## **Whitby Council Adopts 2026 Budget**

At a Special Council meeting on Nov. 27, Town Council collaboratively updated Whitby's 2026 Proposed Budget through several amendments, wrapping up this year's budget process.

Mayor Roy confirmed that she will not exercise the power, provided under the Municipal Act, to veto the Council-approved amendments. Whitby's 2026 Budget, as amended, is now considered final and adopted by Council.

The final budget will result in a 3.44 per cent tax increase to the • Town's budget or an estimated 1.2 per cent increase on the total residential bill for Town services for 2026. This represents an increase of just over 21 cents (see below) per day, per average • household for the delivery of important services residents rely on, like waste collection, snow . clearing, and parks maintenance. This budget also focuses on delivering on the key action items of Whitby's Community Strategic Plan, investing in . Council-approved initiatives like the Whitby Sports Complex and a new fire hall and firefighters to support growth.

The Town's \$198 million

operating budget will support the continued delivery of the Town's programs and services including fire services, waste collection, parks and trails, maintenance of roads and community facilities, recreation, libraries, and many other important services. The budget also includes \$62 million in capital investments like:

- continued construction on the Whitby Sports Complex, Mid-Block Arterial Roadway, and
   Columbus Road;
- construction of a new Fire Hall in West Whitby, as well as full funding for 20 new firefighters to staff it;
- community events like the -Home Sweet Home Festival;
- playground equipment replacement & accessibility improvements at Divine and Folkstone Parks;
- waterfront improvements, including around the Shirley Scott Park;
- new traffic safety and calming measures, including pedestrian crossings and traffic signal replacements/ signage; and,
- road maintenance, resurfacing, and reconstruction.

Council builds on and • amends the Proposed Mayor's Budget (released November 7) and the Draft Budget (prepared by Staff and released October 27).

- The final Council-adopted 2026 Budget will soon be made available at whitby.ca/ Budget.
- Provincial legislation requires municipalities like Whitby to approve a balanced budget each year.
- Only 34% of every residential property tax dollar collected stays with the Town. The rest goes to the Region of Durham (55%) and local school boards (11%).
- In a 2025 Greater Toronto Area comparison of residential tax rates and annual property taxes paid on a home assessed at \$500,000, the top two municipalities with the highest taxes sit at over \$7,500 each, while Whitby's are \$6,661.
- The Town has implemented a Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) collected from visitors staying at motels and hotels in Whitby and is looking at other non-tax revenues to mitigate property tax increases. For 2025, the Town is projected to receive over \$600,000 in MAT revenues to be re-invested into the community.
- The Town's tax rebate program to support lowincome seniors and lowincome homeowners with disabilities will increase to \$543 in 2026. Learn more about how to apply.

# Brooklin's History Remembering Fantasyland

Long before new housing developments began to reshape Brooklin, a different community along before housing

Street, just south of the village, on the banks of Lynde Creek. Locals knew it as Fantasyland Park, though longtime residents might also recall its earlier name, Lyndebrook.

(This story follows the November 7 BTC article on Gladys Everett and the November 21 feature on Horace Everett, both of whom served in the Second World War.)

In 1969, the Buchman family of Toronto purchased the park and approached the Everetts, newcomers to Canada from England, about running it. They said yes, embarking on an adventure that would change the course of their lives. When they arrived, there was no house on

the property so they spent their first year in a mobile home style trailer, one without running water. The house they built in 1970 replaced the trailer and made day-to-day life much easier for the young family.

#### Year round fun

Fantasyland Park was a true four-season operation, although

summer was the busiest. The swimming pool and snack bar were the centre of constant activity, while companies, churches, and cultural groups gathered on the grounds for weekend events. Lynde Creek offered peaceful camping spots, and the lawn areas could hold large crowds.

The largest event of them all was Macedonian Day. Approximately 5,000 people arrived on 45 to 50 buses that filled the entrance field. Fires blazed over giant pits where meat cooked all day. Dancers filled open-air patios while swimmers rotated through the pool in 30-minute shifts. Corporate picnics added to the bustle. Lasco Steel of Whitby used to bring about 1,200

people for their annual summer gathering while countless smaller reunions and club events filled every available weekend.

#### And some romances, too

Winter meant snowmobiling, cross-country skiing, skating, and warming fires near the snack bar where hot chocolate was served. Inside the banquet hall, weddings, sports banquets, and Friday night dances created a steady rhythm through the colder seasons. Several romances and even marriages began on that small dance floor. When snow fell too heavily, the Everett sons delivered brides and wedding guests to the hall by snowmobile. When Gladys and Horace took over the park, their three children.

Lesley, Tim and Daryn were just nine, three, and two years old. Their upbringing was equal parts adventure and responsibility.

#### Teen jobs

The park also became a second home for cousins (some from England) and local teenagers who worked life-guarding, staffing the snack bar, and taking on the least glamorous jobs, like picking up trash and cleaning outhouses. Many returned year after year and became like family. The park closed in 1980.

Looking back, daughter Lesley wonders what inspired her

parents to take on such a massive undertaking. After revisiting old photo albums, she realized the answer may have originated in England's popular holiday camps of the 1950s and 60s, places like Butlins, where her parents had spent joyful summers dancing, swimming, competing in funny contests, and celebrating with crowds of families. Perhaps Fantasyland Park was their chance to recreate a version of that magic in their new country.

For Brooklin, and for everyone who spent time in the park, that magic felt real. And for the Everett family, it left a lasting mark.



## New Complex Name: Fieldgate Sports Complex

The Town of Whitby is proud to announce that the future Whitby Sports Complex will now be named the Fieldgate Sports Complex, following Council approval of a new \$1.5 million, 10-year naming rights agreement.

A naming rights sponsorship is a financial or land contribution that gives a business or family the opportunity to have a facility, room, or public space named after them, helping to reduce project costs for the community.

As part of the naming rights agreement, the name 'Fieldgate Sports Complex' will be prominently displayed on the building's exterior, with interior recognition throughout the facility.

This agreement will help reduce facility operating costs while creating new recreation opportunities in Whitby. Fieldgate Homes has played a key role in several local real estate projects,

including recent planned and proposed developments in the Brooklin area.
















## **Community Care Durham Launches Giving Campaign**
