ENGAGE NEW MEMBERS BY:

- Offering a ride to club and committee meetings and project sites.
- Organizing a seating plan, such as grouping by favorite color, to mix new and seasoned members.
- Conducting an icebreaker at the beginning of each meeting or several times a year.
- Inviting them to travel with you to a District or State Federation meeting.

Consider These Suggestions For Integrating New Members Into The Club:

- Hold a special initiation or induction ceremony for new members and present them with a GFWC member pin. (GFWC Marketplace offers pins and a GFWC Ceremonies Guide.)
- Encourage a class of new members to plan and execute their own service project under the guidance of an experienced member.
- Find out what skills, talents, and abilities each new member offers and is willing to share (e.g., computer skills, artistic talents, knowledge of specific program or advancement areas, etc.).
- Teach new members about the club and GFWC. Host new member orientations, set up Big Sis/Little Sis or other mentoring programs, and welcome them to each meeting and encourage their participation in discussions and project activities.

These are just some ideas to help new members feel a part of your club. If you would like me to help with any of these activities, conduct an installation, or if I can help in any other way, please let me know. I'm happy to help share the sparkle of GFWC and GFWC South Carolina!

- -Complete a Statistical & Narrative Cover sheet on EVERY club approved project even if your club is not providing a narrative
- -INCLUDE IN EACH REPORT FOR EACH REPORT:
 A separate <u>Statistical & Narrative Cover Form</u>
 with <u>Submission Type</u> clearly marked, a separate
 narrative for each program report, as well as addenda (if you are providing any of these). Make

INTENT OF YOUR CLUB PROJECT DETERMINES WHERE TO REPORT

Examples:

An ART THERAPY project that emphasizes the therapeutic value of art>
ARTS & CULTURE

A project to aid veterans with PSTD> CIVIC ENGAGEMENT & OUTREACH

Animal themed fundraiser to benefit endangered animals> ENVIRONMENT

A project that helps special needs children focus attention> EDUCATION & LIBRARIES

And a project to aid those with addiction or depression> HEALTH & WELLNESS

- -Clubs are asked to put special emphasis on up to three (3) TOP projects in each of their reports by BRIEFLY describing the INTENT of the project...who, what, when, where & why of the project in the narrative
- -Up to three (3) Narrative pages can be attached in the email with the Statistical & Narrative Cover Form marked as Narrative
- -Up to five (5) Addenda pages can be attached in the email with the Statistical & Narrative Cover Form marked as Addenda
- -Caption ALL photo addenda with Club Name, CSP or Special Project reporting under, and what is happening
- -Junior Clubs must submit one additional report to the Director of Junior Clubs Shelli Pugh at shellipue1@gmail.com
- -All clubs are encouraged to, AT A MINUMUM, submit the <u>Statistical & Narrative Cover Form</u>
- -GFWC-SC PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL PROJECT, GFWC-SC DIRECTOR OF JUNIORS SPECIAL PROJECT, FUNDRAIS-ING & THE CIP REPORT are the only projects that may be 'double' or 'cross' reported

JUDGING CRITERIA:

Evaluation of each report will be based on the following so please address all applicable items in your

- -Total volunteer hours, dollars donated, dollars raised and in-kind donations will be evaluated on a per capita basis for all clubs
- -Description of the projects in the narrative form
- -Number of projects, hours, dollars, & in-kind contributions
- -Innovation an originality of project

- -Participation of membership as compared to club size
- -Community participation especially other outside organizations or individuals
- -Publicity of project for club, GFWC-SC, and GFWC
- -Success of project impact on community
- -Any additional information i.e. awards, sponsorship relating to project

DEFINITIONS FOR REPORTING

ADDENDA may include photos, handouts, publicity, etc. which help augment the understanding of your narrative and project.

ADVANCEMENT PLANS are the programs and projects clubs initiate to advance their clubs. There are 6 plan areas: **Communication & Public Relations, Fundraising, Leadership, Legislation & Public Policy, Membership, Women's History & Resource Center**

AFFILIATE ORGANIZATIONS such as United Nations Program Shot@Life, Heifer International, St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital, Operation Smile, Hope for Justice, March of Dimes, Canine Companions for Independence, and UNICEF. **PLEASE SHARE IN YOUR NARRATIVE ANY IN-KIND DONATIONS AND VALUE. GFWC HAS ASKED FOR THIS AFTER OUR FORM WAS APPROVED.** (As AFFILIATES do change, for a complete list, refer to the GFWC.org website.) Also complete the SC Affiliate Statistical Form – this is one form to capture ALL the work your club does with any of the Affiliate Organizations.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS (CSPs) are the programs and projects club members initiate and participate in to serve their communities, including projects with GFWC Affiliates. There are 5 program areas: **Arts & Culture, Civic Engagement & Outreach, Education & Libraries, Environment, Health & Wellness.**

DOLLARS DONATED is the monetary amount given to programs and projects.

DOLLARS RAISED reflects dollars earned from fundraising and development of programs and projects. Applies to FUNDRAISING ONLY.

IN-KIND DONATIONS reflect the monetary value for goods provided to *CSP* programs and projects. Please refer to the GFWC In- Kind Donation Guide for an <u>estimated</u> value of commonly donated items at https://www.gfwc.org/wp-content/uploads/2018/08/In-Kind-Donation-Guide-2018.pdf You may certainly estimate a value you feel best reflects your contribution.

INTENT explains reason for project.

NARRATIVE is the written description wherein you describe the <u>Intent of the Project</u> and the <u>Who</u>, <u>What</u>, <u>When</u>, <u>Where</u>, <u>How</u> and <u>Why</u> of a project.

NUMBER OF PROJECTS is the numerical account of the programs and projects initiated and participated in by your club.

STATISTICS is the Numbers: dollars, hours, members, etc.

VOLUNTEER HOURS is the amount of time that members worked on *Club Approved* programs and projects. EXAMPLE: If a club member or even several separate members donate blood, deliver Meals-On-Wheels, make financial contributions to a charity, etc. it is NOT REPORTABLE. IF your CLUB votes to make a project of volunteering at the food pantry, delivering Meals-On-Wheels, makes a charitable grant or contribution with Club Funds, or go as a group wearing GFWC or Club apparel to donate blood, then that is a *Club Project* and those hours are reportable. REMEMBER: When you have a speaker (or attend a state meeting), you may count volunteer hours for the subject matter (ex: Environment) for each club member attending. Round to nearest hour!

The most wonderful time of the year!! The Holiday Season is upon us which provides us all with many opportunities to reuse and recycle and fun activities for our club's participation.

Did you know...

Americans send 2.65 billion Christmas cards annually-enough to fill a football field ten stories high. One billion Christmas cards are discarded each year into a waste bin.

There is a 25% increase in waste from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day, one million tons/week 227,000 miles of wrapping paper is thrown away each year.

Tips before the holidays...

Consider sending plantable cards this season. There are several companies that make these cards with seeds embedded in the paper. Once the holiday is over, soak the paper overnight, cover with a thin layer of soil and plant indoors or out, keep watered and watch your colorful wildflower garden grow

Bring your own shopping bags when shopping and save on the plastic

Put out recycling bins next to your trash for holiday gatherings to make it easy for guests to recycle

Look for wrapping paper and cards made with recycled materials

Consider purchasing a cut Christmas tree that has been harvested from a tree farm, many of which are family owned and operated. These farms often plant two or more tress for every one cut and often use rocky soil that does not support other types of agriculture. For assistance in finding a local farm, search https://www.localharvest.org You might also want to consider buying a genuine pot grown tree to plant after the holidays.

Check your recycling day. The holidays may alter the days that your city or town is picking up trash.
