We are very thankful for Ed Douglas as he has stepped up to fill the position of secretary of the civic league. He was voted-in as an officer of the civic league at the November board meeting. Ed and his lovely wife Debbie are longtime residents of Governor Square. Ed retired from the Norfolk Police Department after a 30+ year career and subsequently retired again from the Norfolk Sheriff's office 20 years later. If you see Ed around the neighborhood, please thank him for stepping up to a leadership role with the civic league, and for his years of service in law enforcement.

In our ongoing battle in opposition to prevent the installation of a new Independence Blvd traffic signal at the Paul Revere Road intersection, we offered the compromise of closing Paul Revere at Independence. It seemed like a reasonable request to offset the anticipated cut-thru traffic a new signal will bring to our residential streets. Virginia Beach Public Works has replied with a denial of that request. We have requested an on-site meeting to discuss further options. Public Works has yet to explain the justification for adding a crosswalk at that intersection along with the traffic signal. There are no businesses on either side, and no apparent neighborhood connection between Lake Smith Terrace and Thoroughgood Colony, yet suddenly there is an urgency for a crosswalk - a mere three tenths of a mile from the crosswalk at Haygood Road. Five years ago, our councilman, the late Louis Jones, looked at the proposed traffic signal and said it was not needed. The project stopped. Louis possessed the wisdom and years of experience to assess these types of projects – and the city listened to him. Unfortunately, his replacement, a resident of Thoroughgood, has yet to demonstrate any such situational awareness on this matter. We will continue our efforts to oppose the project that has no positive benefits to this neighborhood.

As the winter months arrive, watch out for your elderly neighbors. A little kindness goes a long way.

10 Painting Tips for Cutting In

Tips on getting a crisp sharp line at the edge of your paint.

- 1. Invest in a High-Quality Brush investing in quality paint brushes is half the battle. For cutting in, One popular maker is Purdy. I prefer the angular version, but it's a great brush that produces a sharp, crisp line with minimal brush strokes. Clean the brush thoroughly after you paint.
- 2. Skip Painters Tape
 Spending more time cutting in carefully saves a lot of time spent taping up everything
- 3. Lightly Load Your Brush & Keep It Clean I only use the bottom quarter of the brush when cutting in... and make sure it's not dripping! A mistake I often notice is a loaded brush that contains *too much* paint. An overloaded brush can get messy and doesn't create that crisp line. Try to keep your brush relatively clean, only using the bottom portion
- 4. Don't Start Exactly on the Line
 When you gently press your brush to the corner,
 don't place it exactly on the edge or line you want
 to paint. Pull back about a quarter of an inch to
 begin with, then slowly move closer as you gain
 control of the brush
- 5. Fan Out the Bristles & Apply Even Pressure As you're dragging your brush down the line or edge, apply gentle even pressure, fanning the top bristles slightly as you pull the brush. The fan should barely touch the edge or corner, creating a crisp line.
- 6. Use a Light Hand
 Applying too much pressure can cause the paint to ooze or drip from your brush. Try to use a light, gentle, and steady hand. I've found that if you pull the brush too slowly, it can actually be more difficult. Find a good medium pace with light pressure
- 7. Feather it Out
 If you're noticing any excess paint or ridges, use
 the backside of the brush to feather it out, blending
 any harsh edges or noticeable brush strokes.
- 8. Work in the Right Order
 It's important to cut in *before* you beginning rolling a wall. Always work from the edges inward. The texture or nap from the roller should seamlessly blend over top of the border that you previously cut in.

9. Tackle One Wall at a Time I always recommend finishing one wall completely before moving onto the next. This way, you'll have a

seamless transition, and all of your walls will match perfectly. It's also important to continue stirring your paint throughout the duration of a paint project, so the

color and viscosity is consistent.

10. Keep a Wet Rag Nearby
Keep a wet rag nearby and clean mistakes
immediately... paint is more forgiving than you expect
and is easy to wipe off if you mess up. If you don't cut
in perfectly the first time, wipe it up and start again!
No harm done.

Bonus - Read up and Watch Some Videos on Painting Technique. I have painted since I was 14 in houses and such and just started a deep dive into proper technique and finding lots of slight improvements that greatly speed up painting time and improve the final product. Brushes are quite expensive so spend some time on cleaning technique also

We Know When You are Sleeping

We try to drill (no pun intended) into everyone's head that it is necessary to brush your teeth before going to sleep. But many additional sleep-related issues can be discussed with our dentist at your next dental health visit. From dry mouth to nighttime grinding to sleep apnea, we are here to help you rest your head a little easier.

Brushing your teeth should be part of everyone's nightly routine. This is to remove the daily buildup of plaque on your teeth. Plaque is formed when food debris mixes with saliva and makes a sticky film substance on your teeth. The film also holds bacteria, which when not removed ultimately ads in cavity formation.

To further complicate the situation, everyone normally has less saliva flow at night. Less saliva flow is commonly referred to as having dry mouth. When dry mouth is severe enough you will have an increased risk of cavities, mouth sores and thrush.

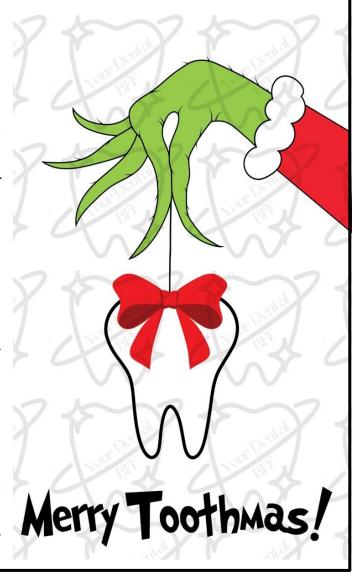
Nighttime grinding or clenching is called bruxism. This may be seen by your dentist or hygienist as excessive wear on the edges of your teeth. There is a normal wear and tear that your teeth experience as you age, and this is taken into consideration when discussing sleep bruxism. Treatment is necessary when we see breakage of fillings or teeth, increased sensitivity or muscular discomfort. When early-stage damage is seen, we don't want to wait until you have discomfort and will recommend a preventative guard to wear at night. Please ask your dentist at your next visit if they see signs of excessive tooth to tooth damage.

Sleep apnea is another issue that we may help identify but will work with a medical doctor to diagnose and treat it. When we see children with large tonsils, we often ask the parents about the child's sleep pattern. If there is enough concern, we will recommend that the parents have a conversation with their child's pediatrician. We ask adult patients a series of questions regarding daytime sleepiness and nighttime snoring. This quick questionnaire helps us identify if there is a need for further evaluation by a sleep medicine doctor. Many adult patients are aware of their condition and are looking for an alternative treatment. Some dental appliances may be able to be used in addition to or instead of a CPAP machine. Our dentist will work with your sleep medicine physician to determine which treatment is best for you.

With the holidays approaching, out-of-town guests may be staying at your home. We all want to make others feel welcome and at ease while visiting. Don't let your snoring wake the kids before Santa arrives, or a lack of good sleep causes you to be a grinch to your guests.

It's that time of the year again. We just ate our way through Thanksgiving and now we are getting ready for Christmas. While you are stressing about how you can make this another great Christmas make sure that you take time to pause and enjoy this joyful season.

We live in one of the best neighborhoods in Virginia Beach. When outsiders drive through our community, they notice the well-maintained lawns and the pride of ownership we take in our homes. These things contribute to the reason that our crime rate is lower than other similar sized communities in Virginia Beach. Criminals know a neighborhood like ours is not the kind of place that is productive for them. We keep our vehicles locked and valuables out of sight, our garages and sheds are locked and we watch out for our neighbors, so criminals move on to more lax areas. We need to continue making our community unattractive to criminals.

I have been working with our Community Police Liaison Officer to get the speed monitor placed on Five Forks Road for the last couple of months to no avail. He told me that they will have an officer assigned to monitor speed in the interim until the monitor becomes available.

Since the time change and darkness comes earlier I have noticed more people out running, walking or biking wearing dark colored clothing. At least, please wear light colored clothes so that drivers can see you sooner. Don't forget about your dog. A reflective collar just might save its life.

Remember: Criminals Love Holidays and Shopping Too! The arrival of Thanksgiving officially kicks off the holiday shopping and celebration season. Your Virginia Beach Police Department will have extra officers on patrol around the malls and shopping centers and on the roadways throughout the city. BUT "WE need YOU to help US help YOU" and this statement is especially important during this time of year. Please do not put yourself or your property into the situation of being an easy or inviting target to would be thieves. Your situational awareness does make a difference and is of the utmost importance in the prevention of crime.

Helping a Neighbor in Distress

Because our neighborhoods are so safe, friendly and such great places to live, many elderly homeowners choose to live here into their later years. Unfortunately, the report of a recent incident, that is very uncharacteristic of our residents surfaced, and is worth mentioning:

Approximately three weeks ago an elderly neighbor who lives alone was in desperate need of assistance after falling in his yard and breaking his hip. Shockingly, a passing individual, walking a dog, refused to assist the fallen resident stating 'the police would be called' – unfortunately the call never occurred. Subsequently, it took the injured resident, with other physical issues, an excruciatingly painful hour and a half to drag himself into his home to summon assistance on his own.

Fortunately, the injured resident was able to summon help, received assistance, and is on the way to recovery. It should go without saying that if you are involved in a situation such as this and you are **the witness:** — render assistance by making a 911 call. If possible, stay with the injured person until help arrives, or if for some reason you must leave, see if a neighbor can assist. <u>Please do not abandon the injured.</u> In Virginia the Good Samaritan law will protect you so don't be afraid to get involved.

<u>For our older residents</u>: face up to the reality that the number one cause of injuries in and around the home is slips, trips and falls, and if you are involved the chances of a serious injury are much greater for you than for a younger person.

If you live alone or are doing outside chores alone, have your cell phone with you or purchase a fall detection or medical alert device (I've fallen and I can't get up) *and wear* it, so you can contact someone to assist you or to make an emergency 911 call.

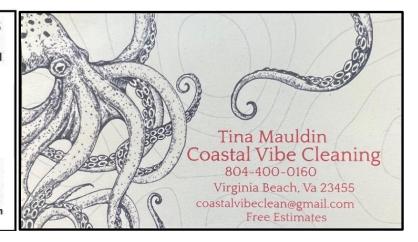
Have a Safe and Merry Holiday Season!

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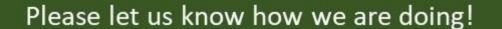
