President's Corner

There may be some light at the end of the tunnel when it comes to the COVID-19 pandemic. CDC guidelines and our own governor's mandates have moderated in the past two months to the point we feel comfortable having a face-to-face meeting again – with all safe precautions being practiced. Therefore, we are planning to have a civic league membership meeting on Tuesday, May 18th in the fellowship hall at Calvary Baptist Church on Haygood Road beginning at 7:00 PM. Face masks and social distancing are required. This meeting will be the last before our civic league's traditional summer break. The next scheduled meeting will be in September, and hopefully by then the pandemic will be in the rearview mirror.

We are also planning an outdoor event in the Haygood Point neighborhood park on May 23rd from 3:00 PM to 4:30 PM. Everyone in our neighborhood is invited to come out to the Sunday afternoon in the park event. We will provide hamburgers, hot-dogs, ice-cold soft drinks and individual packages of chips. All you need to bring is an appetite and perhaps your lawn chair. Come out and meet your neighbors and your civic league's board members in the relaxed setting of our neighborhood park. We will not have the big tent for this occasion, so if the springtime weather turns against us, and it rains, the event will not be held.

Pete Cook, our civic league's maintenance director, has set Saturday, June 12th as the date for our annual Clean the Lake event. Come out to the "Duck Crossing" on Five Forks Road at 9 AM and help collect trash from the lake and the shoreline. If you have a boat, all the better.

For many years our civic league has been on a July 1 to June 30 fiscal year for our IRS reporting, operational budget, and membership dues period. This has often created confusion among the membership regarding when dues are collected and when they expire. The single \$15 household dues payment each year was easy to overlook and even more easy to forget when last paid – especially since we have not been on a calendar year like the rest of society. The board has recognized this problem and has taken the steps needed to change our membership year to the calendar year effective immediately. That means if your household is a member with civic league dues currently paid through June 30th of this year, or a future year for those paid ahead, your membership has now been extended to December 31st. There is no action needed on your part. If you are not currently a civic league member, we encourage you to join or renew using the membership form found in this newsletter. For the small household annual dues of \$15, civic league membership is the best value in town. Going forward, our annual membership drive, with newsletter insert and pre-addressed envelope, will move from the September edition of the *Ripples* to January or February of each year. I hope this change brings us into conformance with the rest of the world and will make it easier for all of you to participate as civic league members.

This will be the last edition of the *Ripples* until September. Your civic league board, while not planning member activities or events in the summer months, is nonetheless still active and meeting monthly to address any issues or concerns related to our community. Since we received considerable interest in placing a "Little Library" in the park, we will work with VB Parks & Rec to install one in the next few months. Your civic league is dedicated to promoting and maintaining a high quality of life for residents of this community. We live in one of the most desired neighborhoods in Virginia Beach. It is an ideal place to live and raise a family because of all the great residents who call this neighborhood home.

There has been a rash of vandalism in our community recently.

This past month bags of top soil were stolen from a driveway, a city owned fence was damaged, the window was broken out of an SUV while parked in the driveway, and another vehicle was vandalized on Haygood Point Road.

Last month someone drove through a lawn and another home had their Easter decorations damaged.

Vandalism is a new experience for us. We haven't had multiple incidents of vandalism that I can recall in our community. These actions are very random and do not seem to be aimed at any particular home and that makes it all the more difficult to prevent. These events would not be anything to be concerned about if they happened over the period of a couple of years but they happened in the span of a couple months. Things like this have a way of escalating from vandalism to minor crime to major problems for all of us. Let's work to put a stop to them starting now. The only way to get a handle on this is by watching for anything or anyone that appears to be suspicious and notifying the police. We have some very vigilant people in our community but we need everyone to get involved.

Being convicted of vandalism carries a possible fine and parents of minors could be responsible for damages caused.

Intentionally causing injury or destroying property with a value of less than \$1,000 is a Class 1 misdemeanor. The penalties for a Class 1 misdemeanor conviction includes up to 12 months in jail and a fine of up to \$2,500. Per Virginia Code § 18.2-137

This spring and summer will be different than most others. We have been quarantining and home schooling this past year and people are anxious to get outside and enjoy the warm weather. Get out and take a short walk and appreciate the great neighborhood that we live in. This is a good time to meet and get acquainted with any new neighbors and to reconnect with old ones that you haven't seen for a while. Sometimes people appear to be standoffish but most times if you are the first to just say "hello" they will open up. You don't have to become best friends but being a good neighbor is a win win. One of your neighbors is more likely to spot someone trying to break into your vehicle or home than a policeman driving through the neighborhood. Your neighbor is always there, a policeman rarely drives through our neighborhood.

For those interested in getting the COVID-19 vaccination the Convention Center and the FEMA location at Military Circle have a limited number of same day appointments.

Tips for Removing Scratches from Hardwood Floors

Your floor's finish works to protect it from wear, but it's important to know what kind of finish you've got in order to maintain it. Consider, for example, a wood floor installed prior to 1970, which was probably finished with varnish or shellac. You can add luster to such a finish with paste or liquid wax, or oil. If your older finish is noticeably scratched, it can be stripped or sanded down, then refinished with a polyurethane-based product - a highly durable finish, resistant to abrasion and easy to clean - just be sure to use only a water-based silicone polish on polyurethane-finished floors.

1. Clean hardwood floors gently.

Lackluster wood can magnify the appearance of scratches and worn areas - not to mention that dirt particles ground into hardwood floors can lead to worse scratches - so your first line of action should be thorough but gentle cleaning. Avoid brooms or abrasive scrub pads, and never soak a floor with water or liquid cleaner. Instead, use a soft mop or vacuum (with the appropriate attachment) to remove dust, hair, and surface debris.

2. Sand out the scratches in the wood floor.

A little elbow grease can bring life back to wood floors. A fine-grained sandpaper is all you need. First, sand the floor in the direction of the grain. You'll need to reapply stain that you've buffed away in the process, so choose a hidden area (under the bed, in a closet) to patch-test a wood stain that matches your floor color. After you find the right stain, patch test a urethane finish. A water-based urethane dries quickly, with a clear, shiny finish ideal for newer floors - but it may create too much contrast if floors have darkened with age. Oil-based urethanes are strong-smelling, but they dry with a yellow tinge that darkens over time, which may better suit the color of an older floor. Make sure your sanded area is smooth and thoroughly clean before you stain and finish.

3. Rub walnuts over scratches in the wood to camouflage them.

Walnuts contain excellent natural emollients and brown dyes that both repair and enhance the look of worn, scratched wood. Warm up the oil in the nut with your fingers, then rub into worn areas of the floor using small circular motions. Let the oil sit for a few minutes, then buff with a soft cloth.

4. Make an effective refresher from pantry ingredients.

A combo of baking soda and olive oil can help reduce and remove scratches from wood. Vacuum your floor thoroughly, then apply baking soda moistened with several drops of olive oil to marred areas. Wait five minutes, then buff in gently, using a soft sponge. Clean thoroughly with a damp cloth and dry with a towel.

5. Consider wood floor products designed for scratch repair.

Good for scratch repair on both wood and laminate floors.

6. Color in scratches with a wood stain.

Oil-based stains dry slowly and can be difficult to work with but provide the richest, longest-lasting color. Water-based stains are available in many shades, and make for easy application and clean up. Combination stains are designed for polyurethane finishes, while gels don't penetrate and, therefore, can be used

on a variety of materials, including previously painted wood. Choose the right stain formula for your wood's finish and fill in the scratch completely with the liquid color. Use a Q-tip to remove any excess stain and let dry. You can also find stain markers and blending pencils, though you may have to play with color combinations to find the perfect match for your floor. Apply to the scratch according to package directions, wipe away any excess, and allow to dry thoroughly.

7. Patch and mend deeper scratches in wood floors.

For deeper gouges in your wood, try a product like Bondo - a wood filler that can be sanded and stained, or painted. You can also use a pre-colored latex wood filler. Fillers come in a variety of colors and may need to be blended to match your floor exactly. This option is best for small, deep holes that can then be filled, sanded, stained, and finished, leaving your floor flawless once more.

We will soon begin to plant our summer gardens in the park and at Haygood and Crossborough. Working in conjunction with the city, we are particularly



pleased with our "new start" pollinator garden at the park. There is a large sign marking the location of the "Pollination Station." This, so that our pollinator friends, busy bees, hummingbirds and butterflies will all come for a free refill. The Pollination Station is a large area in the park with many plants already in the ground ... stop by on your next stroll by the park. If anyone wants to come and help us, please let us know. Speaking of our pollinator friends, several years ago, in 2018, our local newspaper, The Virginian Pilot, published an article about the "Top 10 pollinator plants for coastal Virginia." So, with our new Pollinator Station coming along, it would be helpful if our neighbors would consider selecting some of these for their gardens to extend the coverage around the Pollination Station. Here is the list extracted from the newspaper article and in approximate order of bloom time:

1. Red Chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*) a native shrub with beautiful berries and foliage later in the fall.
2. Blueberry (*Vaccinium* species) with blooms highly attractive to many species of bees.
3. Butterfly or milk weed (*Asclepias incarnata*) a native plant usually planted as a host plant for the Monarch butterfly caterpillar but also visited by many pollinators.
4. Purple coneflower (*Echinacea purpurea*) a garden classic with a long bloom season. Can be grown from seed with minimal effort.
5. Wild bergamot (*Monarda fistulosa*) a bumble bee magnet especially "Claire Grace."
6. Rattlesnake master (*Eryngium yuccifolium*) adds structure and visual interest to the garden as well as attracting a host of pollinators. Specify, "hold the snake" when buying.
7. Short-toothed mountain mint (*Pycnanthemum muticum*) attracts the most diverse group of pollinators of any plant on this list. Activity in full bloom is amazing. Rampart spreader in full sun and moist soil.
8. Joe-pye weed (*Eutrochium/Eupatorium* species) an "old school" butterfly garden favorite. Newer cultivars grow to a height of only 30 to 36 inches.
9. Goldenrod (*Solidago* species) many new cultivars are well behaved in the garden. Goldenrod is an absolutely critical plant for late season Monarchs and other pollinators.
10. Aromatic aster (*Symphyotrichum oblongifolium*) late season explosion of colors is irresistible to bees and butterflies.

Happy May gardening and we hope to see you at the park or one of our Club gardens.

Hear comes summer - Time for a recreational equipment reminder

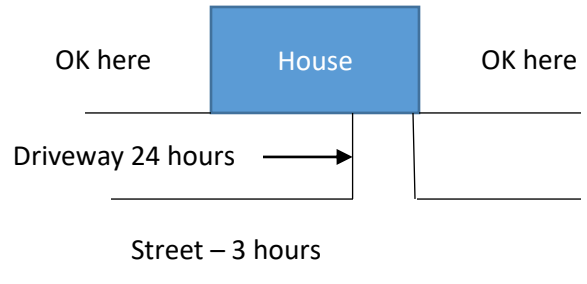
Just a reminder, “Recreational Equipment” defined as any equipment used for transporting people or property in connection with recreation and designed for temporary occupancy, including but not limited to boats, motor homes, trailers, jet skis, off road vehicles or the trailers used to move or haul such equipment shall be parked behind every plane of the house that is substantially parallel to and facing the street (behind an imaginary line that extends from the front of the house to the property lines on both sides of the house). On corner lots, such equipment may also be parked or stored on the portion of the lot that is clearly and physically the rear of the lot and behind the plane of the house parallel and closest to the street.



Such equipment may only be parked in a driveway for a period **not to exceed twenty-four (24) hours during loading and unloading.**

No recreational equipment shall be parked on any public street **for more than three (3) hours.**

No such equipment shall be used for living, sleeping or housekeeping purposes except in locations lawfully established for such use. (camp grounds)
