You don't want to miss our civic league meeting on Tuesday, October 17th. Our meeting program will be an interactive training session presented by representatives from the Virginia Beach Fire Department. Come early and enjoy some refreshments while spending time with friends and neighbors. Looking ahead, the November 21st civic league meeting will include a presentation by Congresswoman Jen Kiggans.

I believe we are all aware of the impact of inflation on the family budget. It's a silent tax that chips away on our buying power. We feel it every time we go to the grocery store, a clothing store, building supply store, a restaurant, or the gas station. And we really feel it when seeking to buy a home with a new mortgage. Inflation is something we just can't avoid. The same problem is felt by your civic league. Our board of directors always strives to be frugal with all civic league related expenses. Inflation has increased our costs significantly. We have incurred increases in such areas as producing the newsletter and conducting our major events. Even the cost of our post-office box has nearly doubled in the past few years. Last month the board voted to increase our civic league annual dues to \$20 per household effective January 1, 2024. This is the first increase in several years but one that is needed. If you have not yet paid civic league dues for this year (2023), please do so as they are still \$15. In fact, you can pay ahead as many years as you like for \$15 a year. We keep very good membership records. Some residents are paid ahead five or more years. After January 1, 2024, all civic league dues will be \$20 per year.

I hope to see all of you at our Fall Festival event on October 22nd. Our Fall Festival committee has been planning the event since early August. I know you and your family will have an enjoyable time at the park. This year we will even have a brass band from the United States Navy. As with all our civic league events, membership is required to participate. If you are not a member, you can join at the gate. It's still \$15 for your household.

Now is the time to do some basic annual maintenance

As the fall and winter months approach, now is a good time to do some annual maintenance. Here is a list of "must do" items that every homeowner should check off before hunkering down for the winter.

- ✓ Check and Replace Worn Weather Stripping around doors and windows.
- ✓ Seal Gaps Where Critters and Cold Air can Come into Your Home.
- ✓ Inspect Exterior Walls If you have a painted exterior, check for any cracks or blisters in the paint surface. This is a sign that a new coat of paint is needed. If left unchecked, that failing paint won't protect your home, opening you up to much costlier repairs in the future. If you have brick walls remove and replace cracked mortar or seal cracks to prevent water intrusion. Water entering the cracks can freeze and cause additional damage to the brick wall.
- ✓ Have Your Chimney Cleaned
- ✓ Stock Up on Firewood Now is the time to purchase firewood and store it in an easily accessible location.
- ✓ Remove Window A/C Units or purchase and install a protective insulated cover that not only shields the unit from harsh weather, but also helps to insulate your home. Make sure this cover fits snugly around the AC unit.
- ✓ Clean Out and Repair Rain Gutters
- ✓ Inspect and Repair the Roof if needed
- ✓ Clean, Store or cover Patio Furniture including cushions.
- ✓ Clean and Cover the Grill
- ✓ Clean, Stain, and/or Seal the Deck
- ✓ Inspect Your Driveway for Cracks If you find any cracks, clean them out and repair any damage with driveway filler. For asphalt driveways follow up with a coat of commercial sealer

- ✓ Protect Exposed Water Pipes Be sure to wrap exposed piping with a weather-resistant, insulated material made to keep pipes from freezing.
- ✓ Change the Direction of Ceiling Fans By doing this, you create an upward draft that redistributes warm air from the ceiling. Directing the warm air back down towards the main portion of living space.
- ✓ Test and Change the Batteries in Your Smoke and Carbon Dioxide Detectors -units stop working after 7-10 years.
- ✓ Remove Screens and Install Glass in Storm Doors. Before storing the screens, be sure to clean them and repair any damage. Stow the screens in a dry area of the garage or basement.
- ✓ As Fall wanes and Winter approaches, winterize your lawnmower:

Empty the gas tank or add fuel stabilizer to prevent the gas from getting stale and gumming up the carburetor.

If you have a battery start mower, remove the battery pack and store it indoors somewhere dry and warm.

Change the engine oil and remove any moisture from the mower components.

Change or clean the air filter.

Clean the undercarriage and the deck to remove any debris, clippings, or dirt.

Store your lawn mower in a shed or garage over winter.

This checklist should get you on your way to preparing your home for the winter. Now is the time to get started on each item, before the cold winds blow and the snow starts falling!

Neighborhood Watch is simply a program of neighbors watching out for each other during the workdays, evenings, vacations or any other absences to prevent or reduce crime. The purpose of the Neighborhood Watch program is to create an alert neighborhood. The program works through the mutual support of neighbors watching the property of other neighbors.

When you go away on vacation, do you worry about your home? Well, when your neighbors go away, they also worry about their homes. Ease your worries. Watch out for each other. Ask a neighbor to keep an eye on your home while you are gone. This is what good neighbors do. Usually once you ask neighbors to watch your home, you will be asked to reciprocate when they go away. It's a win-win situation. It is also a good idea to provide the neighbor watching your home a travel schedule and a contact telephone number for you and/or a nearby relative.

Make sure your home is secure when you are traveling—all deadbolts locked, lights left on timers, newspapers stopped, trash/recycle receptacles put back, and mail held at the post office or collected by a trusted neighbor.

For the Neighborhood Watch program to be totally effective, each resident must take an active role. It has been shown that the incidence of crimes has been significantly reduced in neighborhoods where residents have joined together to look out for each other. Thieves and vandals will go elsewhere when a Neighborhood Watch Community is always on its toes.

Another benefit of Neighborhood Watch is that you can tell who would be vulnerable when there are extended power outages or if sever weather hits. Check on those that you think might need some kind of assistance. It is what a good community does.




Lynnhaven River NOW Plastic Bag Survey

Plastic shopping bags, carrier bags, or plastic grocery bags are a type of plastic bag used as shopping bags and made from various kinds of plastic. In use by consumers worldwide since the 1960s, these bags are sometimes called single use or one-time use bags, referring to carrying items from a store to a home. The same properties that have made plastic bags so commercially successful and ubiquitous - namely their low weight and resistance to degradation - have also contributed to their proliferation in the environment.

Because of their durability, plastic bags can take centuries to decompose – between 500 and 1000 years for a plastic shopping bag to break down. The lifespan of a bag is approximately 12 minutes of use. Single use plastics make up one-third of the litter we see in our environment, and they are a poor use of our resources.

On land, plastic bags are one of the most prevalent types of litter in inhabited areas. Large buildups of plastic bags can and have clogged drainage systems and contributed to flooding. They are the major source of long-term pollution in our oceans. When we have our Clean-the-Lake event, the trash pulled from the water and along the shoreline is primarily plastic shopping bags and plastic drink bottles. What is the solution to the pollution? Our Annual Pansy Sale will take place on 22 October. As always, a large array of pansies: the familiar Blotch or "face" pansies (some Colossus), Deltas with strong, vibrant solid colors (see to believe); yellow Jump Up and Citrus Violas; Snapdragons, Dusty Miller Silverdust and ornamental kale. Garden Club gals and guys will be there to assist you and answer any questions. We need your orders (and \$) no later than October 15th. Proceeds help our club maintain the gardens at our neighborhood entrances; the large garden and new "pollinator Station" (a must see) in our park; and support of local environmental organizations.

Early Voting is Underway

Early voting for Virginia's House of Delegates and Senate began on September 22nd and will continue until November 4th. All 100 seats in the House and all 40 seats in the Senate are up for election this year. This year's elections are the first under the new district boundaries.

The deadline to register to vote or update your existing registration is October 16th for those voting with a regular ballot. You can register online until 11:59 p.m. and in person until 5 p.m. However, you can still register after this date through Election Day and cast a provisional ballot, which is reviewed separately by the local elections board to determine its validity. To register online, go to www.elections.virginia.gov/citizen-portal/. To register in person, go to the Voter Registrations and Elections Office, Municipal Building 14 at 2449 Princess Anne Road.

The deadline to apply for a ballot to be mailed to you is October 27th. The request must be received by 5 p.m.

Voter identification is required in Virginia, however if you show up without a valid ID you can still submit a signed statement affirming your identity. A basic list of acceptable forms of identification is as follows:

- o Virginia driver's license, current or expired
- o Virginia DMV-issued ID, current or expired
- o Valid employee ID with a photo of voter
- o U.S. Military ID
- Valid student ID with a photo of voter issued by a public or private higher education institution in the U.S.
- o Valid U.S. Passport
- Voter confirmation documents
- Valid tribal enrollment or other tribal ID issued by one of 11 tribes recognized by Virginia
- Nursing home resident ID
- Current utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck with name and address of voter
