Bell Tower is set in its forever home

BRUNSWICK, Ohio – The old bell has a new home.

In 1852, a 644-pound bell was forged in Troy N.Y. for the Brunswick Methodist Church. When the building was sold to the Disciples of Christ, the bell came along with it.

After 184 years in Brunswick, that congregation, now the First Christian Church, disbanded, and those who remained as members donated the bell to the Brunswick Area Historical Society.

With funds donated to help build a tower, Historical Society President, Carl Bilski, took on the task of creating a tower for the bell and preserving it for future generations. The pandemic hit shortly after the donation and planning turned to action as the prices of steel were rising dramatically.

Bilski bought steel beams and built the tower in his workshop and then brought it to Heritage Farm where it was stored over the winter.

With the help of Dave Chidsey of Chidsey Towing, who moved the bell; Brad Hoffman of Hoffman Tree Services who lifted the tower; Michael O'Keefe of O'Keefe Concrete and Bilski's team of Michael Gable and Mark Salmonski, the bell and tower were lifted into place on a concrete pad near the new Old School Museum on the farm. Be sure to stop by to see it.

Now add the bricks

Once again, Carl Bilski came up with the idea of engraved bricks surrounding the steel beams on the tower. Each brick will have the name of a person, church, company, graduating class, organization, or family. The money generated from the sale goes toward the completion of the Old School Museum.

Order your brick today

To help fund improvements and maintenance of the Old School Museum, the Bell Tower and Heritage Farm & Museum, please purchase a commemorative engraved brick which was salvaged from Edwards or Visintainer Middle Schools. Deadline for ordering is Aug. 31. Your brick will proudly become a part of the Brunswick Historical Society Bell Tower and Brunswick Area History.

Heritage Farm has a long, storied history

In 1817, three Berdan brothers arrived in Brunswick from New York City. They were Peter, John and Abram Berdan. Their father, David Berdan Jr. purchased this property in 1818. But David, a world traveler on his own, never visited the property he had purchased.

Peter was the youngest. Records show him marrying Sarah Simmons. Peter's wife came from New York City and was considered "the neatest woman in town."

The story goes she returned to New York to visit her parents, the Berdan house burned to the ground. Research notes there was a fire on the property in 1839. But, as the tale goes, "her fine neighbors helped the family to be reestablished."

Abram became clerk of Brunswick Township and John was a Justice of the Peace.

John married another early Brunswick resident, Pamela Freese. John, however, was a merchant at heart. He and his family moved to Toledo, where he gained a popular reputation as an astute and honest businessman. When the city of Toledo was incorporated in 1837, John Berdan was elected its first mayor. He was re-elected in 1838. In 1839, the county named him an associate justice of the Court of Common Pleas for Lucas County, where he served until his early death in 1841.
