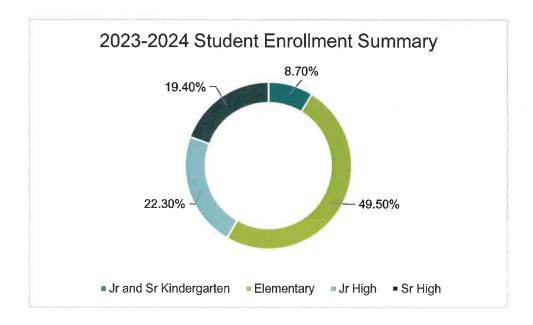

Achievement Evaluation

Achievement evaluation is based upon a comparison of Current Year data to a set of standards which remain consistent over time. The Standards are calculated by taking the three-year average of baseline data for each measure across all school jurisdictions and calculating the 5th, 25th, 75th and 95th percentiles. Once calculated, these standards remain in place from year to year to allow for consistent planning and evaluation.

Additional Considerations:

- 1. The government survey is conducted in February when half of the school year is yet to come but parents, students and teachers are expected to comment on the whole school year. Courses that are offered in the second semester cannot be commented on, nor can any initiatives, events, improvements, or progress that happen in the second half of the school year. As an independent school, this is also the point in the year when decisions have been made regarding student enrollment for the following school year. When families have made decisions to change schools, or when DWA has suggested that another school may be a better fit for their child, it can lead to a period of adjustment realizing that there is more of the school year to come and that we can still work together to create a positive experience for the following months. This adjustment period falls in line with the AEAMs survey and as many students and parents feel they need justification for changing schools, it can also impact the feedback provided.

 2. The teacher and student surveys are conducted online and done at school ensuring a very high percentage of participation; DWA has less control over the completion of the survey by our parent

4. Lastly, the surveys are only sent to families of students from Grade 4 to Grade 12. The Kindergarten to Grade 3 families have no voice in these surveys. Thus, 34% of our school community is not represented in the results.

Therefore, with the exception of the teacher and student results, we cannot consider this year's survey results to be an accurate reflection of the thoughts and opinions of our entire school community. It is important to keep this in mind when reading the percentages for each section.

To get a better measure of parent feedback for the continued growth and development of our programs, DWA conducted an online survey in June where 22 families, 26.5% of our families participated. Typically, we see improved parent response rates in our independent survey. However, there was still a lack of overall participation despite sending the link several times at the end of this year. Although we had lower than usual participation, this survey was still valuable as it allowed for feedback from families from all divisions, and these results, in combination with the AEAMs data, will help to drive our future planning.

Comment on Result:

DWA was very pleased to see that our parent satisfaction result for engagement of learning remained at 100% for the 2023-2024 school year. Although only 9 parents responded to the survey, and we are unable to determine the age groupings of the parents due to less than 6 contributions to each category, we feel that this is a positive outcome to have achieved and maintained.

Our student result on engagement declined this year, which is an area of concern for DWA. Looking at our student results, the Grades 4-6 students, and 10-12 students showed a drop, while our junior high results showed an improvement. For the 2023-2024 school year, we introduced a new Friday program that either took our Junior and Senior high students off campus every Friday afternoon, or a guest speaker was in the building for a program. While this has had a positive impact on the Junior High students, it has also demonstrated that our upper elementary students could perhaps benefit from a similar increase in engagement opportunities outside of their regular classroom. As our engagement results from the 2022-2023 results showed a decline in our Junior High group, we put significant effort into adjusting our programming, and working with the students on their resilience, as well as relationship building, so it was positive to see the results of that work.

41% of our Grade 4-6 students responded "No" to the survey question "Do you like learning math". Math can be a challenging subject for many students, along with the continued implementation of the new curriculum which has brought many concepts down into earlier grades. This had the largest impact on the decline in results for this age group.

The High School students also demonstrated a decline in engagement despite also having increased off campus excursions and guest speakers. While their results showed they understand the importance of learning Language Arts, Social Studies, Science, and Math, their results for interest in learning the same subjects showed a decline. Delta West Academy strongly believes that students should take a full academic course load in High School to best prepare them for all options in post-secondary. In our efforts to ensure students have enough courses for early application and acceptance, the students typically take Social Studies 30 and Physics 30 in second semester of Grade 12, which is when this survey would be presented to students. At this point, many of our students have already received

acceptance and do not need these second semester classes for their averages, although they do need Social Studies 30 to graduate with a High School diploma. Due to this, we often see a decline in performance and engagement, which is also demonstrated by the Diploma Results.

Key Strategies

For our Elementary students, DWA will look to incorporate the students into more off-campus activities to demonstrate the applications of their courses in real life opportunities. Continuing to have subject specialists teaching our courses will also help us to have the most qualified and passionate teachers in each subject area. We will continue to work with our teachers on their excellence with finding Professional Development sessions that can help with engaging lesson planning, and continued support, particularly in Math, for curriculum implementation.

For our Junior and Senior High students, we will continue to offer off campus activities on Friday afternoons to support and enhance their engagement in learning. DWA is also committed to continuing to work with Renfrew Services to organize sessions for students to overcome anxiety or stress which can impact learning engagement.

With the decline in engagement for the second semester with our High School students, we are continuously discussing ways to encourage the students to push themselves to work hard in all subjects and courses whether they need them or not. This is part of our goal for increasing resilience and excellence. Already, DWA has had multiple Grade 12 graduates come back to the school to thank us for pushing them through the courses, because they have been learning very similar topics in their first-year post-secondary courses and it has been very helpful. We also had students show tremendous growth on their Physics diploma exams which significantly improved their confidence that they can persevere through hard things. One strategy for the 2024-2025 school year will be to work with our alumni to speak with our current students to relay these messages to the students to encourage them to embrace all the learning opportunities they are given at DWA for their benefit in the future.

Comment on Result:

Citizenship is part of one of the 4 main pillars of Delta West Academy: Legacy. We want all our students to leave behind something positive and memorable from their experiences at Delta West Academy. We want all of our students and graduates to become active citizens, and we regularly work together as a community to support and help organizations that are important to our students. Our citizenship results were generally maintained for the 2023-2024 school year, and keeping high results in this category will continue to be a priority for DWA.

100% of our parents who completed the survey are satisfied with their child(s) characteristics of active citizenship. We continue to work with our entire community to encourage everyone to be involved. It has been wonderful to see so many of our families attend activities like the Terry Fox Run, and the Field of Crosses as it is important for our students to see that it is also important to their parents.

The decline in the results from the Grades 4-6 students is a concern to DWA, particularly having only 55% of students respond that they feel students follow the rules. Given that there were no major issues within this student group during the 2023-2024 school year, DWA will need to continue to work with students and improve our messaging about how consequences for students will not be publicly shared. Many students feel as though nothing has been done if they do not actively witness a consequence, so we will need to improve our communication regarding this.

An encouraging result was that 100% of our High School students responded saying they are encouraged to try their best. Although there was a decline in engagement, it is encouraging to see that they do recognize the work their teachers are putting forward to push the students towards achieving their own excellence.

Although our teacher results were essentially the same as the previous year, an area of concern was that only 71% of staff responded that students respect each other, which DWA believes closely aligns with the Grade 7-9 (73%) and Grades 10-12 (74%) students feeling that students take responsibility for their own actions.

Key Strategies:

DWA will continue to offer opportunities for students to get involved in their community including our annual participation in the Field of Crosses, Fun Lunches for Charity, and new for the 2024-2025 school year a week in November called "Dragons Give Back". We will encourage students to fully participate in all activities, and will be working with our older students also to be leaders. For the 2024-2025 school year, we will be working with our students to increase their citizenship by giving each group roles and responsibilities they can feel proud of. Our Grade 6 students will be office assistants during lunches, our Grade 7-8 students will assist with bulletin boards, our Grade 9-10 students will have a rotation for ensuring that Jr and Sr High lunch areas are kept clean, Grade 11 students will be lunch room supervisors on Mondays to support teacher collaboration time, and Grade 12 students will be in charge of fun lunches and supporting other Student Council initiatives.

We will also work with our students and staff on conflict management and classroom management strategies that will improve our respect ratings. We will work with Renfrew services to continue with sessions on respecting boundaries, and other sessions suggested by staff. DWA will also continue to support teacher resilience through in-house PD sessions.

DWA also looks forward to seeing the improvement in student citizenship results with the implementation of our new cell phone policies for the 2024-2025 school year. For the past two years, students have been expected to leave their cell phones in baskets at the beginning of each class. This has led to significant teacher supervision, and constant check-ins being required. For the 2024-2025 school year, students will be required to leave their cell phone in the designated area in the office for the entirety of the school day. We hope to see improvements in student interactions without the distractions of technology during their break periods. It is also much harder to be rude or mean when face to face with someone, so we are hopeful that more in-person contact with our students will improve their socialization skills which are still stagnated due to their experiences through the Covid-19 pandemic.

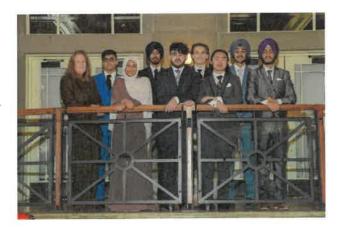

Comment on Result

Students who start at DWA in Grade 10 and remain for Grade 12 write up to six Diploma Exams and generally all in the higher-level academic stream. Our rigorous High School program prepares students to succeed not only at DWA, but also in the university and colleges they will be attending in the future. We are pleased with continuing DWA's high standards for academic achievement in our High School program. As part of our goals of supporting excellence, we are encouraged to see our students rising to the challenge and meeting or exceeding their own expectations for themselves.

Key Strategies

DWA strives to support all students in their academic success through many initiatives. These initiatives include ATI (access to instruction), re-assessment, and offering multiple ways for students to demonstrate their understanding through differentiated assessment. We will continue to offer small class sizes for individualized attention, leadership opportunities, participation in Performing Arts and Physical Education classes, access to career counselling, and individualized assistance with university applications and schedule creation with Ms. Dutchuk-Smith, Head of School.

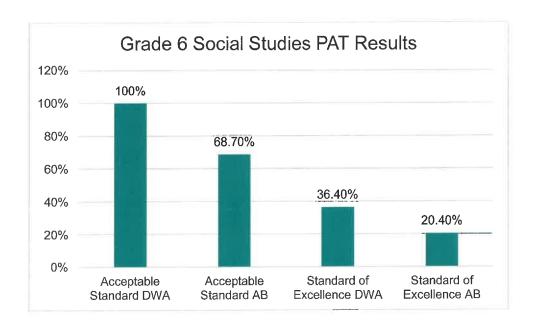

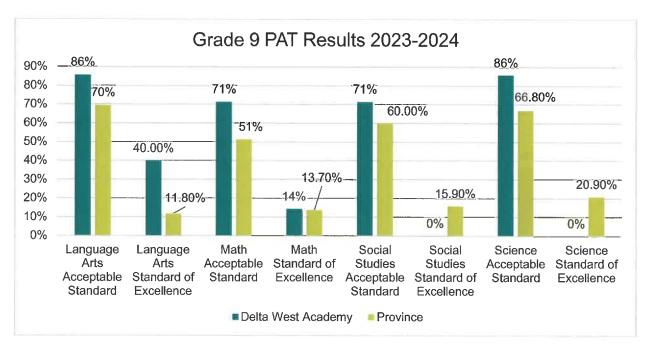
DWA was disappointed to have the Grade 6 LA and Math PATs not administered for the 2023-2024 school year, as we were early adopters of the new curriculum, and were looking forward to the opportunity to gauge the success of the new curriculum implementation. The Grade 6 Science PAT was still utilizing the old curriculum, so we were also not able to have our students write that exam. The Grade 6 students did however write the Social Studies PAT. As you can see from the graph above, our students exceeded the AB results in both acceptable standards (50% on the exam) and standards of excellence (86% on the exam).

Comment on Results:

Delta West Academy's Acceptable Standard results exceeded the Provincial measures in all subject areas, although our goal is to reach 100% acceptable in all subjects. For the 2023-2024 school year 43% of our Grade 9 students were new to Delta West Academy. When we receive new students, particularly in upper Junior High or High School, there is a significant amount of work to do to learn about each student's learning styles, their previous experience, and any curriculum gaps that exist. As mentioned in our additional considerations, students who are not returning to DWA do not always understand the importance and value of maintaining their work ethic and engagement through to the end of the school year. This group of students were also writing their first Government exam as well after their exams were cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Key Strategies:

Delta West Academy strives to re-gain our 100% Acceptable Standard results. In order to support this goal, we will continue to work with Renfrew services to support students in building their test and study strategies, as well as introducing them to techniques to combat stress and anxiety to best demonstrate their understanding. We will also continue to work with our staff on implementing curriculum, and assessing students to determine where they are at, and building their skills from there. DWA will work to

assess all students, particularly in Grade 6 and 9, in the first semester in both literacy and numeracy, to identify gaps earlier, and then bring in the necessary supports to ensure they are prepared for PAT exams at the end of the school year.

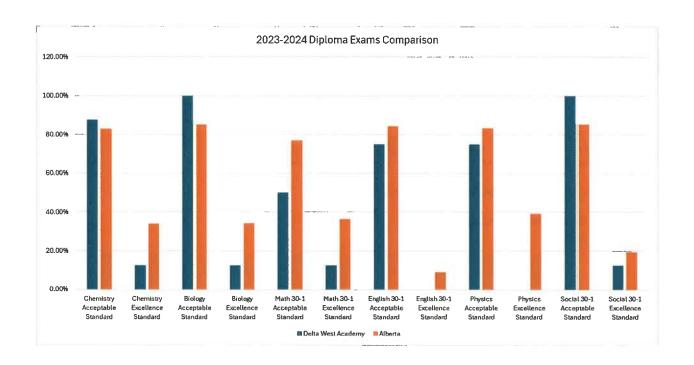

Comment on Results:

Although the goal for AB Education is acceptable standard, and standard of excellence, DWA also measures success based on the number of students who take the courses. We have a rigorous academic program for our High School students and recognize that very few students take all three sciences, calculus, and graduate with a second language. DWA strives to provide its students with all the opportunities that are available to them if they have exposure to the full spectrum of courses. As we rarely alter our programming, students may be working through courses that are outside the scope of their comfort zone, or what they feel is important to achieving acceptance into the post-secondary program of their choice. The results from the 2023-2024 Diploma exams were also impacted by their 30% weighting. Many students completed their courses with strong marks and declined to put forward the same rigor of preparation for the diploma as its impact would not be significant enough to impact their post-secondary applications. Our second semester courses were also impacted by students achieving acceptance into their programs, and not requiring Physics 30 or Social 30-1 for applications. We were very pleased to see the improvement in the acceptable standard achieved in all three sciences, and Social Studies.

Key Strategies:

Continue a re-assessment practice of having students write a full cumulative practice final prior to the Diploma exam which can be used to replace a unit test with a lower score. As a community, DWA will also need to work with the students to encourage them to always do their best, even when it must be applied to a subject that is not their favorite. Increasing student resiliency and showing them the value in all classes will need to be supported by all the teachers and administrators. Another key strategy will be to continue to work on Staff retention which will allow us to have the same teachers teaching the courses multiple years to gain experience with the exams to best prepare the students. DWA must also work with our Grade 12 families to discuss the importance of keeping up their studies over extended breaks such as our Christmas Break or Easter Break. While time off, and family holidays are important and provide students with the opportunity to rest, relax, and take in new experiences, they should also be utilizing this time to review and identify misconceptions to return to classes prepared to improve. Another very important strategy for our High School students is to continue to instill upon them the importance of reading. Through our Professional Learning Communities of Language Arts teachers at DWA, we have been discussing strategies to improve student reading, vocabulary, and vocabulary retention.

Early Literacy and Numeracy Results:

For the 2023-2024 school year, the LeNS (Grade 1 and 2) and CC3 (Grade 3 and 4) literacy assessments and the AB Education Numeracy Screening assessments were administered to all Kindergarten to Grade 4 students.

Only Regular and Irregular Words were tested. Non-words were not tested from the CC3 program.

From the table summarizing the results of our early literacy and numeracy screenings, DWA had no students assessed as being overall at risk in either numeracy or literacy for the September assessments. For our Grade 2 and 3 students, we were able to mostly maintain those results, indicating that students are functioning as expected for grade level, or less than 6 months behind. For Kindergarten, no students were assessed as being at risk. For our Grade 1 class, by the June assessments, no students were considered at risk in literacy, however 2 students were still considered at risk for Numeracy placing them approximately 6 months behind their current grade level.

DWA is committed to continuing to utilize these assessments to inform our decision-making and to provide support for students. In the 2023-2024 school year, we hired an AB Education Certified teacher to specifically work with students in the early years, not just those deemed at risk, to support student and teacher growth. DWA will continue to look for opportunities to include 1:1 student support for all its students.

Comment on Results

DWA is pleased to see our scores for parent and teacher satisfaction for overall education quality maintained at 96.3% and 98.9%. Our parent results showed a 100% rating for quality of education, with their biggest concern coming from whether their child's school work is challenging with 78% of parents agreeing with this statement..

Percentage of teachers, parents and students satisfied with the overall quality of basic education.



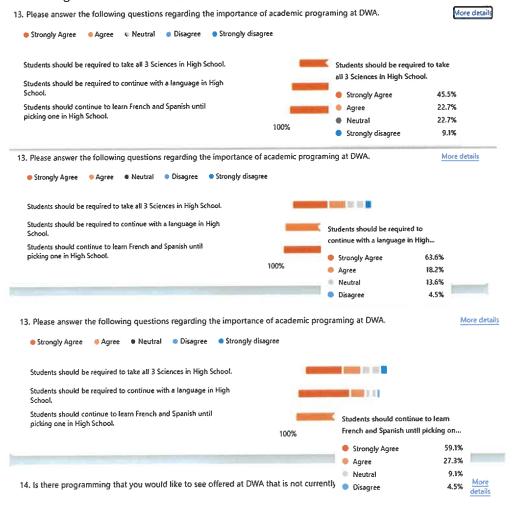
Our Student score dropped 4.4%, but is still acceptable. For our student results, the Grade 4-6 students maintained a fantastic 97.8% satisfaction rating, while our Junior High students rated 83.2% and our High School rated 76.6%. 100% of our Grade 4-6 students chose "Very Good" or "Good" to describe the quality of their teachers.

The Junior High results aligned with the Parent concern about finding school work challening. Only 64% of students agreed that their school work is challenging. They also gave a 95% rating on the quality of teaching at DWA, and 100% rating on the overall quality of education at our school.

In our Senior High School student results, the biggest change in results was the student response for the question "My school work is interesting" with a 47% rating, compared to 74% the previous school year. This is a common theme throughout our results from the 2023-2024 school year with working with the students to appreciate the opportunities to learn about all the different courses and subject areas with our rigorous academic program.

Key Strategies:

Some key strategies for Delta West Academy will be to continue to be uncompromising on our commitment to achieving excellence for our students. DWA parents were polled in June of 2024 to determine if changes should be made to programming, and the majority wanted to see the continuation of second languages and three sciences. It is clear from the below results, that these are some of the driving reasons for parents to choose DWA for their children, and that they want to see this programming continued. We will need to work with our parents to ensure that the messaging between school and parent is consistent and that both sides support the continued difficulty in programming here at DWA and discussing the benefits with the students.



We will also continue to build upon the principle that students must put forward their best effort in all courses, and not just those that suit them. We must also work with the students and teachers to provide meaningful opportunities for learning engagement, and opportunities for the students to see the applications of their learning in the "real world". Through these initiatives, we can help students make connections with the material, take more ownership in their learning, and improve their interest level in courses that they are taking but do not plan to pursue beyond the secondary level.

DWA will also ensure that we maintain a high capacity for learning for our teachers. Providing opportunities for PD through the Calgary Regional Consortium, AISCA, and internal sessions will keep our teachers learning and growing in their pedagogy. DWA also will begin to implement a more regular schedule of Professional Learning Communities within the staff through regular subject specific meetings to promote curriculum alignment and scaffolded expectations. Our teachers will continue to work towards obtaining their Permanent Certification, as well as regular teacher evaluations from DWA administrators.

Comment on Results:

A 90.9% overall rating for parents, students and teachers on agreement about the learning environment at DWA being welcoming, caring, respectful and safe is an important result. Students, and teachers must work together, and with the parents, to build meaningful relationships that best support student learning and growth. Parent and student results demonstrated some improvement, with our teacher rating declining slightly.

All student age categories showed an improvement, with the highest coming from our Junior High group which increased in their overall rating from 76.2% to 85.0%. This increase, we hope comes from the dedicated effort of DWA staff and administrators to increase the number of opportunities for students to engage with each other both in school, and outside of school. These efforts include having more off campus excursions, more sports team opportunities, and after school time such as school dances, tubing at Canada Olympic Park, and Laser Tag.

In our student results, 95% of Grade 4-6 students, 86% (an increase from 57%) of Junior High students, and 84% of Senior High students responded that they feel welcome at their school. The results are also interesting within our Grade 7-12 students in that there were lower scores for students feeling other students respect each other, but higher results for other students treating them well. We will need to work with the students to understand where this disconnect is coming from.

Key Strategies:

One of the major benefits of DWA is our small class sizes. This allows the students to learn to work with different personalities, and it also means that our students cannot hide. As a staff we are able to identify concerns quickly, and work with the students to resolve issues. Although this is a major benefit, sometimes students, especially as they get older, feel that this is a challenge. Their teachers do not accept when assignments are not done, and will communicate with the student and parents until they know that the student has done something to the best of their ability. We must continue as a school to reframe this for the students to view this as a benefit and not a drawback of DWA. We simply do not accept less than excellence, and while this is different for every child, we will not allow our students to settle for less. Another key strategy for supporting WCRSLE outcomes will be to provide opportunities for students to interact outside of the classroom through off-campus activities, and DWA Foundation activities. This will include things like the Los Angeles Trip in September 2024, school dances, field trips, and allowing students to provide input on activities they would like to see through questions asked on our June 2024 student survey. These questions included "Are there events that you want to make sure DWA has in the 2024-2025 school year?", "To transition into Junior High, or Senior High, what do you feel you need from DWA to want to continue to pursue your education with our school?", and "What does DWA need to do to improve student engagement/re-enrollment?".

We are also encouraged by the early observations we have made regarding student connections that have been increasing due to the implementation of the new Cell Phone policies. Students are spending more time interacting with each other, rather than being focused on their devices. It is our hope that this will continue to improve student relationships and help nurture a welcoming, safe, and caring environment within DWA.

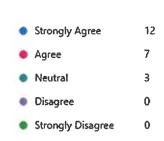

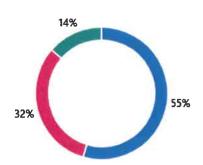
Comments on Results:

In the 2023-2024 school year, DWA saw a much larger presence of Renfrew services which positively impacted all students at DWA with large group sessions focusing on topics suggested by teachers and students. This allowed us to utilize Renfrew's expertise to build student and teacher capacity to support students academically and socially. It is encouraging to see that our parent and teacher results remained high, and only a small drop in our student results.

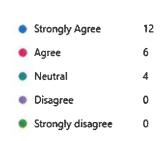

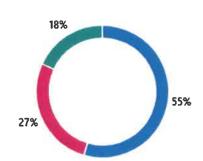
5. There are adequate supports in place to help my child when they need it.

DWA offers its students support through small class sizes, ATI (access to instruction), Dragon Learning Plans, and IPPS. Our small class sizes allow for students to interact with their teachers in every single class each day. For our split classes, we hired AB Education Certified teachers, and teachers assistants, to come support the teacher to ensure that student questions were answered quickly, and to minimize disruptions during instructional time.

Our Dragon Learning Plans formally help to identify any student gaps or concerns both academically and socially, and allow us to internally work as a staff with the student and family to best support those students.

Our IPPs are developed with the entire staff to ensure that strategies for students are effective, and achievable.

It is encouraging to see that the efforts our staff have been putting towards student supports have been acknowledged by parents, students, and teachers.

Key Strategies:

DWA must continue to work collaboratively with students, teachers, and parents to support students, and to ensure that everyone is aware of the supports in place, and the opportunities for additional supports should they be required. We will continue to work with our community to identify student concerns both academically and socially and utilize our staff, Renfrew, and outside organizations to address the concerns.

A key strategy will be to continue to utilize our VP Ms. Briceno-Rivas as a support for student services through her own professional development, and Renfrew Services to expand teacher capacity to support students. IPPS and Dragon Learning Plan creation will continue to be a group effort to ensure that all stakeholders have ownership over their role in supporting student growth and development.

DWA will also continue to build teacher capacity regarding inclusive education and EAL supports through professional development opportunities. Although Delta West Academy is not a special needs school, we recognize the importance of each student having opportunities to learn in a way that best supports them. Through differentiated instruction and learning opportunities on a daily basis, along with getting to know our students very well, DWA is able to support different learning styles. Students who attend DWA where English is not their first language, also have support in place through extra hours of instruction built in to our Elementary and Junior High programs, along with ATI for additional support.

As there are no self-identified FNMI students currently enrolled at DWA, there are no measures or results to report on. Nonetheless, there is the understanding from Alberta Education that disadvantages faced by a particular group of students impacts everyone and the expectation exists that everyone assists in ameliorating that situation.

DWA has also invested in First Nations specific literature to compliment classroom and teacher resources. Our ability to include students in off campus opportunities such as attending the Glenbow Museum, Head-Smashed-in-Buffalo Jump, Fort Calgary, and other venues, allow us to bring our students into the Indigenous community to learn and hear first-hand knowledge of FNMI's history. Through past connections, Delta West Academy has built strong relationships with First Nation elders, bridging the gap between our small community and those that lie outside of our school. Hosting Land Acknowledgements with our school community is also an important way of respecting First Nations communities and helping our students identify their perspectives, experiences, and legacy.

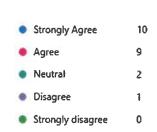
Comment on Results:

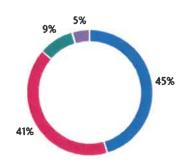
Over the past few years, after the shut downs of the Covid-19 pandemic, DWA has been working very hard to re-establish relationships with our parent community and to grow our parent involvement. It is extremely encouraging to see this measure continue to improve in both parent and teacher responses.

Through our June Parent Survey, we were also able to establish similar improvements in parent engagement.

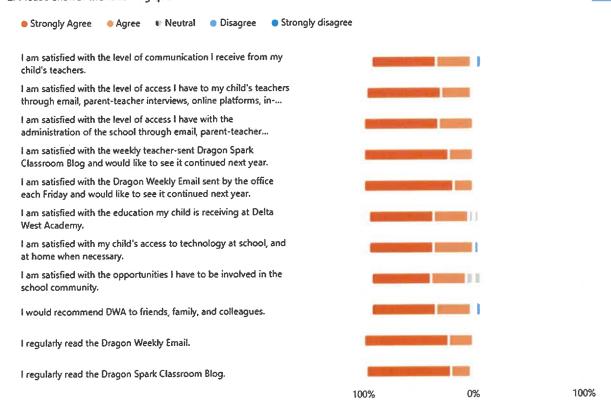

Key Strategies:

DWA will continue to host community events such as Bring your Parent to School Day, DWA Multi-Cultural Fair, DWA's Got Talent, Christmas Tea, and others to encourage our parents to come to the school to see how their children are learning. We will also continue to work with our Foundation to provide events for families to gather together outside of the school.

DWA will continue to offer Coffee with Admin. Although attendance for Coffee with Admin was not as high as we had hoped, as shown below, we will continue to offer opportunities for parents to attend to provide the platform for parents to bring forward concerns or ideas to enhance their child's learning experience at DWA.

When asked why they did not attend Coffee with Admin, the major response was difficulty to attend due to work commitments. We will continue to work with our parents to provide alternative times for them to contribute. Although another positive response to the question was "Throughout our interactions, we found the admin to be consistently approachable and enthusiastic about engaging in conversation, even during brief encounters around the school. While we didn't require further discussions, we would have gladly attended the event if we needed to." We will continue to work to ensure that our messaging is that our doors are always open, and that we must work together as a community to provide the best learning experience. DWA can only address concerns they are made aware of, and implement new ideas if they are brought forward!

For the 2024-2025 school year, DWA will also re-establish a Parent Advisory Council (PAC) to specifically provide a voice directly to administration from parents and students about making DWA the best place for students to learn.

DWA will continue to maintain effective communication of community events through the Dragon Weekly email, Dragon Sparks Classroom Blogs, the Electronic Calendar on our Parent Portal, Social Media Postings, and School Cloud. We will be utilizing help from a DWA alumni to support us in our use of Social Media to provide parents the best look at what goes on in our school on a regular basis.

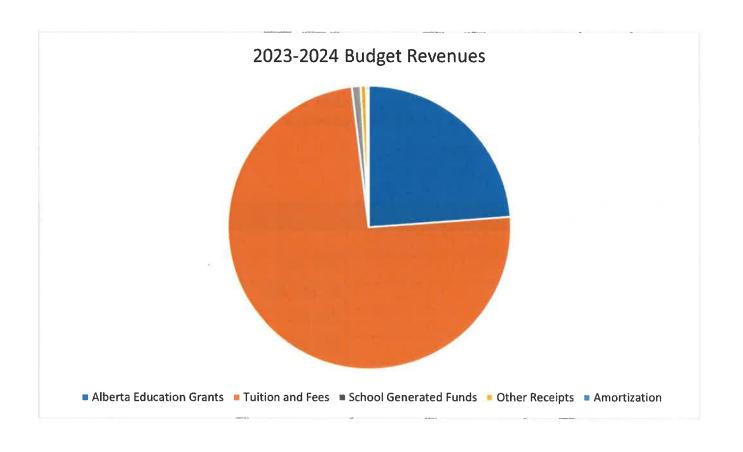
DWA will also keep a minimum volunteer requirement to encourage all families to find meaningful ways to be involved in their child's school.

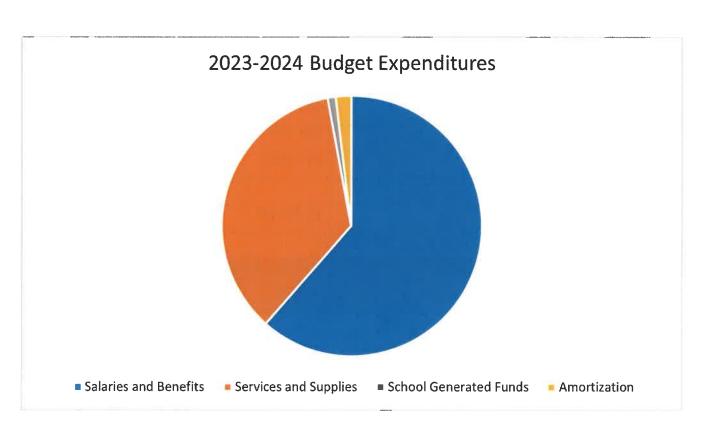

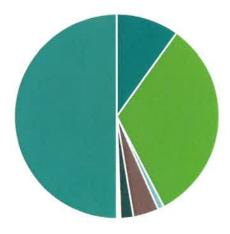

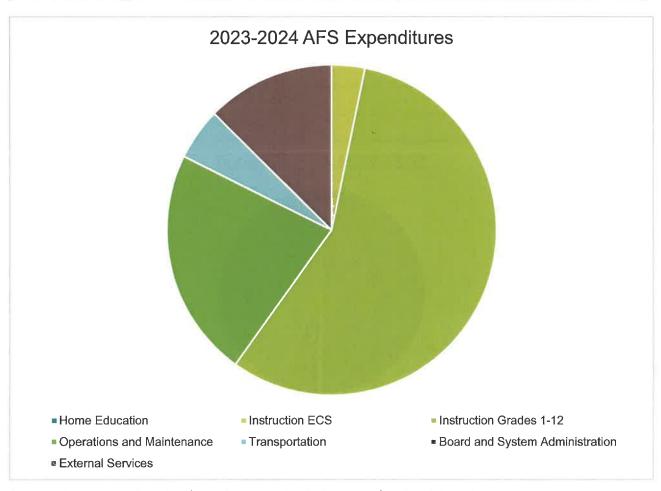
