
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
San Dimas Dam Celebrates 100th Birthday

The dam in San Dimas Canyon is now part of the Puddingstone flood control system. It was started in November 1920, completed in September 1922, and dedicated on April 21, 1923. It has a storage capacity of 1820 acre feet and a drainage area of twenty square miles, which is a part of the San Gabriel Mountain watershed.

The San Dimas Dam was built as a flood regulator, to help prevent catastrophic floods which had occurred in 1914 and 1916. The Los Angeles County Flood Control District was formed in 1915. It's first dam project was Devil's Gate above Pasadena and it's second was San Dimas Dam, followed by Live Oak Canyon Dam above La Verne. It's very interesting to read the April 26, 1923 issue of the San Dimas Press newspaper accounts of the speech Chief Engineer J.W. Reagan delivered at the dedication. He spoke about the need to protect the foothill communities from flooding, as well as water conversation to provide for the expected increase in population of L.A. County. A healthy water supply has always been an important issue to Southern California even 100 years ago.


GREAT way to end 2022!
