Agency was created by legislation in 2018 and launched July 1, 2019.


Responsible for administering:

- Educating the public regarding its role and the services of other child-serving agencies



State Child Advocate's Broad Vision of Reform (2019)

- Access and awareness of an array of services that allow children to safely remain in their homes and communities or in the least restrictive, most family-like setting based upon their needs
- Coordination of services and efforts for a system of care grounded in urgency, empathy and sustainability
- Continued collaboration with child welfare partners regarding communication, service coordination and planning strategies to improve the timeliness of court hearings and outcomes for children

- The Cass Elias McCarter Guardian ad Litem Program began in 1984 and is in 45 counties.
- Guardians ad Litem (GALs) are court-appointed special advocates for children in DSS abuse and neglect actions (not private custody actions).
- The program served 14,425 children in the last fiscal year with an average of 8,468 children served each month.

Children/families currently being served In FY24, the Guardian ad Litem Program served 11,577 children with an average of 6,600 children served per month.

• The Foster Care Review Division (FCRD) supports the Foster Care Review Board (FCRB), which was created in 1974 pursuant to S. C. Code of Laws Ann. Section 63-11-700, et.seq. to review the cases of children who are in foster care and to advocate for permanence so children do not linger in foster care.

- The Foster Care Review Boards review the cases of children in foster care once every six months (after a child has been in foster care four months) and submits their recommendations to the Court on yellow paper.
- S.C. Heart Gallery is a program within the FCRD that works to recruit adoptive homes for legally free children by featuring them in photo exhibits around the state.


Greg Wright, LPCS **Director, S.C. Continuum of Care** The S.C. Continuum of Care was created in 1983 pursuant to S. C. Code of Laws Ann. Section 63-11-1310, et.seq. to "develop and enhance the delivery of services to children and youth with severe emotional and behavioral needs and to ensure that the special needs of this population are met appropriately to the extent possible within South Carolina."

Continuum of Care uses High Fidelity Wraparound which is an evidence-based to provide intensive care coordination to children and youth who are experiencing serious behavioral or emotional challenges.



Continuum of Care

Continuum of Care's goal is to maintain children and youth in their homes, schools, and communities to avoid higher levels of care such as DSS, DJJ or emergency departments. However, sometimes those higher levels of care are necessary. During FY23, 81% of youth who partnered with COC remained in the community while 19% had out-of-home placement.



Number of Phone Calls to Investigations Unit







DSS RFP/MMO for additional capacity

Advocacy for DDSN to stand up Residential Habilitation capacity; DDSN solicited for high management beds; approximately 12 new beds became available in 2024

Beginning in FY24, DDSN is incentivizing individuals to become ABA providers

Medicaid work underway regarding increased RBHS and placement array; State Plan amended to add MST, Homebuilders, and other intensive in-home services 8

* STAPs are alternatives to detention and not "transition or step-down placements."

Multi-Agency Cooperation and Coordination to Advocate for a State-**Operated Psychiatric** Residential **Treatment Facility**



A ground-breaking ceremony was held on September 16, 2024 for the William R. Byars, Jr. Treatment Center which will be built on the South Carolina Department of Mental Health's Crafts Farrow Road Campus in Columbia, South Carolina. This will be a PRTF for seriously mentally ill, justice-involved youth.
