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Homeowner Proves Value Of On Site Dwelling

When Tom Kilpatrick investigated ways for his mother to live close to his family and a short walk from amenities, the answer was in his backyard.

An Additional Dwelling Unit (ADU), a smaller secondary home built on the same property as an existing house, a garden suite, was that answer.

For Brooklin families searching for solutions as housing prices and urban density increase, Kilpatrick says, the project became an example of what could be done.

He adds, “It’s a great way to increase housing while maintaining the character of the neighborhood. And also, potentially adding value to your home.”

Province opened the door

He was encouraged to take on the project about two years ago when Bill 23, the More Homes Built Faster Act, was passed by the province. The initiative was designed to push rates of home construction to ease the housing crisis. It would also allow landowners to build ADUs with fewer regulatory zoning requirements than before.

“As per the province, you can have three units on your lot. You can either have them within the primary building or you can have two units within the primary building and one in the backyard as a garden suite,” he says.

Kilpatrick says building an ADU has long term financial benefits, especially for baby boomers who live in their current single detached home. “It makes sense for them because in a lot of cases, these people own their homes outright. So they have equity to potentially play with that enables them to pay for this kind of housing.”

An investment

ADUs can also serve as an investment for multigenerational families, he says. A unit can be passed down through generations and used by grandparents, parents, and their children as young adults. “If (the homeowners) have kids, they could have their children move into the primary home due to

the fact that they don’t need and don’t want that much space anymore.” Kilpatrick’s contractor, Drew Thiebaud, says “It’s going to add to the aesthetics and overall life there as well. I think it’s great, especially in a place like Brooklin where a lot of people have space to build something like that.

“Some people can’t picture what’s possible in a small size unit. What he has built in his backyard is very liveable. It’s not even a tiny home. It’s a nice size, single bedroom unit with a large kitchen, large living room, nice bathroom, and nice bedroom on a small footprint.”

The unit is approximately 62.71 sq. m. or 675 sq. ft.

Find a professional

For those investigating an ADU, Kilpatrick and Thiebaud encourage residents to speak to professionals who have experience with this type of project.

“It’s a bit overwhelming for someone that hasn’t built these before to undertake it,” Thiebaud says. “Even as a contractor, it’s something newer that we’ve done and there’s a lot of different things involved that wouldn’t be normal to deal with unless it’s an ADU.”

Kilpatrick adds that it’s also important to speak to the municipality. “Do your research.



Speak to a professional and see if you can accommodate it.”

“If you’re planning on doing one,” Kilpatrick notes, “I’d probably provide an allowance for approximately a year, and that would factor in initial preliminary design, application process, and full build.”

How much?

Depending on the location, the site, servicing requirements, and finishes, it can cost into the low six figures.

Due to the provincial law, if you have a large enough lot, Kilpatrick offers that you won’t need any zoning approval or minor variances. In his case, he only needed to pull standard building, grading, and drainage permits.

The approval process is still tricky but can be navigated with professional guidance. “I found there’s a lot of roadblocks from the municipality. Maybe they’re just getting used to these types of developments. I think it was a learning curve for the municipality and also myself. Over time I think that process is probably going to streamline a little bit.”

However, in the end, the dwelling provides his mother and his family with a cozy, convenient new home.

Dancing in Devil's Den

Before Lynbrook Park became a popular summer destination, there was Devil's Den and a dance pavilion where, on warm summer evenings, the sound of live music carried through the trees along Lynde Creek.

Devil's Den pavilion opened in May 1933, on a section of woodland and pasture of 50 acres in the Township of Whitby. The farm had originally belonged to Thomas Lynde, who later willed it

to his daughter Elizabeth and her husband Fred McBrien.



The idea for the pavilion came from the Soap Box, an open-air dance hall on Brock Street South in Whitby, where live music and dancing were popular attractions. Fred and Elizabeth decided to bring the idea to their property.

Hewn from farm wood

The pavilion was an open structure built from cedar poles and slats Fred cut from trees on the north section of the farm. The bandstand was large enough to accommodate a piano and chairs for the orchestra. A huge Union Jack covered the west wall.

There was no electricity. Coleman gas lanterns and lamps provided light at the entrance, the dance floor and the refreshment booth. The hardwood floor was kept dusted with powdered wax and talcum powder to provide a good dancing surface. Don Vandervoot and his five-piece band from Weston, Ontario, were the regular orchestra. They played square dances as well as popular songs of the day. During intermission, Keith Lynde entertained dancers on the piano. Admission was 25 cents, paid at the entrance, and motorists parked in the nearby field. Dances were held on Wednesday and Saturday nights. At first, the pavilion came as a shock to the neighbourhood. Nothing like it had ever been done there before. Gradually, however, the dances became accepted, and the younger crowd rarely missed one.



There was something magical about dancing outdoors on a summer night. The moon and stars shone overhead while music filled the pavilion. But nature occasionally added its own touch to the evening. Some nights the June bugs were so thick they covered the dance floor. Crushed beneath the dancers' feet, they turned the floor into a slippery mess. A refreshment booth provided food and drinks, although some dancers brought their own alcoholic refreshments. Occasionally, those who had been drinking ended the evening with an impromptu swim in Lynde Creek.

Midnight dancing

Holiday weekends brought another attraction. Since Sunday dancing was illegal, special dances began at midnight and continued until 3 am. By the time the music started, it was technically Monday.

On June 1, 1935 a special gala opened the season, featuring Billy Hole and His Live Wires. Admission had increased to 30 cents. That year marked the end of the dance pavilion but it was not the end of the family's venture into entertainment. It was the beginning of a new chapter, as Lynbrook Park opened on the same property.

Today, Devil's Den and Lynbrook Park are part of the Heber Down Conservation Area. The dance pavilion and dancers are long gone, but the land along Lynde Creek remains, a quiet reminder of a time when summer nights were filled with music beneath the stars.
