Winter Freeze Tips

Protect pipes:

Insulate: Wrap pipes that run through attics, crawl spaces, unheated garages, or outside walls. You can also use insulated foam pipe sleeves or insulating tape.

Drip faucets: Set faucets to drip to prevent pipes from freezing and bursting.

Locate the main water shutoff valve: Know where the main water shutoff valve is located and how to turn it off.

Protect plants:

Bring potted plants inside.

Cover outdoor plants with frost cloth against a hard freeze..

Why Plant Perennials? It's the Water

Here are some ways to help with the water shortage in North Texas:

- Water early: Water in the morning to reduce evaporation and avoid windy days.
- 2. Plant drought-resistant varieties: Choose plants that require less water.
- 3. Use native plants: Redesign with Texas natives for better water efficiency and lower maintenance.

These steps can help conserve water and create a more sustainable landscape.
