It is May and once again we are closing in on summertime. It has been an enjoyable spring, but we all know that the Virginia Beach version of summer-with-a-vengeance is just a few weeks away.

Help wanted. The Virginia Beach Voter Registrar is looking for people to work on election day serving as election officials, sometimes referred to as poll workers. I served as an election official for 17 years, mostly as the Chief Election Official at Bayside Elementary School. Election day is a long day, but looking back, it was always very satisfying. With more than one-hundred voting precincts in Virginia Beach, it requires at least a thousand election officials to conduct a successful election. I encourage everyone to consider signing up to be a part of the team that is on the front-line of our electoral system. Virginia Beach has a state-of-the-art election system. With paper ballots and optical scan readers, and complete checks and balances at every stage of the process. Rest assured our system is completely accurate and secure. The voter registrar and deputy registrars are the best there are and totally dedicated to ensuring our elections are secure, accurate and complete. If the rest of the country used the Virginia Beach election model, there would never be any doubt about the accuracy of the results. We are still in the battle against the proposed new traffic signal at the Independence Blvd – Paul Revere Rd intersection. The entire project is to provide a convenient "additional" traffic-controlled outlet from the Thoroughgood side of Independence. It is a nearly one-million-dollar waste of taxpayer money. Thoroughgood is where our district 9 councilman, Joash Schulman resides. He was instrumental in restarting this unnecessary project that had been stopped by the late Louis Jones. We will continue to be in opposition to the light, and we will also look forward to new representation for district 9 beginning January 2027.

This is the time of year where we pause civic league meetings, and the newsletter. The next edition of the Lake Smith Ripples will be out on or about 1 September. Your Civic League board will continue to meet during the summer to address neighborhood needs. I hope to see everyone at our neighborhood picnic on Sunday, 22 June from 2:00 to 4:00 in the afternoon. Spring Home Maintenance

Get a head start on what should be an annual spring home maintenance routine.

EXTERIOR INSPECTION

Roof. With binoculars and a keen eye trouble spots can be easily detected. Is there any shingle-shift, suggesting that some fasteners may have failed and need replacing? Any cracked or missing shingles? What about nail-pops? When nails push the tabs of the shingles up, allowing water to penetrate where nails come through the sheeting. All need to be addressed to keep the roof at peak performance.

Chimneys. For a masonry chimney, check the mortar between bricks or stones. Are any coming loose? Is there vegetation growing out of them? Each signals water infiltration. Also, look for efflorescence, a white calcium-like deposit that indicates masonry joints are no longer repelling water but absorbing it. Consider re-sealing masonry with a clear, impermeable or water-resistant barrier material.

Exterior Walls. Whether wood siding, stucco or brick, look for trouble spots, especially under eaves and near gutter downspouts. Water stains normally indicate that gutters are not adequately containing roof runoff. For wood siding, check for openings, damaged areas or knots that have popped out, making way for carpenter ants, and other critters that may burrow through. When inspecting your home's exterior, be sure to examine it from top to bottom for masonry cracks. Routine caulking by homeowners may not do the job. Tuck pointing (removing and replacing cracked mortar) by a brick mason should be considered for larger cracks and A foundation specialist should be consulted when cracks in the foundation are discovered.

Windows. Leakage around windows will admit warm summer air and let cooled indoor air escape, so be sure to check that any caulking and weather stripping has remained intact. A tight seal is the first line of defense against air and water. If you experience condensation inside the glass on double or triple-glazed windows, the weather seal has been compromised, and either the glass or the window will need to be replaced. Spring-clean your windows—inside and out—with a store-bought or homemade window cleaner (one cup rubbing alcohol, one cup water and a tablespoon of white wine vinegar will work just fine) and either squeegee or wipe with a soft cloth. Never use abrasive cleaners or a high-pressure spray washer. Remove and clean screens with mild detergent. Lay them on a dry surface to air-dry before putting them back on. Never power-wash screens. It could damage the mesh.

Decks and Patios. Look for warped, loose, or splintered boards. Remove any debris accumulated in the space between boards. Whether wood, plastic or composite, a deck should be cleaned every year to extend its life. Faded or worn wood decks should be cleaned, stained, and resealed. For composite decking, follow manufacturers' recommendations on seasonal care. For a stone patio, a simple hose down may be all the maintenance that's required unless moss or staining, is present.

INTERIOR MAINTENANCE

General Cleaning. Spring is a good time to clean house areas that often go neglected. Dust or vacuum chair rails, window casings, tops of wall-mounted cabinets and ceiling fans. Use a damp cloth to clean wood and vinyl blinds. Vacuum upholstered furniture and consider renting a carpet cleaner. Anything you can do to remove settled dust, mites, and allergens will make for a cleaner and healthier home. If grease residue is detected in the kitchen, consider washing cabinets, backsplashes and walls with warm water and mild detergent. Similarly, in the bathroom where soap residue and fluctuations in heat and humidity combine to create the perfect breeding ground for mold and mildew. While cleaning tile, look for areas of worn or missing grout, as these may lead to more serious water damage if not repaired.

Air Conditioning. Make sure that air conditioning units are in good working order for the warmer months. Change filters, check hose connections for leaks, ensure drain pans and condensate lines are draining freely. Vacuum any dust that has settled on the unit and connections which can impact cooling effectiveness. If performance problems were evident last summer, now is the time to call in a professional.

Attics. Search for signs indicating insects or critters have colonized. Also, search aggressively for evidence of leakage, and mold, which often takes the form of gray or black blotches that look like staining. Proper insulation and good ventilation will deter mold growth in the attic, so act now to prevent the problem from developing in the warmer months ahead.

Leaks. Check for leaky faucets, clogged drains and sweaty pipes. Check under kitchen and bathroom sinks to ensure pipe connections and hoses are properly sealed. Look for wetness around the dishwasher. Check wash machine hoses for cracks, bulges or dampness, and for signs of corrosion and leaks on hot water heaters.

OUTDOORS: Watering system. Check pumps, pipes and faucets for leaks, and check to see that in-ground sprinkler heads are working properly.

They watch out for you because they know that you are watching out for them. This is one of the reasons why we have such low crime.

With so many people in our neighborhoods walking, running, biking and working in their yards it is difficult for would be criminals to get away with anything without being seen.

Lock your vehicles. How many times have you read this or heard it? It's not just our high traffic thoroughfares where this is occurring but in cul-de-sacs, more remote areas and up long driveways. Do not leave valuables or anything that looks like it contains something valuable visible in your vehicle. unlocked vehicles call the police, 911, do not confront them. There have been instances where shots were fired at people who tried to scare them off.

To help to protect yourself, discuss all your safety concerns with your Real Estate Professional.

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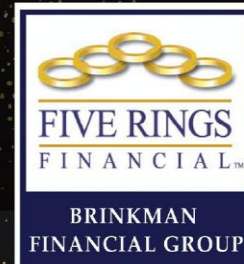

MOTHER'S DAY

*No matter your age,
you always need your mom!*



While the Mother's Day that we celebrate on the second Sunday in May is a fairly recent development, the basic idea goes back to ancient mythology – to the long-ago civilizations of the Greeks and Romans'

The Greeks paid annual homage to Cybele, the mother figure of their gods, and the Romans dedicated an annual spring festival to the mother of their gods.

Mothering Sunday

In the 16th century in England, a celebration called "Mothering Sunday" was inaugurated – a Sunday set aside for visiting your mother. The eldest son or daughter would bring a "mothering cake," which would be cut and shared by the entire family. Family reunions were the order of the day, with sons and daughters assuming all household duties and preparing a special dinner in honor of their mother. Sometimes during the day, the mother would attend special church services with her family.

Anna M. Jarvis

After her mother died in 1905, Miss Jarvis wished to memorialize her life and started campaigning for a national day to honor all mothers.

Her mother, known as "Mother Jarvis" was a young Appalachian homemaker and lifelong activist who had organized "Mother's Work Days" to save the lives of those dying from polluted water. During the Civil War, Mother Jarvis had also organized womens' brigades, encouraging women to help without regard for which side their men had chosen. At the time, there were many special days for men, but none for women.

On May10, 1908, a Mother's Day service was held at a church in Grafton, West Virginia, where Anna's mother had taught. Thus, was born the idea that the second Sunday in May be set to honor all mothers, dead or alive.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill designating the second Sunday in May as a legal holiday to be called "Mother's Day" – dedicated "to the best mother in the world, your mother."

For the first few years, the day was observed as a legal holiday, but in absolute simplicity and reverence – church services were held in honor of all mothers, living and dead.

6. **Make a homemade gift.** Mothers love gifts from the heart.
7. **Give your mother a locket with your photos.** Forget about a digital gift. Just think how happy she will be having a beautiful locket with photos of her children.
8. **Give your mother jewelry with your birthstone** – She will always think of you when wearing it.
9. **Make your own card** – Always a big favorite. It will certainly make her smile.

Shepherd's Pie

Ingredients

- | | | |
|-----|------|--|
| 1 | ea | large, sweet potato, peeled and quartered |
| 2 | ea | large, Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and quartered |
| 1/3 | C | milk |
| 1 | TBL | Butter |
| 1 ¼ | tsp | salt |
| 2 | tsp | olive oil |
| 1 | ea | large onion, chopped |
| 3 | ea | garlic cloves, minced |
| 1 | C | carrots, diced |
| 1 | C | peas |
| 1 | TBL | Dijon mustard |
| 1 | tsp | Worcestershire sauce |
| 1 | lb | boneless leg of lamb, cut into ½ inch cubes (beef or turkey as substitute) |
| 1 | tsp | dried thyme (or 2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh thyme) |
| ¼ | tsp | freshly ground pepper |
| 2 | TBLS | all-purpose flour |
| 1 | C | beef broth for lamb or beef, or 1¼ C chicken broth for turkey |
| 1 | ea | 6 oz can tomato paste |

This is a great

leftover lamb
beef or turkey!



Directions

Combine potatoes and enough cold water to cover in a medium saucepan; bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer covered, until fork-tender, about 20 minutes. Drain and mash the potatoes with the milk, butter and a teaspoon of salt.

Meanwhile, preheat oven to 425 degrees.

To make filling, heat the oil in a large non-stick skillet over medium high heat. Add onion, garlic and carrots cook until golden, about 7 minutes. Add lamb, beef or turkey (see note), peas, remaining salt, thyme, Dijon mustard, Worcestershire sauce and pepper. Stir with wooden spoon for about 4 minutes. Sprinkle in flour and stir constantly, just until flour is absorbed, about 30 seconds. Stir in broth and tomato paste; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring constantly until slightly thickened, about 1 minute.

Transfer to a 2-quart baking dish, top with potato mixture and spread evenly with a fork, Bake until heated through, about 20 minutes.

Note: If using previously cooked meat (leftovers) hold off on adding meat until broth and tomato paste are added.
