Holiday shopping tips

- Always park in well-lit areas.
- Don't leave purchased gifts in plain view lock them in your trunk.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Only bring credit cards you plan to use.
- Check your bank statements regularly during the season to spot suspicious activity.

How to Keep Your Home Safe and Secure During the Holidays

- If you're planning to travel during the holiday season, be sure to keep your travel plans off your social media networks.
- Notify a neighbor ... that you will be gone and provide them a way to contact you.
- Remind your overnight guests to keep their vehicles locked.
- Hide packages and gifts.
- Watch your Christmas lights.
- Inspect the fireplace, furnace and the chimney.
- Keep decorations at least three feet away from heat sources – especially those with an open flame, like fireplaces and candles. And remember to blow out your candles when you leave the room or go to sleep.
- The best decorations are safe decorations, so when you are decorating, make sure not to run cords under rugs or furniture, out of windows, or across walkways and sidewalks.
- If you have a natural Christmas tree, water it to keep it fresh and safe. Real trees can dry up and turn into kindling in no time at all. Get rid of the tree after Christmas. Dried-out trees are a fire hazard and should not be left in the home or garage.
- Always turn off your decorations when you leave your home and when you're sleeping. Most deadly fires happen while people are asleep.
- Inspect your decorations and discard any that are damaged or worn out.
- Keep batteries stored safely in their packaging and out of reach of anyone that might try to eat them, like small children and pets. Eating a battery can be deadly.

- Don't drive distracted.
- Always buckle up.
- Be prepared for severe weather.
- Watch your speed.
- Always drive sober.

Monthly Maintenance

A Daily, Weekly, Monthly and Yearly Bike Maintenance Checklist

The following list of
Necessary items and
recommended frequency of maintenance is
designed to give a recreational or club cyclist, or a
commuter an outline for a schedule.

Before Every Ride:


- · Check tire air pressure
- Check brakes and cables
- · Be sure your crank set is tight
- Be sure quick release hubs are tight

After Every Ride:

- Inspect tires for glass, gravel shards, and cuts on tread and sidewall
- Check wheels for true
- Clean the bike's mechanical parts as necessary.
 Once a week or every 200 miles: Lubricate chain (with dry lube; or every other week or 400 miles with wet chain lube).

Once a Month:

- Completely clean the bike, including the drivetrain if necessary
- Inspect chain and freewheel. Measure the chain for wear, check for tight links and replace the chain if necessary
- Inspect and lubricate brake levers, derailleurs and all cables
- Inspect pedals and lubricate SPD style cleats.
 Inspect tires for wear; rotate or replace if needed
- Inspect and check for looseness in the:
 - Stem binder bolt
 - Handlebar binder bolt
 - Seat post binder bolt (or quick release)
 - Seat fixing bolt
 - Crank bolts
 - Chainring bolts
 - Derailleur mounting bolts



Bottle cage bolts

- Rack mounting bolts
- Brake and derailleur cable anchors
- Brake and shifter lever mounting bolts
- Brake mounting bolts

Every Three Months:

- Inspect frame and fork for paint cracks or bulges that may indicate frame or part damage; pay particular attention to all frame joints.
- Visually inspect for bent components: seat rails, seat post, stem, handlebars, chainrings, crankarms, brake calipers and brake levers.

Every Six Months:

 Inspect and readjust bearings in headset, hubs, pedals and bottom bracket (if possible; some sealed cartridge bearings cannot be adjusted, only replaced).

Annually:

Disassemble and overhaul; replace all bearings (if possible); and remove and if necessary, replace all brake and shift cables. This should be performed at 6,000 miles if you ride more than that per year. If you often ride in the rain or mountain bikers who get dirty should overhaul their bicycles more often


That being said, December may be an opportune time to place your home on the market. Citywide inventory tends to decline in the winter season and current inventory remains low in Virginia Beach.

Winter solstice is the day with the fewest hours of sunlight during the whole year: In the Northern Hemisphere, it always occurs around December 21 or 22 (In the southern Hemisphere, it is around June 20 or 21.)

The word solstice comes from the Latin words for "sun" and "to stand still." In the Northern Hemisphere as summer advances to winter, the points on the horizon where the Sun rises and sets advance southward each day; the high point in the Sun's daily path across the sky, which occurs at local noon, also moves southward each day.

At the winter solstice, the sun's path has reached the southernmost position. The next day, the path will advance northward. However, a few days before and after the winter solstice, the change is so slight that the Sun's path seems to stay the same or stand still. The sun is directly overhead at "local noon" on winter solstice at the latitude called Tropic of Capricorn

CHRISTMAS TREE

SAFETY



PICKING THE TREE

 Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched

PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2 inches from the base of the tree
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat sources, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily

LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Some lights are only for outdoor use
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords, or loose bulb connections. Read the manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands to connect
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed

After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage or placed outside against the home. Check with your local community to find a recycling program. Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

FACTS

- ✓ One of every three home Christmas tree fires is caused by an electrical problem
- ✓ Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious
- ✓ A heat source too close to the tree causes roughly 1 in every 4 of the fires

Prevent Frozen Faucets When the weather report predicts a temperature plunge, keep your outdoor faucets safe with these simple tips.

- Disconnect and drain hoses and move them to inside storage.
- Close shut-off valves for outdoor faucets, and then drain each one. And/or, wrap faucets with insulating tubing or the insulated faucet covers now available at our local hardware store.
