap pipes that run through attics, crawl spaces, unheated garages, or outside walls. You can also use insulated foam pipe sleeves or insulating tape.

Drip faucets: Set faucets to drip to prevent pipes from freezing and bursting.

Locate the main water shutoff valve: Know where the main water shutoff valve is located and how to turn it off. (*Hardware stores sell water meter keys.*)

Protect plants:

Bring potted plants inside.

Cover outdoor plants with frost cloth against a hard freeze.

#### **Add Winter Color by Planting Annuals Now**

Add winter color to your flowerbeds—it's not too late! Cheerful pansies and colorful violas thrive in North Texas winters, while tall, vibrant snapdragons add striking vertical interest. Find these hardy annuals at Calloway's Nursery in Lewisville or Green Acres in Irving. Planting now is an easy, rewarding way to brighten your home and stay active!

#### **Are You Preparing for Spring Yet?**

Now is the time to prepare your flowerbeds for spring. If you still have builder-grade shrubs, contact local landscapers for quotes to remove dead or unwanted plants. By late February, landscapers get busy with spring and summer projects. Many neighbors have replaced shrubs with flowerbeds that attract bees, butterflies, and beneficial insects, enhancing both their homes' curb appeal and property value. A refreshed flowerbed boosts your home's value and benefits the neighborhood—win-win!

#### **Do Your Part in Watering Responsibly**

During cooler winter months, your lawn needs less water than in summer. In the Dallas area, we often go weeks without rain, but your landscape still requires watering. Save on your water bill by checking your irrigation system to ensure it's running efficiently and not watering right before or after rainfall. Don't forget to water your home's foundation to prevent cracks, but use less water than in summer. Take action now to reduce your water bill.
