If you are going away for vacation let a trusted neighbor know so they can keep an eye on your home. They can pick up deliveries and any flyers that are left on your door so it looks as if someone is home.

Summer is almost here. Please keep in mind that along with the warm weather and fun activities we also see a rise in criminal activity. Remember to call all suspicious activity to the police department's nonemergency number (385-5000). If the circumstance requires immediate police, fire or rescue response, do not hesitate to call 911. You are not bothering the police when you call, they would much rather respond and have it turn out to be nothing, than not be called when they are actually needed.

Our neighbors are our best security devices. Acknowledge your neighbors when you see them. Just a wave or a friendly hello will do. Unfortunately, many people simply do not make an effort to know their neighbors. They are hesitant to report suspicious people or vehicles, fearing that they will be regarded as "snoopy".

Enjoy the nicer weather and while you are out take time to enjoy the effort that your neighbors have put into their yards and tell them. Neighborhoods that have well-tended yards have less crime.

May is National Water Safety Month. We are very fortunate to have access to many kinds of water in this area. We have the ocean, the bay, rivers, and lakes enjoy them when you can but do it safely.

Can you swim well enough to save your life? 80% say they can swim. But... less than half of Americans can perform all of the 5 basic skills that could save their life in the water. Can you swim well enough to save your life? 1. Step or jump into the water over your head. 2. Return to the surface and float or tread water for one minute. 3. Turn around in a full circle and find an exit. 4. Swim 25 yards to the exit without stopping. 5. Exit from the water. If in a pool, be able to exit without using the ladder. Even if you can do all these skills you should not swim alone, swim impaired or leave children unattended in or near the water. Children and non-swimmer adults must wear a personal floatation device when on a boat. Enjoy the summer but do it safely.

How to Repair a Ripped Tent

When you're in the backcountry, stuff inevitably happens: you accidentally pitch your tent on an unseen rock, winds pick up to

the point where your tent can't handle it, a branch falls on your campsite, or maybe your tent becomes a casualty of the <u>campfire</u>. Each of these scenarios can result in a ripped or torn tent that is now effectively incapable of keeping you warm and dry. But that doesn't mean you need to toss the tent in the trash most tears are easily repairable.

Trim any loose threads and fibers. When tents tear, the ripstop nylon often leaves loose threads hanging that are prone to tearing further. Take a sharp pair of scissors and trim off any of the loose fibers or threads that may be lingering.

Clean the area surrounding the rip inside and out. If your tent is especially dirty, give it a good scrubbing and rinse out any dirt. If your tent is fairly clean, use <u>rubbing alcohol</u> surrounding the tear, inside and outside.

Apply Tenacious Tape to the inside of the tent. Measure out a piece of <u>Tenacious Tape</u>, or other fabric repair tape, that is bigger than the tear by about a half-inch on all sides. Using a sharp pair of scissors, trim the corners and edges of the tape so that they are rounded off. This will help make the patch more resistant to peeling. Peel the backing off of the tape and slowly apply the patch over the tear and make sure there are no bubbles or creases as you go. Apply pressure to the match to make sure that it adheres to the tent material.

Apply Seam Grip to the outside of the tent. On the outside of the tent, run a small bead of <u>Seam Grip</u> along the tear. Using your finger or a small brush, make sure that the Seam Grip covers the tear completely, as well as a quarter-inch more or so on all sides. The Seam Grip will help to further increase the strength and weatherproofing of the repair. Though in many cases Tenacious Tape will be enough, we strongly recommend using Seam Grip as well for a lasting repair.

Allow it to dry for 24 hours. Allow the repair to sit for 24 hours before use. This will allow for the Seam Grip to cure and for the Tenacious Tape to set. When the repair is complete, your tent will once again be completely waterproof, allowing you to take on everything mother nature can throw at you.

Paul Revere Rd./Wakefield Dr. Stoplight Update and Proposal.



The Civic League Board met Monday,

April 24th with city councilman Joash Schulman to review the city intersection analysis. Thoroughgood and Lake Smith Terrace neighborhoods both have access to left hand turn lanes at the Ewell Rd. stoplight. School buses use the Ewell light for left hand turns. During peak travel hours the Wakefield Dr./Paul Revere Rd. intersection is congested with cars packing the median to turn left from Wakefield.

Several options are being considered to resolve the congestion, ranging from adding a left-hand turn signal at Ewell, changing the existing light timing, providing alternative medians, or adding a stoplight. 292 residents signed a petition opposing the light in March 2021. Until recently, the petition and letter from our civic league halted the process.

As a result of recent meetings, the board will be meeting with traffic engineers in the near future to continue discussion for alternative solutions. The Civic league maintains opposition to the stoplight based on several areas of concern, including the already congested traffic between Ewell and Haygood Rd., the potential for an increase of rear end crashes with stoplight addition, cut through traffic in our neighborhood for people avoiding the light and the current availability of turning left at the Ewell light. Residents who will experience the most negative effects of the light live on Paul Revere, Ewell, Miles Standish and Twain - all streets without sidewalks. Moreover, residents who live on the Independence access road may experience increased traffic on their street as well.



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Flag Etiquette

With Memorial Day coming up on 29 May, Independence Day on the 4th of July, and Labor Day on 4 September, many of us will be flying our flags. The following are a few rules we should abide by when displaying our flags.

You can fly the flag on all days, but the Flag Code especially recommends displaying it on Independence Day, as well as other major holidays like Flag Day, Labor Day and Veterans Day.

Memorial Day has its own flag etiquette. The American flag should be flown at half-staff (half -mast on a ship) from sunrise until noon, then raised to full staff for the rest of the day.

There's a right way and a wrong way to hang the flag vertically. Don't hang your flag backwards, upside down, or in another inappropriate fashion. If you're hanging your flag vertically, like from a window, against a wall or from a porch overhang, the Union portion with the stars should go on the observers left.

Prevent your flag from touching the ground, floor, or water. It's not necessary to dispose of your flag if it accidentally hits the pavement, but you should make sure that it's in good condition before displaying it again.

Fly your flag at half-staff on the right occasions. The flag is flown at half-staff when the nation is in mourning, such as for the death of a government official or for a specified remembrance, as well as from sunrise to noon on Memorial Day. When flying the flag at half-staff, first hoist the flag to the peak and then lower it to the halfstaff position. Half -staff is defined as the one-half distance between the top and bottom of the flagpole. The flag should again be raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day.

Only fly a flag at night if it is illuminated. Custom dictates you should display flags only from sunrise to sunset, but you can keep it flying 24 hours a day if it is properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

Don't fly the flag when it rains. If the forecast calls for inclement weather, you're not supposed to display it – unless it's an all-weather flag. Flags used to be made of absorbent cotton materials, however, most flags are now made of all-weather, non-absorbent materials like nylon.

| 1/3 | С | buttermilk (or 1/3 cup milk and 1 tsp lemon juice) |

| 1 ¼ | С | fresh raspberries (If berries are large cut in half or quarter) |
| 1 | tsp | Turbinado sugar |

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a small bowl totally mash ripe banana and set aside. Sift together flour, baking soda and salt into a medium bowl – set aside. Wisk eggs, vanilla and almond extract together in a bowl or liquid measuring cup with a spout, set aside.

Cream butter, and sugar with a hand-held electric mixer until light and fluffy. Gradually add egg /almond extract/vanilla mixture into butter while mixing until incorporated. Add mashed banana then gradually add dry ingredients to creamed ingredients alternating with buttermilk (or milk/lemon). Blend well after each addition. Using a wooden spoon or spatula gently Fold in raspberries. Pour into well-greased muffin pan, sprinkle with turbinado sugar. Place in oven and bake at 375 degrees for 30-35 minutes (rack in middle of oven). Remove pan from oven and place on wire rack for 5 minutes. Remove muffins from pan and place on wire rack. After muffins cool for twenty minutes serve or wrap in plastic wrap.



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


Friday, May 26th to Sunday, May 28th
