

GOOD WORKS WON'T WORK

No matter how hard we try, we are unable to live a righteous life.

The Bible introduces us to a group of people known as Pharisees. The word Pharisee means "set apart ones", and the Pharisees of Scripture set themselves apart from the general population by striving to live absolutely righteous lives.

In their attempt to live a righteous life, they closely examined the Scriptures trying to understand how to follow every aspect of the law. As only one example, with regard the fourth commandment (Sabbath observance), the Pharisees had determined on the basis of Exodus 31 and 35 that there were 39 categories of prohibited work.

These categories are as follows.

Planting Shearing Scouring/Laundering Plowing Beating/Combing wool Reaping Gathering Dyeing Threshing/Extraction Spinning Winnowing Warping Sorting/Purification Making two loops Grinding Weaving

Sifting Separating two threads Cooking/Baking Tying

Sewing Untying Tearing

Kneading/Amalgamation

Trapping Building Slaughtering Demolition Extinguishing a fire Flaying Curing/Preserving Igniting a fire Smoothing

Applying the finishing touch Transferring between Scoring Measured Cutting

Each of these 39 categories then had sub-categories of work that were prohibited. So, with regard to planting, the Pharisees held discussions about whether you could pour out a bucket of water (for if you did it might water a plant and help it grow). Or...could you spit on the Sabbath? (since the spittle might water a plant and make it grow).

The point is that the Pharisees worked **very** hard at righteousness, far harder than most would try today.

Philippians 3:1-11 Paul discovered that no matter how hard he tried as a Pharisee it got him nowhere. Striving for righteousness by following the law is impossible for us as sinners to achieve.
