#### **President's Corner**

As this edition of the Ripples goes to press, election season is still in full swing. We are bombarded daily with campaign literature in our mailbox. Then there are those annoying automated campaign and voter survey phone calls. And there are those endless back-to-back political ads on television and in your email. By the time you receive this newsletter, all this should be behind us – for this year. I hope every resident, 18 and above, exercised their precious right to cast a ballot in this election.

The Fall Festival, our first major civic league event since 2019, was a huge success. Several hundred residents turned out at the Haygood Point Neighborhood Park on a Sunday afternoon. Under ideal weather they enjoyed good fellowship along with hamburgers, hotdogs, and brats cooked to perfection by our grill-master Bill Dawson. The side dishes everyone brought were plentiful and delicious. We had a big tent furnished by the Virginia Beach Sheriff's office. Children enjoyed the work of a balloon twister, face painter and the always fun bounce house. VBFD and VBPD were on hand giving demonstrations of their equipment. Young and old had fun riding the hay wagon pulled by an orange tractor driven by Terry Gray. And the biggest hit of the day was the animals in the petting zoo, who quietly grazed on the park grass. If you didn't attend this year, you missed a great event.

You may have heard something about a new area-code coming to eastern Virginia. It's all true. We will no longer be known only as the 757 region. You see, as the region has grown, the number of available telephone numbers has nearly been exhausted. The solution is to overlay a second area-code over the existing one. The new area code, 948, will cover the same territory as the existing 757 area code. So, what does this mean for us? Not much. Your phone number will not change – all current 757 telephone numbers will remain as they are today. New phone numbers may be assigned to the 948 area code, which means you will need to dial all 10 digits when calling any number in the region. Today, 10 digit dialing within the 757 area is optional, but effective April 9, 2022, all calls within our region will require 10 digits. Start adding the area code to all local calls now so that you develop that habit before April. If you have been here a while, you may remember when all of Virginia was area code 703. As growth occurred, this half of the state split and became area code 804. In 1996, a further area code split created the 757 region. Now, rather than splitting our area code, the numbering plan administrator has opted to overlay the new area code 948 onto our region. We'll get used to it.

You don't want to miss our November 16th civic league meeting. We have for our program a presentation by Tina Sinnen, Virginia Beach Circuit Court Clerk. She will tell us all we need to know about the subject of wills, probate, deed recording and all the other services available at the clerk's office. Put it on your calendar and plan to come spend an informative hour with your friends and neighbors.

Don't forget to set your clocks back on Sunday, November 7<sup>th</sup>.

We can begin to build a better neighborhood watch security system by becoming acquainted with our neighbors' everyday living patterns. By knowing when they are at work, on vacation, and so forth, we will be better able to judge whether a stranger should legitimately be at the neighbor's home.

Our neighbors are our best security device. Unfortunately, many people simply do not make an effort to know their neighbors. They are hesitant to report suspicious people or vehicles, fearing that they will be regarded as "snoopy". We needn't be close friends with our neighbors in order to look out for their interests.

Neighborhoods in which people are truly concerned with each other and their mutual safety\_have extremely low burglary rates. Recent studies by criminologists point out that several such neighborhoods have had literally no burglaries within the past decade.



## **Fall Garden Tips:**

This is the ideal time to put colorful trees and shrubs in to help enliven your landscape. In selecting plants, remember Size, color and texture. One of the earliest winter-blooming shrubs is witch hazel, which can survive the coldest temperatures in our area. It grows as a small shrub-tree, with short- stemmed clusters of pale-yellow flowers. Perhaps the most delightful characteristic of witch hazel is its fragrance. Other winter bloomers include winter daphne, winter honeysuckle and Japanese apricot. Another beautiful color addition to your landscape is a new thornless flowering quince, called Double Take, puts on a spectacular spring display of large double flowers with intense colors: red, pink and orange. And, of course, don't forget camellia, a standout in our area.



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## **How to Keep Mice Out of the House**

What Causes Mice in the House? Mice are drawn into residential homes because they are good locations for plenty of food and dark sheltered areas to nest and reproduce. Your home is also a source of warmth during colder times of the year. Rodents such as mice and rats can contaminate food, chew up important papers, damage electrical wiring, and spread disease. It can be quite difficult to completely eradicate rats or mice that have infiltrated your home and established hidden nesting areas, so it's best to prevent infestations before they can happen. When you do find your home playing host to mice, or rats, take whatever measures necessary to remove those pests and block their entry points into your home.

Usually, signs that rats or mice are present include small dark droppings of feces that look like tiny grains of rice and are found along walls or in places where food materials are present. You may also notice other destruction, such as chewed holes in boxes and bags of dry goods in a pantry, in pet food bags, or in bags of grass seed in the garage. Close inspection along baseboards or near any holes in the floors, such as where radiator pipes come through, may show rub marks or gnawed areas where rodents have chewed to gain access. In hidden areas beneath cabinets, you may find small nest areas filled with shredded paper or wood shavings. If you have pets, your dog or cat may exhibit alert behavior, sensing the presence of a rodent. And you may even hear sounds of scurrying or scratching in the walls or floors, especially at night when the house is silent and dark. To keep mice out of the house:

Block All Entry Points The most important preventive measure you can take to keep mice and rats away is to inspect the foundation and walls of your house to make sure any potential entry points are blocked. The fall season, when rodents seek to get in from the cold, is an especially good time to run your inspection tour. Mice can enter by squeezing their way through cracks as small as 1/4-inch in diameter, so block foundation cracks with a masonry repair material, and inspect joints around windows and doorsills for cracks that might allow rodents to enter. Make sure weather seals along the bottom edges of garage doors are in good shape. If your garage is insulated, it may become a cozy home for a rodent. Check your attic, as well, since rodents love the warmth of insulation.

Move Bird Feeders Far from the House. The seeds and ground grains that go into most bird-food mixtures are a delightful treat for rodents, as evidenced by the presence of squirrels that frolic around any bird feeder. Feeding birds is an admirable hobby, but don't be surprised when mice and rats are drawn to the ground around your feeders. If you feed birds, keep your feeders as far from the house as possible.

**Seal Pet Food**. Transfer dog and cat foods to sealed, airtight storage containers immediately after buying them. Dry pet

foods are mana from heaven for rodents, so store them in tightly sealed containers well above the floor.

**Ensure tops on trash bins are closed down**. If possible, keep these containers as far from your house as you can. If you have containers other than your city containers, put them on platforms above the ground, and as an added prevention, secure lids with bungee cords or heavy rocks.

**Control Foundation Plantings**. Dense shrubs and garden planting that butt up close to the house provide hiding spots for mice and rats as they seek entry holes through foundations or walls. Shrubs along the house should be planted a few feet away from the foundation, and the soil level kept low enough that mice cannot squeeze their way up behind the siding.

**Seal Dry Foods**. Flour, sugar, and other food kept in bags or paper cartons are easily broached by rodents and bugs. Instead, keep these foods in tightly sealed plastic or metal containers on high shelves or in the refrigerator. Rodents will have no incentive to take up residence in your house if they don't smell any source of food.

Keep Outside Doors Closed. Garage doors left wide open can be an invitation to rats and mice, especially in the fall when they are seeking a warm place for winter. Get into the habit of closing your garage door immediately after entering or exiting with your car, and also keep side entry doors to the garage closed. Keep sliding patio doors and windows closed, or at least protected with screens, to prevent rodents from entering. Never leave a garage door, or other entries open overnight, as the dark hours are when rodents are especially active.

**Set traps and bait** Mostly as a diagnostic measure throughout the year. A live trap is a humane and poison-free way to trap and release rodents while alerting you when they are finding entry into your home. The best live traps are chamber-type devices with a spring-loaded door that snaps shut when the mice enter in search of food. Avoid sticky adhesive trap designs, since mice have been known to chew their own feet off in an effort to free themselves from the adhesive. If you have no qualms about killing mice, then traditional spring traps are a good choice; they kill mice very quickly and without much pain to the creature. A bait station contains poisonous, thirst-producing pellets that make the rodent seek water outdoors where it dies. It is much easier to catch one or two mice or rats at the start of an infestation than to deal with them after a whole colony has set up a home in your walls. Keep any type of trap or poison baits completely out of reach of children and pets.

**Adopt and Animal Predator.** A young, aggressive cat, or a dog species such as a terrier with a reputation for hunting small animals, can often catch rodents before they can take up housekeeping and form nests to reproduce.

## **House Numbers May Save Your Life**

On a recent Sunday evening rescue vehicles were dispatched to our neighborhood and had difficulty locating the residence reporting the emergency. The person who placed the call lived alone, so there was no one available to hale the rescue squad upon its arrival. The residence had no visible/readable numbers on the curb or the house and the mailbox, located next to the front door, did not have numbers visible from the street. With no way to identify the home the emergency vehicle mistakenly pulled into the wrong driveway and needed to turn on its side lights to locate the proper house, resulting in a delayed response time.

Although GPS has greatly improved response times by aiding rescue teams in finding the location of those requiring assistance, we all need to ensure that we have house numbers visible from the street, day or night, on the house, curb or mailbox to aid rescue teams in pinpointing our location should an emergency arise – it may save a life.
