Virginia moves to Phase 1b. of Covid-19 Vaccination Plan greatly increasing pool of those eligible for vaccine

Virginia moved into Phase 1b. of its Covid-19 vaccination plan on Monday, January 25th. Per the Virginia Department of Health, the plan is divided into three phases (1a., 1b. and 1c.). Phase 1a., consists of healthcare personnel and residents of long-term care facilities. Phase 1b., includes frontline essential workers, people age 65+, people age 16-64 with an underlying medical condition, people living in correctional facilities, homeless shelters, and migrant camps, and Phase 1c., is currently described as all other essential workers. Preparing for the Covid Vaccine

The COVID-19 vaccine rollout in the U.S. has been a bit disconcerting, but the bottom line is that two highly safe and effective vaccines are available. Millions of doses have been given, and with a little time and experience distribution will improve. In the meantime, the majority of Americans just have to stay calm and wait, since there is no specific estimate when the vaccine will be available for everyone.

Each state determines the distribution priority in its vaccine rollout. The Virginia Plan as determined by the Virginia Department of Health is by appointment and priority is as set forth above. So your first step should be to simply make sure you really understand the current prioritization and distribution plan in our area. As previously stated, this information can be found on the Virginia Department of Health website and was shared in the Virginian-Pilot on 23 January 2021. Because the plan is fluid and because it depends so heavily on supply and demand it would be beneficial to check the website occasionally to determine how the plan is progressing and when the next phase will go into effect.

To begin the scheduling process, go to the VA Beach Dept. of Health Corona Virus vaccination Website <u>www.vbgov.com/vaccinate.VB</u> on this site you will provide your location, name, address, age, phone number and other pertinent information concerning restrictions on your availability and whether you will have transportation to the vaccine site. After you have filled in the information, you will submit it and subsequently receive notification via email when your request has been received. The reply will also state that further instructions on how to schedule your vaccination will be forthcoming by another e-mail. Be patient. Remember, the majority of Americans won't be vaccinated until at least the spring. Recent estimations have stated if 70-80% of Americans are able to receive the vaccine by mid or late summer, we could see some semblance of normalcy in the fall.

Check in with your doctor

It is *not* necessary to talk to your doctor in order to be vaccinated. The vast majority of individuals have found the vaccine to be "perfectly safe." However, if you've had an allergic reaction to other types of vaccines, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends you talk to your doctor before getting the COVID-19 vaccine.

Make a plan for vaccine day — and immediately thereafter

Make sure you remember the day your appointment is scheduled, put it on your calendar. Ensure that you have a way to get there on time and that you won't miss it. Entry and exit to vaccination sites are tightly controlled. Realize that the appointment could take a while, further, vaccine providers have been instructed to watch recipients for 15 minutes after shots to monitor for possible allergic reactions. Those who have been vaccinated recommend that you plan to be at the site for a minimum of one hour. Also, have a post vaccine plan. You could develop common side effects like fever, chills or a headache and not necessarily be able to go right back to work or child care. You may need a ride home. Expect to take it easy for a bit, and adjust your schedule accordingly.

President's Corner

As we reach the mid-winter point, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to affect our lives. I suspect we are all getting used to wearing masks everywhere we go. Let us hope we don't get so accustomed to them that we never again take them off. Everyone should be following the CDC and the Governor's guidelines related to hygiene, travel and interacting with other people. The vaccines are here, although distribution is slower than expected. If you are unsure about getting the vaccine, the best course of action is to follow the advice of your primary care physician. They know your medical situation and risks better than anyone. Keep the faith, we will get through this and return to more normal times at some point, hopefully this year.

As you know, the civic league has curtailed all face-to-face meetings and events since last spring. If conditions show improvement, we are still looking at the possibility of having an outdoor picnic type event at the park in late May or early June. We will have to monitor the situation closely before making that decision. I also see lots of children playing in the park on most days. Do you think we should consider having an Easter egg hunt in early April? Holding a limited outdoor event with masks, and with adult social distancing, may be a good morale boost for the neighborhood. I understand other neighborhoods are considering similar events. Think about it, and if you have a preference one way or the other, communicate it with any of the board members listed to the left. We can compile your input at the board meeting (virtual) later this month, or the one in March. We do not want to go through the effort and expense if it results in a meager turnout. So, think about it and give us your input. We value your opinion.

On January 19^{th,} the Virginia Beach city council approved (7 to 4) a rezoning request for the 14-acre Windsong Apartments on Pleasure House Road in the already crowded Chick's Beach neighborhood located just down the road from our neighborhood. The rezoning will result in the rebuilding of the 1970s vintage apartment complex and the addition of 139 apartments to the existing 272 units there today. It will also see the construction of new four-story apartment buildings. All of this was opposed by the Chesapeake Beach civic league with the support of several nearby leagues, including our own. The Chick's Beach civic league had negotiated with the out-of-town developer spearheading the project for nearly two years but failed to gain any meaningful concessions that would lessen the impact on traffic, storm water and quality of life from the massive project. The rezoning is contrary to the Virginia Beach Comp Plan that defines specific Strategic Growth Areas for increased density. Chick's Beach is not in one of those SGAs. The rezoning is also contrary to the Shore Drive Overlay area. The overwhelming majority of approximately 30 speakers at the virtual city council meeting were opposed to the rezoning, and the destructive impact it poses to that long-established neighborhood located between Shore Drive and the Chesapeake Bay. Conspicuously absent from the discussion was the Council of Civic Organizations (VB-CCO) which should have stepped in to support the civic league and the Chick's Beach neighborhood from this destructive case. We understand the VB-CCO is still in the process of redefining itself. Hopefully that will be soon. In the final vote it was council members Louis Jones, John Moss, Jim Wood, and Barbara Henley standing in support of the neighborhood and in opposition to the rezoning. On January 25th two young boys, one riding a bike and the other one on foot, were observed opening mailboxes. While being watched they did not remove anything, but a little while later a package that was delivered to a home on Harris Point Dr. was found ripped open and left in the street. It was a piece of woman's clothing. I emailed this information to our Civic League members and within a couple of hours I received at least twelve responses thanking me for the information and from a few others that had also had their mailboxes ransacked, some on Chippendale Ct and others on Harris Point Dr. It would seem that these boys were from our neighborhood as one was walking. Tampering with the US Mail is a serious crime. Getting caught taking mail out of the mailbox of one of our more intense neighbors could result in bodily harm. During this pandemic there are a lot of people working from home during the day that would otherwise be working elsewhere. Use this time at home to help keep our neighborhood safe by being observant of what goes on outside your home. If you see anyone tampering with the contents of a USPS mailbox call 911, this would be a crime in progress.

This is why Neighborhood Watch is so important to a community. Stopping incidents like this in their infancy keeps them from growing into full blown crime sprees. It only takes a couple of times for someone to be successful in taking a package that holds something expensive or worse yet a sentimental item from a family member that they can use for themselves. Soon they spread the word and our community can be terrorized like it was several years ago when a few teens started their criminal careers just like this.

We can't watch our property 24/7. The purpose of the Neighborhood Watch program is to create an alert neighborhood. The program works through the mutual support of neighbors watching the property of other neighbors. Neighborhood Watch is simply a program of neighbors watching out for each other during the workdays, evenings, vacations or any other time to prevent or reduce crime. Your neighbors are watching your property, you should also be watching theirs.

Whooten, Abbott, Tower, Berlucci, Rouse, Wilson, and Dyer, all voted in favor of the rezoning and against the neighborhood. We need to have long memories for votes like this one. Folks, this is not a Republican versus Democrat issue. It is not petty politics. City council members are not party aligned. There is no D or R next to their name. We get to vote for all 11 seats as they come up for election. City council can impact our quality of life, taxes, and property values far more than any actions in Richmond or Washington. What happened at Chick's Beach should not have happened. We need to know it can happen to any neighborhood, including ours. One of the primary roles of your civic league is to defend against such intrusions. We take that role seriously.

How to Clean and Maintain Hardwood Floors

Identify the Right Cleaning Product

When it comes to choosing a product for a deeper clean, there isn't a hard-and-fast rule. Different finishes require different treatments, so all three experts suggest listening to the product recommendation of your flooring or finish manufacturer. However, it is safe to say there are products to always avoid. Don't use any kind of harsh chemical to clean any hardwood floor. Chemicals applied to the finish will create hazing. This can really build up over a period of six months to a year and doesn't look very good. You don't want to use anything that says it's going to polish or shine or rejuvenate or revitalize the wood floor. That's basically telling you that you're laying out something that's a supplemental product. It's putting something on that surface that'll make it pretty for a short period of time, but it's not designed to wear.

Keep Them (Pretty) Dry

Once you've found the right cleaning product, use it on the floors with a damp mop. You don't want to bring out a wet bucket and start soaking the floors because that'll cause the wood to swell, and the same for steam cleaning.

Know the Warning Signs

Wood reacts dramatically to temperature and humidity, so it's important to understand the environment that surrounds your floor.

If there's too much moisture on, around, or below the wood, it will cup. Eliminate the source of the water to stop this from occurring.

Exceedingly dry conditions induce gapping, cracking, and splitting. Here, a humidifier should do the trick.

Touch Up Surface Scratches

It doesn't feel good when you scratch your floor, but it's normal. It's part of owning a wood floor. If you do want to fix surface scratches, use a stain marker from a wood furniture touch-up kit. That should do the trick.

Recoat Before It's Too Late

When the floor is starting to wear down, it's time to step in and recoat. A recoat doesn't involve sanding, It's actually applying another coat of finish to the top of the floors to bring back the luster and life of that finish, so you don't have to go through the sanding process. This exercise can prolong a floor's life for many years by adding a layer of protection each time it's needed.

We are experiencing a very "fast paced" real estate market! Low interest rates coupled with a short supply of homes has created a "seller's market". The City of Virginia Beach currently has an extremely low supply of a homes available for sale.

There are 826 active listings (attached and detached homes) and out of those 369 are under contract which leaves only 457 properties available to purchase. Considering the City of Virginia Beach has a population of approximately 450,000 people, that is a very low supply of available homes.

Listings are going under contract in a matter of days and it is not uncommon to experience multiple offers on homes for sale due to the low available inventory. The current situation makes it more challenging for buyers, as the competition is very high and it could take multiple attempts at submitting an offer before one is accepted.

Groundhog Day

Groundhog Day always falls on February 2nd. This traditionally marks the midpoint between winter solstice and spring equinox. Around this time, farmers needed to determine when to plant their crops, so they tried to forecast whether there would be an early spring or a lingering winter. Our Groundhog Day is related to this need.

According to legend, if a groundhog sees its shadow on this day, there will be 6 more weeks of winter, if it doesn't, then spring is right around the corner.

For centuries, farmers in France and England looked to a bear; in Germany, they kept their eye on the badger. In the 1800s, German immigrants to Pennsylvania brought the tradition with them. Finding no badgers there, they adopted the groundhog to fit the lore. Punxsutawney Phil has announced spring's arrival since 1887. Although other groundhogs have also carried on the tradition.

Though we recognize that animal behavior isn't the only way to judge planting dates, the tradition continues, often with a wink and a smile. (Old Farmer's Almanac)


