Welcome Back - I trust everyone has enjoyed good health and weathered this long HOT summer – one that is really holding on. The COVID-19 pandemic has somewhat retreated to the point we are again attempting to schedule our normal civic league activities – membership meetings, Fall Festival, community yard sale, Christmas Dinner, and others. Our first meeting is scheduled for September 21<sup>st</sup>.

Joshua Jarosz, an Eagle Scout candidate from Troop 364, is taking on the project of planning, building, and installing the "Little Library" we mentioned last spring. Upon approval from VB Parks & Rec, the library will be placed in the Haygood Point Neighborhood Park and accessible to all residents. It is a take-a-book, leave-a-book type of scenario. Thanks for stepping up to the plate Josh. We most appreciate and support your effort.

We will be conducting a forum for the candidates in the race for the 83<sup>rd</sup> Virginia House of Delegates seat at our meeting on September 21<sup>st</sup>. The candidates are Democrat Nancy Guy, the incumbent, and Republican Tim Anderson. The forum, being held on the date of our regular September membership meeting, will be hosted jointly with the Thoroughgood Civic League. Tom Steffens, a veteran of previous forums, is again serving as the moderator. The 83<sup>rd</sup> House district includes our neighborhood. Actions taken by the Virginia General Assembly do impact our community and this upcoming election on November 2nd, as every election, is important. Come to the meeting and learn about the background, positions, and goals of each candidate. What makes democracy work best is an educated electorate. Come early and enjoy some refreshments and fellowship with your neighbors and the candidates. And, as you know, I still make the best coffee.

We continue to lag behind on membership dues for 2021. If you have not paid civic dues this year, please do so today. You will find the membership form and address in this newsletter. Last spring, we made the change from the July to June membership year to the calendar year. If your dues were paid after July 2020, your membership is current through December 2021. If you have not paid since July 2020, please do so at this time. If you are not sure when you last paid, please contact Jean Bowman or me.

Your civic league is managed by the volunteers on the board of directors. The 11-member board is comprised of five officers and six directors, all elected by you - the voting membership. A slate of candidates is assembled by the nominating committee, presented at the April membership meeting, and formally voted on at the May meeting. The nominating committee consists of three to five civic league members in good standing. Their objective is to identify and recruit civic league members willing to serve as officers and directors. Candidates for the nominating committee will be formally appointed by the current director team at the January board meeting. *Cars are being left unlocked and expensive toys and lawn equipment are being left in front yards. Be proactive, don't provide opportunities for theft.*

I hope everyone had an enjoyable, safe and healthy summer.

A few of our neighbors had some issues over the summer.

On June 27<sup>th</sup> on Miles Standish an unlocked car was entered and a wallet was taken. The credit cards were used. The victim received updates from their bank. The police responded to the store, received footage of the suspect, located the suspect and arrested him.

On July 29<sup>th</sup> also on Miles Standish a bicycle was stolen.

On August 22<sup>nd</sup> near Five Forks and Red Coat a car with automatic lock did not lock as the key fob was left inside the car overnight. A purse was stolen and credit cards were used to make unauthorized purchases.

These three incidents could have easily been prevented. Never leave your vehicles unlocked and do not leave expensive toys or lawn equipment unattended in your front yard. Furthermore, never leave your electronic key fob in your car. At a minimum it will cost you \$300 to replace.

Lock your vehicles. Once a thief finds a vehicle unlocked and steals anything that can be easily converted to cash, they will try to find more unlocked vehicles in the same area the next time they need cash. Keeping your vehicle locked shows would be criminals that they are wasting their time and risking getting caught in our community and will target another area the next time. By leaving your vehicles unlocked and rewarding criminals with your belongings you are also enticing criminals to return to our neighborhoods where the pickings are easy.

The police Captain and some of the officers have often told me how impressed they are with the beautiful neighborhood that we have. It shows that we care about where we live and that we don't want it to become a hot spot for vehicle break-ins and other crimes. Keep your vehicles locked.

## National Night Out.

Threat of rain didn't stop some people from having National Night Out get-togethers. Thank you to all who participated. If you have never attended one of these neighborhood events you are missing an enjoyable evening with your neighbors. Ask someone who has attended one of the National Night Out events and chances are they will tell you that they are looking forward to the next one. Also a special thank you to the people who put these events on. These events bring neighbors together and builds trust with each other and the police.

*How exciting to start the year sharing the wealth of our gardens by swapping the "plant goodies" that we collected during the pandemic!*

### Here is some information taken from the **Virginia Cooperative Extension Lawn Maintenance Calendar**

(Researched and Recommended Turf-Type Tall Fescue Varieties (Cool Season Grasses) Fescue Lawns)

**August 15 – September 15 Fertilize.** Obtain a soil test every 3 or 4 years and use the recommendations in the most recent test report to determine the N-P-K rates for your lawn; e.g., 28-0-4 or 32-0-10. Apply 0.7 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. Examples: 2.5 lbs. of a 28-0-4 per 1000 sq. ft. or 2.2 lbs. of a 32-0-10 per 1000 sq. ft. If over seeding, wait 2 weeks after fertilizing before over seeding.

**September 1 – October 1 Thatch or Aerate Thatch.** Fescue lawns generally do not require thatching, but when over seeding is required, thatching enables the seed to settle to the soil more effectively. A follow-up mowing at a cutting height of 2-2 1/2 inches is desirable to increase the amount of light reaching the base of the plants, which stimulates new tiller development and seed germination. **Aerate.** Use on compacted soils. Fescues are coming out of their summer dormancy and beginning vigorous growth, aeration can be used in conjunction with over seeding your fescue lawn. **Overseed.** Use 4 lbs. turf type tall fescue per 1000 sq. ft. Many lawns do not need over seeding each year. Allow new grass time to grow and receive 2-3 cuttings before making further fertilizer applications. **Note: Over seeding after Oct 15 is not recommended** as the soil temperatures are not warm enough for germination of fescue seed. **Cutting Height:** 3 inches or higher. Remove no more than 1/3 of the grass blade when mowing. You stress the grass when you cut too much. Cut only when the lawn is dry. **Water.** Apply so the amount is approximately 1 inch of water per week including rain. Water deeply.

**October 15 – November 15 Winter Weed Control.** New grass should be mowed at least twice prior to herbicide treatment. Important to control chickweed, German moss, henbit, dandelion, buttercup, and many other annuals. Use combination of 2, 4-D and dicamba or mecoprop (MCPP). For general applications, use a hose end applicator or pressurized sprayer. Otherwise, spot spraying is more economical and safer for the environment. Do not use dicamba under the driplines of tender hardwoods (e.g., Dogwoods and Maples).

**November 1 - November 15 Fertilize.** Apply 0.5 lb. actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. Allow thirty days between fertilizer applications.

**February 25 – March 15 Pre-Emergent Crabgrass Control.** Use Pendimethalin, Benefin (Balan), Dithiopyr (Dimension), or DCPA (Dacthal). Avoid Siduron (Tupersan, Trey). Make the first application when forsythia is in the first week of bloom. (Approximately March 5-10) The second application is product dependent; read and follow the label carefully.



**As Fall approaches winds from tropical storms and preparations for lawn reseeding have a tendency to increase the quantity of yard debris for weekly trash collection. The following information is provided to inform residents of the city's Yard Debris Collection Policy**

### Yard Debris Collection

This service is provided by the city on your normal collection day, and does not require a work order. Residents may place yard debris at curbside for collection as follows:

- Limbs up to 4 feet long and 6 inches in diameter will be collected in piles not to exceed 4 x 4 x 4 feet. (On heavy trash days crews may limit this to 2 piles)
- You may also dispose of smaller yard debris, such as grass and leaves (no dirt, rocks, mulch or root balls) in **up to 25 clear plastic bags**, not more than 25 lbs. per bag.
- Tree removal debris is not collected at the curbside. However, it can be collected through the **yard debris container program**, provided each piece is no larger than 6 inches in diameter

Please note that any work done by private contractors must be disposed of by the contractor.

Residents are urged to place yard debris, as well as waste and recycle containers, outside of the drainage flow line (a few inches away from the curb) to keep the drainage flow line clear and avoid neighborhood flooding.

**Mulch mowing leaves and grass clippings is recommended** instead of bagging and dragging them to the curb!

### Yard Debris Container Program

For larger amounts of yard debris, roll-off containers are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. There is a fee for this service: **\$40.00 weekdays and \$75.00 weekends**

- The containers measure 13 x 7 x 5 feet.
- The container is only to be used for tree limbs less than 6 inches in diameter, leaves, shrubbery, and grass trimmings from the normal upkeep of the immediate perimeter of your occupied dwelling
- No clear plastic bags in the container
- You may schedule the container for a day with AM or PM delivery available. However, trailers delivered on Friday will be picked up on Monday
- Someone at least 18 years old must sign for the trailer when delivered, but need not be home when it is picked up.
- Please note that the Landfill does not accept tree removal debris over 6 inches in diameter.
- Please call **385-4650** well in advance if you wish to schedule a container. This service is not available on line

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## Haygood Point Park Naturalization



Using money they had set aside, the Lake Smith Terrace Garden Club (LSTGC) is completing a multi-year effort to add some native trees and plants, and to establish a native plant pollinator garden in our neighborhood Haygood Point Park. The club's objective was and remains - to enhance the natural beauty of the park and to complement the neighborhood and nearby water areas. During monthly club meetings members gained an appreciation of native plants and their advantages. They learned that native plants are adapted to local soils and climate conditions and generally require less watering and fertilizing than non-native plants. Furthermore, native plants help preserve the balance and beauty of natural ecosystems. Additionally, area wildlife evolved with these plants using them for food, cover and rearing their young.

The club worked with the Virginia Beach Department of Parks and Recreation from start to finish; the city's Horticulturist and the Operations Coordinator, Symsi Denson deserve special mention. The city was very supportive and worked closely with garden club principals to increase the number of native trees and enhance the habitat for local and migratory animals. The new trees include Paw Paw, Tulip Poplar, Sweet Bay Magnolia, Bald Cypress and Tupelo Black Gum. The "Pollination Station" portion of the project hosts a large diversity of native plants to attract pollinators and butterflies. A new garden design was created that included a large, raised bed. In the fall of 2020, the city landscaping crew planted Bee Balm, Mountain Mint, Common Sneezeweed, Dense Blazing Star, Yarrow, Purple Coneflowers, White Coneflowers, Black-eyed Susans and Vernonia to the bed. The Garden Club provided over 130 plants of 12 different varieties, primarily native perennials, to populate the new Pollination Station area prepared by the city. Club members and a few neighbors are maintaining the pollinator bed by weeding, edging and mulching, while nature is providing the water.

Over the past years, the Lake Smith Terrace Garden Club meetings featured guest speakers from the Lynnhaven River Now Organization, Virginia Agricultural Research and Extension Center, local butterfly enthusiasts, native plant gardeners and others. Using available reference material on native plants, the club developed a tabular listing of natives, in Excel format, permitting sorting by color, size, bloom period, etc. The members have been most enthusiastic about the park project as well as planting natives in their own gardens and landscaping to extend the coverage around the Pollination Station. The station features a lovely wildflower, *Milkweed*, a larval host and nectar source for the Monarch Butterfly. Thus, all of our Haygood Point pollinator friends, busy bees, hummingbirds and butterflies can all come for a free refill and worry-free caterpillar grazing at and in the area around the Pollination Station. LSTG members hope that neighbors and families will visit the park and enjoy the plants and pollinators.
