



Summer Institute (SI) is an intentional, multi-generational UU community that comes together each July for a week of fun, community and spiritual growth. Gathering for over 40 years, SI includes an active children's program, a vibrant youth-led youth program, and a strong young adult community as well as many opportunities for the entire community to come together through dance, music, games, and worship. In 2025, Summer Institute is relocating to Oberlin College in Oberlin, OH and gathers July 7<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>. Our theme speaker will be Rev. Joanna Fontaine Crawford, speaking on the theme Live a Life on Fire: Change the World with Your Love.

<u>Pestival</u>?! In May 2023, First Parish UU in Concord, MA hosted its first <u>Democracy Festival</u> to celebrate democracy and encourage civic engagement. It was such a success that the congregation will repeat the festival this year, in early June. The festival was the brainchild of <u>Reclaim Our Democracy</u>, an inclusive, collaborative, and multi-partisan movement at First Parish that seeks to educate about democracy, raise awareness about attacks on it, and limit the corrupting influence of big money on elections and politicians, explains its leader, Fred Van Deusen. ### **ARTIST'S STATEMENT**

I grew up in a northwestern Kansas village where kids were apt to create their own fun. A good deal of my time was spent riding my horse or pedaling my bike around the countryside, enjoying the views of the pastures and wheat fields surrounding me. My high school art instructor encouraged me to pursue art in college. I followed his advice and majored in fine art at Colby Community College and Fort Hays State University. Upon graduation I taught art on both the elementary and secondary levels; then went on to become a graphic artist.

While I paint and draw many different subjects, the landscape is my first and greatest love. I am primarily a studio artist but one of my favorite activities is painting Plein Aire' or in the open air with other artists, which I have the opportunity to do each summer in Vermont. It's a magical feeling to stumble upon a scene that excites me, and then to capture that scene on canvas.

Beyond landscape I also enjoy portraiture and portraying the human figure. Whether I work from a photo, or a model sits for me, it's my goal to capture each unique feature of the individual- the shape of the lips, the lines around the eyes, the hint of a dimple, or the texture of the hair- in such a way as to express not just a likeness, but the essence of the sitter.

Painting and drawing is a spiritual experience for me. I share my work in the hope that the viewer will feel transported to the scene of a beautiful sunset, hear the waves lapping upon a lakeshore, or imagine the grasses rusting in a pasture and feel at peace.
