The long-held notion that you should let your car idle in the cold is only true for carbureted engines.

In the thick of winter, the common wisdom is that when you're preparing to take your car or truck out in the cold and snow you should start your engine and let it idle to warm up before driving. But, contrary to popular belief this does not prolong the life of your engine, in fact it decreases it by stripping oil away from the engine's cylinders and pistons. In a nutshell, an internal combustion engine works by using pistons to compress a mixture of air and vaporized fuel within the cylinders. The compressed mixture is then ignited to create a combustion event — a little controlled explosion that powers the engine.

When your engine is cold the gasoline is less likely to evaporate and create the correct ratio of air and vaporized fuel for combustion. Engines with electronic fuel injection have sensors that compensate for the cold by pumping more gasoline into the mixture. The engine continues to run "rich" in this way until it heats up to about 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

That's a problem because you're actually putting extra fuel into the combustion chamber to make it burn and some of it can get onto the cylinder walls. Gasoline is an outstanding solvent and it can actually wash oil off the walls if you run it in those cold idle conditions for an extended period.

The life of components like piston rings and cylinder liners can be significantly reduced by gasoline washing away the lubricating oil, not to mention the extra fuel that is used while the engine runs rich. Driving your car is the fastest way to warm up your engine up to 40 degrees so it switches back to a normal fuel to air ratio. Even though warm air being generated by the radiator will flow into the cabin after a few minutes, idling does surprisingly little to warm the engine. The best thing to do is start the car, take a minute to knock off any ice on your windows, and get going.

Of course, hopping into your car and gunning it straightaway will put unnecessary strain on your engine. It takes 5-15 minutes for your engine to warm up, so take it nice and easy for the first part of your drive. Warming up your car before driving is a leftover practice from the days when carbureted engines dominated the roads. Carburetors mix gasoline and air to make a vaporized fuel to run an engine, but they don't have sensors that tweak the amount of gasoline when it's cold outside like modern fuel injectors. As a result, you have to let older cars warm up before driving or they will stall out. But It's been a long time since carbureted engines were common in vehicles. So unless you're rolling in a 1970's Chevelle-which is probably not your daily drive- bundle up, get into that cold car, and get moving.

I certainly did. It's a great time of year to spend time with family and friends. It's hard to believe that Christmas will soon be upon us and that means more food and shopping.

Criminals love the holidays because it presents so many opportunities for them. Porch pirates follow delivery trucks and pluck the just delivered packages off of porches and hope it's something that they can use or sell, and it leaves your distant friend or relative wondering why you never thanked them for the gift they sent. Parking lot thieves watch for people returning to their vehicle to stash their just purchased packages so they can go back inside and buy more.

The VBPD will have extra officers patrolling the malls and shopping centers, but you need to not put yourself or your property into a situation that makes an easy or inviting target for would be thieves. Always be aware of your surroundings when approaching your vehicle. Try to park in a well-lighted area and place your packages out of sight --- in the trunk is the best place. If you are alone and uncomfortable walking to your car, ask a security guard to escort you.

Larceny from vehicles ranks highest in the number of crime reports taken by your VBPD. Always lock your vehicle. You don't want to come out of the mall and find that your vehicle was broken into or stolen. Never leave your keys in the ignition, cup holder, above the sun visor or in the glove box. It may be cold but even though you plan

to be gone for a couple minutes, never leave your car running unattended with the doors unlocked.

If you're having out of town guests staying with you for the holidays remind them to lock their vehicles. Recently in Virginia Beach during a 28-day period 213 Larcenies from Motor Vehicles were reported, 19 included firearms being taken. If you are a gun owner do not let a petty thief become a gun carrying thief.

Even when the best prevention methods are practiced, we can still be victims. No matter how insignificant the item stolen please report it to the VBPD.

While no one looks forward to having an annual Virginia State Inspection performed on their vehicle, please keep in mind some of the positive aspects of this program. Not only are our roads, vehicles, and loved ones safer but we are rewarded with lower auto insurance costs than states that do not require inspections.



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

Garden Tips



Fall is a good time to collect soil and test for pH and nutrient levels. A soil testing kit is available at the Virginia Tech Hampton Roads Agriculture and Research Extension Center located at 1444 Diamond Springs Road. The test measures Phosphorus, Potassium, Calcium, Magnesium, micronutrients and pH in soil. It also makes recommendations on amending soil to improve plant health, growth and blooms.
