Don't let yourself become a victim – come to the civic league meeting and learn how to identify and avoid those with bad intentions. The date is March 15th, and the time is 7:00 PM – please add it to your calendar.

Congratulations to Megan Earlenbaugh, a resident of Lake Smith Terrace, for her appointment by the civic league board as our Representative to the VBCCO (Virginia Beach Council of Civic Organizations) and NWBP (NorthWest Beach Partnership.) Megan, Al Wallace and I attended the February 10th VBCCO meeting that was supposed to discuss the future of the organization. There were other civic leagues represented as well. It turned out to be more of a one-way conversation from two of the remaining three VBCCO board members. They are intent on keeping the organization in a "hold" status for 2022 – thus killing the VBCCO. After listening to the conversations and reviewing the VBCCO bylaws, I and others believe they are acting beyond their authority. It also appears to me there is some back-room politics in play along with some yet to be identified motives. More to come as we work in partnership with other neighborhoods to save this organization that, with the right leadership, supports all civic leagues and associations.

We have volunteer position openings at the civic league. First, we need a webmaster to update and maintain the civic league's website. On February 23, 2022, at approximately 0248, Virginia Beach Police Department (VBPD) officers responded to the 2100 block of Kimbrel Circle to investigate reports of several male suspects tampering with unoccupied motor vehicles. Officers located several suspects on Pier Point Place. After a brief foot pursuit, two of the suspects were taken into custody without incident. Over 40 vehicles were entered. This area is just off Shore Drive and not too far from us

We have been very fortunate the past few months. The reports of larceny from motor vehicles in our community have been practically non-existent. Other neighborhoods have them occurring on a regular basis. Thank you for doing your part in keeping our crime rate very low.

Our neighbors are our best security devices. Unfortunately, many people simply do not make an effort to know their neighbors. They are hesitant to report suspicious people or vehicles, fearing that they will be regarded as "snoopy". We needn't be close friends with our neighbors in order to look out for their interests. Do your part. By knowing when they are at work, on vacation, and so forth, we will be better able to judge whether a stranger should legitimately be at the neighbor's home.

Watch your neighbor's home for suspicious activity because they are watching yours. It's only fair. The



greatest deterrent to a would-be-burglar is fear of getting caught. Each concerned citizen is another pair of eyes to let the criminal know he is being watched.

If you are the victim of a crime you should contact law enforcement as soon as possible to report the offense. When reporting the crime you should be as detailed as possible when giving descriptions of suspects, vehicles, or any property taken during the crime. The more information you can provide the better the chance of solving the crime. Also, get a copy of the police report. Credit card companies, banks and credit reporting agencies may require you to show a police report to support your claim that a crime was committed.

If your credit/bank cards are stolen you should contact your banks as soon as possible to cancel the cards. You should contact all three credit bureaus and have fraud alert protection placed on them to help protect against identity theft. If your credit/bank cards are used by someone you should obtain the location where it was used the date and time and the amount of the purchase. Provide this information to the police, It may help identify a suspect through the use of surveillance video from the location it was used.

Four Ways to Prevent a Scam



1. Trust your gut

Scammers often urge you to act immediately. If you take some time to think about the message or offer you've gotten before acting on it, you may be able to sidestep a scam.

2. Don't Respond

Ignore calls, texts and email if you're unsure about who the sender or caller is. It's better, for instance, to simply let an unexpected phone call go to voicemail. Also, if you generally rely on caller ID, be aware that it can be falsified. And never give your personal or financial info to anyone who contacts you out of the blue.

If you think that a message might have merit, get in touch with the organization yourself in a way you are sure is legitimate.

3. Check Before You Click

Don't click on links in email and texts if you have any uncertainty; some may put your device's security in jeopardy. Hovering your mouse over a link in an email will reveal the entire URL, which may help you determine if it's fraudulent. Case in point: An "ru" at the end of a URL means the link you thought was to a local retailer was created in Russia.

4. Pay Wisely

With peer-to-peer payment methods like Cash App, Venma, and Zelle, for instance, it's best to use them only with people you know, says Bill Kresse, a fraud expert. Also, don't send money to anyone who sends you an unsolicited check, even if the funds appear in your bank account, says Steven Baker, an international investigations specialist for the Better Business Bureau. It may take weeks for a bank to realize a check is fakewhich may put you in a dicey situation.

3 Ways to Clean Winter's Salt off Your Car and Why You Should

It's important to upkeep the maintenance of your car at all times, but even more so when the winter months arrive. One of the main reasons for this is the salting of roads, which melts the ice that causes slippery and dangerous conditions during freezing temperatures. Although this is good for your safety, the salt is not good for your car as it causes corrosion and rust. Luckily, there are a few simple steps you can take to counteract these unwanted effects. Consider a good car cleaning after trips up north, where a lot of salt is used, or when salt is used here in VA due to snow and icy conditions.

Wash Your Car Regularly

Although it's always advisable to wash your car regularly, you should be especially vigilant in doing so during the winter months. If possible, aim to wash your car at least once every two weeks to prevent the onset of corrosion. Here are a few tips you can follow to obtain the best results:

- Rinse first: It's important to rinse your car thoroughly with fresh water before washing. If you apply soap water directly to dry paint, you may end up grinding the salt into your car's paint finish and scratching the surfaces.
- Use car shampoo: Use two buckets during the washing process and fill one with a wash solution and the other with fresh water. Wash the car from the top down with a mitt, which you should rinse in the bucket with fresh water before dipping it in the wash solution again.
- Dry the car: As the last step, use a microfiber towel to dry all the areas of the car thoroughly to ensure that no parts freeze overnight.

Wax Your Car

Waxing is one of the most effective ways to prevent corrosion and damage to the paint finish of your car. Although you should ideally apply wax to your car's exterior about three to four times a year, the most important time to do so is just before the onset of winter.

As a first step, go over the exterior with a clay bar to get rid of any bonded contamination on the paint's surface that the wash did not remove. If your car's paint finish is scratched or a bit damaged, you can apply a polishing compound to smooth out the surface. Finally, apply the wax, using gentle overlapping motions. Allow the wax to dry, then remove the wax with soft cotton rags in a circular motion.

Pay Attention to the Undercarriage of Your Car

Apart from tires, a car's undercarriage is the part of a vehicle that's most susceptible to corrosion and rust as it's close to the road surface. The undercarriage of a car mostly consists of unprotected metal components that can quickly become rusted or damaged. This can cause mechanical issues in the long run. Rinse the undercarriage with a hose or a pressure washer, and you should also have this part of your vehicle properly cleaned and sealed by a professional car cleaner at regular intervals.

You may not be able to prevent all the wear and tear on your vehicle during the winter months. However, these three simple steps will go a long way in ensuring the longevity of your car.

Named for the Roman God of war, Mars. This was the time of year to resume military campaigns that had been interrupted by winter.

Daylight Saving Time

In March, we Spring forward. How did this practice of Daylight Saving Time (DST) begin? This is the way *The Old Farmer's Almanac* (around 1792) answers the question.

What is Daylight Saving Time?

Daylight Saving Time is the practice of changing the clocks forward one hour from standard time during the summer months, and changing them back again in the fall. The general idea is that this allows us all to make better use of natural daylight, however, DST has many detractors

When is Daylight Saving Time 2022? When do we set our clocks forward?

Daylight Saving Time begins on Sunday, March 13, at 2:00 A.M.. Remember to "spring Ahead" and set your clocks forward 1 hour (i.e. losing 1 hour) (We do this on Saturday night when we go to bed.)

When Do We Set Our Clocks Back?

Daylight Saving Time ends on Sunday, November 6, at 2:00 A.M. Then we "fall back" by setting our clocks back 1 hour (i.e., regaining 1 hour). The exceptions to DST are American Samoa, most of Arizona, Guam, Hawaii, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Why is there Daylight Saving Time?

Credit for Daylight Saving Time is often given to Benjamin Franklin, who suggested the idea in 1784 as a joke. British-born New Zealander George Hudson proposed the concept in 1885 but was ridiculed. The idea was revived in 1907, when William Willet, an Englishman, proposed a system in the pamphlet *The Waste of Daylight*.

The Germans were the first to officially adopt the lightextending system in 1915 as a fuel saving measure during World War I. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when congress passed the Standard Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers (cows don't pay attention to clocks). During World War II. Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again (this time year-round) to save fuel. Since then. Daylight Saving Time has been used on and off, with different start and end dates. Currently, daylight Saving Time begins at 2:00 A.M. on the second Sunday of March and ends at 2:00 A.M. on the first Sunday in November.



Who was Saint Patrick?

Was there really a St. Patrick? Definitely. Did he really drive the snakes out of Ireland? Probably not, since snakes weren't native to Ireland.

St. Patrick was born in Britain as Maewyn Succat. At age 16 (around AD 400), he was kidnapped from his home on the west coast and carried off to Ireland to become a slave who worked as a shepherd. After six years, he escaped; upon returning home, he received his call (in a dream) to preach the Gospel. He spent the next 15 or so years in a monastery, preparing for his missionary work. When he became a priest, his name was changed to Patricius and, eventually Patrick. Although some Christians lived in Ireland at the time, it was Patrick who spread Christianity throughout the land and brought an organized church into existence.

Blue was the color originally associated with St. Patrick, but green is now favored.

St Patrick's Day is the traditional day for planting peas.

Cabbage seeds are often planted today, too, and old-time farmers believed that to make them grow well, you needed to plant them in your nightclothes!
