♦ In Memory of Joann MacMorran - Class 1955B



Joann MacMorran graduated from the WGH School of Nursing in 1955. She subsequently continued her nursing studies and graduated with a Bachelor of Nursing from the University of Manitoba in 1965. In 1971, Joann became the

provincial nurse consultant for tuberculosis and pulmonary disease and worked tirelessly to combat TB in Manitoba. She was a recipient of the Manitoba 150 Trailblazers award in 2021 because of her remarkable contributions to the control of this disease. Please see article on p.6. She was a life-

long supporter of the WGH/HSC Nursing Alumni and was Class Rep for the Class of 1955B for many years. After retirement, Joann remained active, volunteering at the HSC Thrift Shop and with many art groups. However, in October 2020



she suffered a fall and tested positive for COVID-19 while in hospital. This led to her untimely death in 2021. Submitted by Kathy Hamelin

♦ Finding "Jane"

When Mary Ellen Birtles came to "learn nursing" in 1886 at the Winnipeg General Hospital there were four graduate nurses (Mrs. Anna Miller, Miss Mary Kennedy, Miss Laura Whitaker and Miss Grace Reynolds) and Mrs. Brown who was the matron. Both the School of Nursing history book and the Winnipeg General Hospital Annual Report consistently refer to this matron either as Mrs. Brown or Mrs. Colville Brown but Colville was her husband's name and not hers. This has bothered me since I began working as the Archivist at HSC. It seemed wrong that one of the group of women who had influence on the early nurses in Western Canada and the behaviour of these young women should no longer have her "own" name.

I began my hunt by getting a copy of Colville Brown's death certificate. I assumed he had died before 1886 because the School of Nursing history book referred to Mrs. Colville Brown as a widow of a physician. Unfortunately, the death certificate only provided his name and date of death, not the names of his living relative. The trail went cold.

Fast forward to 2021 and being required to work from home. A project which could be done from home was the completion of a finding aid for the Alumni Journal. I knew that there were "hidden histories" in the journal, and I found one in the 1929 edition. This was a Hospital Reminiscences by Lt. Col. Edward O'Reilly on his memories of arriving at Winnipeg General Hospital in May 1887 and meeting "Mrs. Brown, widow of the late Dr. Brown of Berwick-on-Tweed, who was matron in charge" Finally, a little more specific information! An internet search for "Colville Brown" and "Berwick" gave me a result for a digitized copy of the "History of the Berwickshire Naturalist Club Volume 10, 1882 – 1884." This referred to "Colville Brown M.D., formerly of Berwick, died at Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, 6 May 1882, aged 43. He was gold medalist in surgery at the University of Edinburgh. He had practised for about 20 years very successfully in Berwick, when he left on account of his health, for Winnipeg." The article also mentioned he married the youngest daughter of Mr. Robert Carr, farmer at Felkington.

With this information I emailed the Friends of the

Berwick and District Museum and Archives and "struck gold." So, here is their story: Born in 1840 Jane Carr of Felkington, married Colville Brown (aged 25) on 18 June 1864 at the Presbyterian Church Ancroft Moor, Northumberland. A graduate of the University of Edinburgh, Colville had been practicing

in Berwick as a physician for the past

three years. Jane and Colville continued to live in Berwick for the next seventeen years and in that time he acted as the Medical Officer for the Berwick Workhouse. In 1881, both were in delicate health and decided to move to Manitoba in the hope that the climate in Canada would be beneficial. Colville worked as a doctor for the commercial company of Frank King & Co. but within twelve months of arriving in Canada he "succumbed to his affliction of 'casual attacks of brain disease'," died, and was buried at the Kildonan Presbyterian Cemetery on Main Street. Now widowed, Jane needed to find work and in 1884 she was chosen from a list of applicants to be matron at Winnipeg General

Hospital. She was "to have charge of all female help, as well as nurses, except when [they were] on duty" as she was not a nurse and so could not be responsible for them on the wards. This meant that she was responsible for supervising their conduct when [they were] off duty. She oversaw the Nurses Home from when it opened, and she directed the household management of the hospital. Jane was matron for nearly 10 years, resigning, much to the regret of the Board of Directors, in 1893 at the age of 53. The responsibilities of the matron were amalgamated with those of the head nurse and the position of Lady Superintendent was created. It is unclear what happened to Jane. She is not buried next to her husband in Kildonan, it is not obvious if she remarried, or if she even remained in Canada after 1893. Whatever the case, what we do know is that, to her friends, Mrs. Colville Brown was Jane.

♦ Gertrude Hall, 100 years ago

Graduating from WGH School of Nursing in 1921, Gertrude Hall was both a Practitioner and Educator in the field of nursing at a Provincial, National, and International level. After working as a

substitute teacher and graduating from the Grace Maternity Hospital nursing program, she entered training at Winnipeg General Hospital in 1918.

On graduation Gertrude became Superintendent of Nurses at Ethelbert Hospital before working as a public health nurse in northern Manitoba. In 1924 she graduated from McGill University with a certificate in public health nursing and worked in various capacities in Manitoba for the next 20 years. These roles entailed organizing health services in half the province, a survey of nursing homes and the establishment of provincial regulations in the 1930s, and a survey of nursing schools and recommendations for improvement. By 1943 she was Director of Nurses for the City Health Department tasked with amalgamating nursing services. For the next 16 years her career took on a more national and international tone. She was Chief Administrative Officer for the Canadian Nurses Association in Montreal for 8 years followed by 8 years as Director of Nursing Services and Nursing Education at Calgary General Hospital. It was here that she was instrumental in improving the nursing service and the training program of the hospital. At the same time, she served on the WHO's Expert Committee on Nursing being appointed for two consecutive terms (1951-1956 and 1957-1962).

At the time of her sudden death in 1960 she had just resigned from Calgary and was scheduled to be reviewing and revising the staff patterns and patient care at the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto. (Source: HSC Archives/Museum & American Nursing: A Biographical Dictionary Vol. 3)

Hon. Myrna Driedger, Class of 1972B, Manitoba Legislative Assembly

Before entering public life, Myrna worked as a nurse in many roles, including general duty, education, quality assurance, research, and administration. As a leading advocate for the protection of children, she was the driving force behind Child Find Manitoba, now recognized across Canada as the Canadian Centre of Child Protection. Myrna entered politics because of a strong desire to make a

difference As an elected member of the Manitoba Legislative Assembly, her many contributions have left a mark on our province. She was elected speaker of the MLA in 2016 and is currently the only female speaker in Canada.



Myrna has used her position to entice more women into politics and is a mentor to many of her peers and women all over the province.

Joann MacMorran, Class of 1955B

Joann MacMorran's 30 year career as a Provincial Nurse Consultant in Tuberculosis and Chronic Pulmonary Disease resulted in control of this devastating disease in Manitoba. Early in her career, TB was a scourge in Manitoba and was especially common in the Indigenous population. Joann worked tirelessly throughout our province finding

cases, coordinating treatment and bringing help and support to all. She was actively involved in the education of care providers and developed many educational tools for disease detection, management and contact tracing.



After retirement, Joann joined the Canadian International Development Agency to assist with combatting TB in Guyana. She was instrumental in implementing care and organizing follow up during this important visit.

Joann's local and international contributions to health care related to this disease have been described as "remarkable" – and her many accomplishments will continue to have a lasting impact on TB care around the world.

Ann Thomas Callahan, 1958

Ann Thomas Callahan was born on the Peepeekisis Cree Nation in Saskatchewan where she attended the File Hills Residential School in her early years. She moved to Birtle Manitoba to attend secondary school at the Indian Residential School in that area. She graduated from the Winnipeg General Hospital School of Nursing in 1958, as one of the **first** Indigenous graduates. Her early career included the position of Head Nurse of the Gynecology Unit at WGH and as an educator in the Nursing Program at Red River College. She also worked in the community and joined the new organization "Continuing Care for People in Need" to support the health needs of people in Winnipeg's core area. She was involved in the creation of the Canadian Indigenous Nurses Association, our country's first professional organization for Indigenous peoples. In honour of her amazing accomplishments, Ann Callahan's name graces the Critical Services Building at Health Sciences Centre, which opened in 2007.

♦ In Memory of Agnes Comack (nee Bardal),1943

Agnes Bardal Comack's life story is remarkable, not only because she lived for a century, but also because she dedicated her life to the service of others.

Agnes was born in Winnipeg on August 23, 1921 and grew up with 11 siblings on the banks of the 6



Red River in Winnipeg. She graduated from the Winnipeg General Hospital in 1943 and worked at military hospitals across Canada. Agnes often recounted the nursing techniques used at the times, which included mustard

plasters and diligent aseptic techniques! In 1945, while working at Deer Lodge Hospital in Winnipeg, she met Hugh Comack, who was back from the war and recovering from surgery. Their marriage a year later lasted 67 years.

Nursing was a "family affair" for Agnes. Three of her older sisters were registered nurses; two of whom graduated from the WGH in 1924 and 1927. Her daughter Margret also followed in her mother's footsteps, graduating with a Bachelor of Nursing from the University of Manitoba in 1970.

Agnes was a lifelong supporter of the WGH/HSC Nursing Alumni Association and was Class Rep. for

the Class of 1943 for many years. She attended annual Homecoming celebrations and Class Rep. meetings until 2019. She was so disappointed not to be able to attend Alumni events over the past 2 years, all cancelled due to COVID! She will certainly be with us in spirit w

She will certainly be with us in spirit when we hopefully meet for Homecoming in September 2022!

♦In Memory of Donna Friesen (nee Cruikshank) Class 1944



Donna Friesen was another remarkable centenarian who graduated from WGH. After graduating, Donna saved money to put herself through Medical School and graduated from the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Manitoba

in 1950. As the Lady Stick of her graduating class, she was part of the largest cohort of women in medicine for that time. She practised as a physician from 1950 to 1987 in various roles, including rehabilitation of patients with polio and as a family physician at the Manitoba Clinic.

Donna was an early feminist and was featured on the list of physicians who supported a woman's right to choose. She remained active throughout her life and in 2009 she received a Manitoba Active Living award.

Donna never forgot her nursing roots. She was a lifelong supporter of the WGH/HSC Nursing Alumni Association, was Class Rep. for the Class of 1944 for many years and attended numerous Alumni events.

Donna celebrated her 100th birthday in style this past June with many friends and family at her residence and with many messages from friends and family across Canada.

Are You Eligible for a Continuing Education Bursary?

The Winnipeg General Hospital and Health Sciences Centre Nursing Alumni supports the ongoing education of active Alumni members through two funds – The Jane A. Malcolm Bursary Fund and the Viola Leadlay Continuing Education Fund.
