Senior Program

The senior program is currently running here at Oatley OOSH. This is for all students in years 5 and 6 and is held at the OPS site during after school care, and runs during vacation care for certain activities. The aim of the program is to form a cohesive group where they can develop communication, empathy, and respect for each other, and to engage in activities that aid in forming connections as well as developing skills and learning.

These are the final years at primary school, and our aim for your children is to give them a sense of agency and purpose while here at OOSH before they begin high school.

The activities mainly involve team building, lateral thinking and skill-based learning, and developing a sense of responsibility and independence, as well as forming new friendships and having fun! Also, at the end of term, we will have an excursion to celebrate all the team building and learning that has been happening.

We kicked off the program during vacation care, with excursions that involved Virtual Reality (VR), geocaching, and orienteering (just to name a few), but the main program runs during term, so all year 5 and 6s will have the opportunity to be part of it all.

We continue to gather feedback from the children, and we would also like to hear from you - the parents and caregivers - if you also have any feedback on the program.

Junior Program

The junior program is truly underway! Every day we have at least three different activities planned in the afternoon session. Each week will have a different focus or theme. Week one was 'all about me' and week two was valentine's day. Crafts and activities will try to be involving the same theme, but not always kept to.

The variety of activities that we have has so far this year has been great! From the Switch, to baking regularly, crafts every day and an assortment of outdoor activities and group games. At the end of every week we have 'year meetings' where we ask students of a particular year questions about OOSH. What they like, what they don't like, do they want to do anything in particular in the upcoming weeks at OOSH? Etc. This has been a great way for students to better influence our programmed activities.

We have tried to integrate some multicultural games within the program as well. We have tried some traditional Indigenous games such as Kai, and a Ghanaian game called Pilolo. It's a good opportunity for the students playing the game to learn more about other cultures around the world!
