## Updates from the <br> Assistance Dog World!

## PADs and ESD

sychiatric Assistance Dogs (PAD), are different from Emotional Support Dogs (ESD).
Psychiatric Assistance Dogs are dogs that are trained to assist with diagnosed mental health conditions such as: posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), schizophrenia, depression, anxiety or bio-polar. ESD - emotional support dogs are pets hat provide emotional supports to individuals. These dogs are not necessarily trained to do a specific job.
In Australia, PAD are covered by the same laws as other assistance dogs such as guide dogs or hearing dogs. However ESD are not. (Lloyd et al., 2019)

## Assistance dogs in Japan

wresearch in Japan has found that assistance dogs can help their humans to have:

## neased independence

- Have better social interactions - making new friends Decreased assistance from others
Increased self esteem
Higher confidence
Decreased anxiety and stress

However, they also found that actually having an assistance dog doesn't always help people. In some cases this is for their daily needs, the costs of having a dog, house cleaning, travel arrangements, poor match between ow and dog, lack of skills and refusal to obey certain commands, public people's petting interference and challenges for access as well as unwanted attention.
They also found that for self-trained dogs, there's added advantages. You can choose a favourite breed, strengthen the relationship by raising the dog from a puppy.
However self-trained failure rate is very high!
At times dogs are not suitable, but as they are people's pet dogs, they are too emotionally invested to make a appropriate decision
Something we maybe don't think about is that it isn't just the client who benefits from the assistance dog. There can be impacts for family members too.
More than half of the participants in Yamamoto and Hart's study indicated that their family members went out of the They said they had a secure feeling knowing that the dog could help their family members in their absence.

## Get involved in research

Hi, my name is Jamie Arathoon, and I am a PhD researcher from the University of Glasgow. I have been doing my research with Dog AID for the past year now. My research aims to explore the human-animal elationship, how care is provided, and experienced, by both human and dog, how training is practiced, and how human-assistance-animal partnership influences health and wellbeing. A lot has happened over he period of my research. I have met some fantastic people and visited some excellent training classes, exploring all the hard work clients and trainers have been doing. Of course, the pandemic has been a big impact on my research and things have moved online where possible.


So, I am writing today to extend an invite to both clients and trainers who might want to get involved in an online or telephone interview. This can be organised to fit your timing and can be done on a platform of your choosing. interviews have generally lasted between 60 and 90 minutes in the past and I can provide examples of the questions beforehand to ease any anxieties. If you feel like you want to participate but would not like to talk then I also have an online survey set up for clients here (link available via email for paper version of magazine). Tinsel can be eaten like spaghetti... Unlike spaghetti, however, tinsel bunches and twists within intestines, requiring immediate attention from your vet. Non-chocolate tree decorations can also be tempting to our furry friends! As well as presenting a choking hazard, baubles can shatter and cut.

Remember, some other foods (including Christmas treats) can be hazardous, even toxic to your pet - Onions (in stuffing and gravy), Christmas Cake, Alcohol, Artificial Sweeteners, Christmas pudding and Mince Pies, Grapes and
Raisins, Nuts (Macadamias in particular) and Turkey bones to name but a few. It's also worth remembering not to 'over-indulge' your pets... it can lead to stomach upsets.

## ANY OTHER BUSINESS - Q\&A

TRUSTEES' SKILLS
What are the current Trustees skills and qualifications? The Board conducted a Skills Audit in July 2020. Over half of the trustees have lived experience of disability and of completing Dog A.I.I. training of their dog. The current trustees have strong knowledge, skills or experience in areas such as Assistance Dog Training, Charity Governance, Facilitating Meetings, Finance, Fundraising, IT/Systems, Leadership and Team Development.
The Skills Audit identified the gaps that the Board is seeking of fill through the trustee recruitment and these are detailed in the 2020 Trustee Recruitment document. These skills include: Access and Disability Rights; Charity/Employment Law; Equality, Diversity and Inclusion; HR/Training; Marketing and R; Monitoring and Evaluation; Safeguarding; and Volunteer Management. The Board also needs to recruit a new Treasurer as an experienced trustee is currently covering this role on an interim basis.

What has been done by current trustees to fill these gaps as a matter of urgency? Including outside of the charity.
The Trustees launched a campaign to recruit new trustees with elevant skills and experience to meet these gaps. There are four vacancies: one Treasurer, one Trainer Representative (to and experience as identified in the 2020 Skills Audit.
One new trustee has been recruited with skills and experience in HR/Training and IT/Systems, as well as governance and safeguarding experience through her role as a School Governor.
The vacancies have been advertised on trustee/volunteer recruitment sites and targeted advertising for the skills and expertise needed, e.g. Honorary Treasurers Forum for the Treasurer role.

TRUSTEE PERFORMANCE AND MONITORING
Can the current board outline their individual achievements during the last 12 months \& their proposed individual contribution to the running of our charity going forward? The Board of Trustees acts collectively, as required by the Charity Commission, and reports on the charity's achievements and development each year at the AGM and through the annual report. Each trustee also provides support and guidance relevant to their expertise and experience and the Board includes elected representatives for the Clients and Trainers. The Board has managed Dog A.I.D. through a difficult period during a global pandemic, which restricted training and work with clients as well as events and community fundraising, orocess. The trustees have acted in the charity's best interests, worked with the Charity Commission to review and update policies as needed and with Assistance Dogs UK on safe working protocols for Covid-19. The Chair's report has outlined the collective work of the Board, the staff team and volunteers, The Board reviews governance using the good practice standards in the Charity Governance Code for smaller charities, which includes Board effectiveness, and are working towards were there are gaps.
As a charity do the Trustees practice the 'Nolan Principles' recommended for Public Office?
Yes, the trustees aim to adhere to the seven principles of public life as set out in the Nolan principles.
What measures are in place to formally monitor the performance of all Trustees including the Chair who is
answerable to the Members for the management of the board?

The Board is accountable through its annual reports and the AGM. The charity has two elected Client Representatives and one elected Trainer Representative as trustees. The

Board complies with statutory accounting and reporting Board complies with statutory accounting and reporting
requirements, seeks advice from the Charity Commission when needed and support through NCVO and other voluntary sector infrastructure organisations.

## COVID 19

What effect has the lockdown had on our charity and income/ expenditure?
The Covid-19 lockdown had a significant impact on Dog A.I.D. and the wider charity sector. As a small charity with low and the wider charity sector. As a small charity with low meant that we have managed this impact. The Board made use of the furlough scheme and expenditure has also been lower with limited office costs and no travel expenses. Fundraising continued, but with events and community fundraising on hold the Research and Small Grants Assistant continued to send grant applications where appropriate and secure funding. The carefully managed the finances during this pandemic, using reserves where needed.

The Covid-19 crisis has impacted the charity's service delivery whilst one-to-one activities had to be suspended. The charity is foiowing Government and Assistance Dogs UK guidance assessments for training and Levels 1,2 and 3 assessments. Staff are working from home again where possible to fit with the updated Government restrictions but with an office presence maintained to provide support and prepare to restart services. One adapted service was the Level I Virtual Workshop ast weekend. The Board has established a working group, ncluding trustees and staff, to monitor the evolving situation taking guidance from National and local governments and our governing bodies. The group met this week and is monitoring enable training and assessments to take place safely where possible.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The annual accounts need more transparency. Money donated and received from fundraising etc as a charity it is public money and as such needs more in depth analysis, trainers expenses, trustees expenses, staff expenses (not just salaries) also show any losses from such events.
The trustees review and monitor the income and expenditure at each Board meeting. Dog A.I.D.'s annual report and accounts are prepared to meet the Charity Commission requirements, using the Independent examiner's report template for Receipts \& Payments accounts. This details the income and expenditure in each financial year, and the format of the accounts will ecome more detailed as the charity grows - when Dog A.I.D.'s gross income is between $£ 250,001-£ 500,000$ in the relevant financial year, the accounts will be prepared on the accruals basis in accordance with the 2008 Requlations and the SORP.

## EXPENSES POLICY

Please can you advise the membership of the current Dog Aid Expenses policy?

As it stands it appears somewhat biased \& open to interpretation depending on who you are, whether a Trustee, a Volunteer, Staff or a Member of Dog A.I.D.?
The Expenses Policy has been updated in 2020 in consultation with the Charity Commission and is available on the website. The policy for claiming expenses has been reviewed and clearl states how and when trainers, staff, trustees and volunteers can claim the expenses in connection with authorised duties that an individual undertakes in the course of their role for Dog A.I.D
