Last year's Pumpkin Festival drew huge crowds, and this year, we have even more parking available!

Pumpkin festival is bigger, better than ever

The word is out about the success of our Country Pumpkin Festivals and we are expecting nearly 200 vendors on both days this year. We were so overwhelmed by the response last year, we had a lot of surprises – including a shortage of parking. Thanks to our neighbors, we'll have plenty of planned parking this year (and more portable toilets, as well). The East lot will be handicapped parking only, so either drive to the lot just past the big red barn (gravel drive) or look across the street where you can find parking spaces.

Once again, admission and parking are free. There will be free face painting and craft bags for the kids; free hayrides (it's a bumpy but fun ride), games like pumpkin checkers and pumpkin tic tac toe! No pumpkin is more than \$5 and there will be hundreds of them again – all sizes and shapes.

This will be a perfect time to start Christmas shopping because there are some absolutely fantastic handmade items for everyone on your list. There will be several food vendors this year as well as hot dogs, chili, hot and cold cider, soft drinks and bottled ice tea and water in the big red barn. The popular freshly popped popcorn will be for sale and there will be an apple dipping station if you want caramel (or other flavors) apples.

Sales of the items in the barn help keep Heritage Farm running. And proceeds of the festival go toward our effort to bring a log cabin that was once on the underground railroad to the property. The farmhouse museum will be open both days and our guides will love to show you around.

There are two special events on Sunday – at 11 a.m. the young dancers from Ignite Dance Studio are scheduled to perform in the barn. At noon Sunday, our very first Canine Costume Contest will be held. Emcee, 8-year-old Gracie Nazel, will introduce the dogs and their humans on the tarmac behind the barn with plenty of grassy seating right below so everyone can see.

Thanks to BilJac Foods Inc., we will have 4-oz. snack packs for the first 50 dogs and two 14—pound bags of dog food for the winners of the 16 and younger-17 and older division. Each first place handler will receive a \$20 gift certificate from Kelly's Café. And there might be some other prizes (but who knows? It's our first year).

Registration for the costume contest begins at 11:30 – there will be a table at the side of the barn where you can sign up. Bring your cameras!

Farmers market season ends

The farmers market season is winding down and the market at Heritage Farm is no exception. The last market was Oct. 8 and we are happy to report this has been a banner year. There have been lots and lots of new produce and food vendors as well as a huge variety of arts and crafts.

Crow Hill Farm from Shreve Ohio has filled a spot we've wanted to provide since we began four years ago – meat and cheese. As an all-natural farm, the grass-fed animals that come from Crow Hill antibiotic, hormones. GMOs, and tenderizer free – and it is delicious.

Many of our regular customers have become fans of the maple flavored breakfast sausages and smoked, nitrate free bacon that actually tastes like good old-fashioned bacon. They have a variety of cheeses made at the farm right next to Crow Hill. They also have fresh produce in season and bakery.

We were going to miss them so much, we're happy to learn they have decided to deliver during the winter months. So, if you are spending more than \$50, they will bring your order to you. For these months you can order ground beef, whole roasting chickens, one-inch thick pork chops, bacon, bratwurst, maple breakfast links, Hawaiian bratwurst (yep, pineapple), mild Italian, smoked sausage and a special blend with salt, pepper and sage.

Crow Hill will be at the Pumpkin Festival at Heritage Farm 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14 and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Oct. 15. Stop by, give their products a try and get an order sheet. If you miss it, you can call them at 330-317-1901.

In addition to some great new vendors, many of our favorites from the very first year have been here every week – and we have been so lucky to have wonderful weather every Sunday.

April Barczyz and her parents, Ed and Sandy, have a huge variety of items from homegrown fresh veggies to varieties of garlic and potatoes to handmade pasta and delicious bread. For the second year in a row, Sandy has brought plants to the farm during the last few weeks and takes donations which she donates to the Historical Society. This year, we will use the funds raised to pay for winterizing our new children's garden plants and trees.
